As customary a circus day the elephants will lead the circus parade. The route will be from the show grounds on North River Road to Brighton-Euston - Pownal - Kent - Queen - Grafton - Gt. George-Euston-Spring Park Road - McGill Avenue - North River Road and returning to the show grounds.

strongholds of their Red rulers, the secret police jail and headquarters, which were guarded by Russian soldiers. One account said the mob captured the headquarters, and burned it along with secret police files.

The mob stormed on, attacking Communist party headquarters, raising a white flag over the city hall and destroying the jamming station that interferes with western radio broadcasts.

About noon troops were called out. Russian T-34 tanks clanked into the streets, anti-aircraft guns took up positions on the main squares, soldiers manned machine-guns. At the first shots, women and children fled, but the workers tore branches from the trees and rushed the troops. A flag was put over the first man killed, and his body was carried in the surge forward.

A Polish soldier refused to fire on the mob. His officer killed him with a pistol. Other troops not only failed to shoot, but surrendered their guns.

But when the demonstrators attacked repeatedly, machine-guns were turned upon their ranks. The troops had regained control by late afternoon, though shooting was still heard late at night.

The Polish press threatened that police would now tighten the screws on the people. The papers fumed against the "awkward scoundrels behind these bloody provocations."

ANSWER WITH TROOPS. Angry denying that the revolt had spread to other cities, an influential Polish Communist party member declared in an interview here: "When this happens we are not going to bother with talking democracy, we are just going to send troops."

The Pole, who declined use of his name, said he was in contact with top government officials and that the revolt would set back what he called "our program of liberalization for the whole country."

Diplomatic sources in Vienna said they believed a meeting of east European satellite party chiefs and premiers was in progress in Moscow, and that the Kremlin was advising them on how to handle the ferment of criticism that has resulted from the denunciation of Stalin.

The West Berlin newspaper Telegraf said the "fast growing liberation movement" was spreading to the Baltic states of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia. It quoted Baltic refugees arriving in Finland as reporting many acts of "resistance," including a two-day occupation of the radio station at Riga, Latvia capital.

SEEN BY FOREIGNERS. The revolt, breaking with an unexpected fury that recalled the East German uprising of June 17, 1953 and the students' demonstrations on behalf of Stalin in Soviet Georgia this year, flared as hundreds of Western businessmen were on hand to attend Poznan's annual International Trade Fair.

Pieced from the accounts of these witnesses this was what happened: At 7 a.m. Thursday employees of the Stalin steel works started a march to demand a wage increase. Shouting "Bread, bread, bread" and waving banners, the parade started peacefully enough.

The demonstration snowballed with lightning rapidity. Masses of marchers began closing up roads. Traffic came to a standstill. The crowd began yelling "strike, general strike."

Polish national flags were unfurled, the crowd sang Polish national songs. A Red flag was ripped down. There were shouts of "Out with the Russians!" The rioters began marching in a solid mass 20 abreast upon the city prison. Quickly, they overwhelmed the prison guards and freed prisoners from their cells.

SOME SYMPATHETIC. Police did little to oppose the demonstration. One Communist official indicated sympathy for the strike, declaring, "Warsaw should know that we do not stand for this any longer."

Expect Atlantic Premiers To Protest Freight Rates

HALIFAX (CP) — Premier Henry Hicks said Friday that other Atlantic premiers will likely join him in meeting Prime Minister St. Laurent later this year to express "great concern" about the recent seven-per-cent freight rate increase.

Mr. Hicks said in an interview he has already written Mr. St. Laurent about the concern felt in the area and "I have suggested to him that it is so serious I would like to call on him to discuss it."

The premier said he talked to Premier Fleming in a meeting of New Brunswick, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island and Smallwood of Newfoundland about such a meeting "and they agree with my views and may want to join me in going to see the prime minister."

The increase, recently granted railways by the board of transport commissioners, would likely top the agenda at the July 9 Atlantic premiers conference in Fredericton.

Premier Fleming, host for the meeting, agreed with this discussion, he said, and officials of the Maritime Transportation Commission will be asked to attend.

Missing British Frogman Reported Soviet Prisoner

BONN, West Germany (Reuters)—The newspaper Bild Zeitung frogman Lionel Crabb is in a Moscow prison cell for spying but has been offered a \$34,000-a-year job with the Soviet Navy.

The officer, according to the newspaper, said Crabb had confessed long interrogation to spying on secret naval devices. An investigating judge, he said then offered Crabb a special Soviet Navy job for 10 years—the approximate length of his sentence for espionage—after which he could return to Britain.

Crabb has not yet accepted the offer, according to the officer.

"We have got Crabb—he is our legitimate prisoner," the officer was quoted as saying.

Lt.-Cmdr. Crabb disappeared during a diving mission in Portsmouth harbor close to the Soviet cruiser which brought Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Nikita Khrushchev to England last April.

The newspaper quoted the Soviet officer as saying Crabb "had not reckoned with our modern alarm devices against submarines and frogmen."

He reportedly said Crabb nearly got away in the struggle to seize him but Soviet swimmers grabbed him "at the last moment."
