Johnston's cabin he had to obtain a warrant and that entailed sending a patrol 85 miles to Akavik by dog team. He made the journey and on return was accompanied by Constable R. G. MacDowell and Indian guides with two dog teams.

Injured In Gun Fight

During an attempt to enter Johnston's cabin Cpl. King was shot through the chest. However, he managed to crawl back to his dog sled under cover of a gun fight waged with the MacDowell by Cst. MacDowell. The guides fled at the start of the battle so when MacDowell got safely back they took the best of the dog teams and the constable managed to get the wounded King 85 miles through the frozen country and into hospital at Akavik. MacDowell was in hospital for several days but it was many months before King was released. Since then he has maintained he owes his life to MacDowell.

The Mad Trapper succeeded in killing Constable Millen, King's partner at the Arctic Expedition, in a later attempt to take him. When Cpl. King came back to civilization he was under treatment.

ment at Edmonton and Ottawa and when fully recovered he was sent for a short time to Niagara Falls, Ont. He was then placed in charge of the Port Lambton, Ont., detachment where he stayed until the outbreak of war. He enlisted in the Canadian Army, 1st Division, with which he went to England.

With Invasion Forces

The Battle of Britain and the waiting around was eased for him due to being continually entertained by his many relatives in Yorkshire. However, he saw plenty of action later. He was with a force which attempted an unsuccessful landing at Brest and also was in the invasions of Sicily and Italy.

At the end of the war he returned to Canada and was stationed at Ottawa for a short time where he assisted during the famous "spy trials" which came to Prince Edward Island and served in Charlottetown and Souris until 1948 when he went to Borden in charge of the detachment there.

Cpl. King has always expressed himself as being proud to belong to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. As he puts it, "the privileges, esprit de corps, and the greatness of that Force can only really be appreciated by a serving member."

It was six years ago that he married Miss Rosemary McGuigan, Hope River, who had been secretary at R.C.M.P. Headquarters in Charlottetown. He says he en-
