Social Changes Lagging B&P President States

"It would appear that we need to match up economic and industrial change with social change, and to rethink our attitudes and customs in line with the changes in the social structure," Miss MacGill, Toronto national president of the Canadian Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs in addressing the annual meeting dinner of the provincial organization last night.

Miss MacGill outlined the employment problems of women arising from increased mechanization and automation, and suggested measures to resolve these problems. She told of some of the steps taken by the federation to bring about desired changes concerning the position of women in the present day economy.

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Accused Is Remanded

Charged in city police court with the possession of stolen goods, valued over \$50, James Sterling Hall, Charlottetown, was remanded on bail of \$300 until Oct. 31 by Magistrate A.J. Haslam, C.J. yesterday.

"That is a complete falsehood, and the minister knows it," retorted Opposition Leader Diefenbaker.

CONTRACTS DELAYED

Outside the house, Mr. MacNaught admitted that the delay in proceeding with the runway reconstruction at Summerside and the new houses at Slennon Park was tied in with the defence department's review of the entire military establishment in Canada.

"For some time the department has been reviewing all the economies that could be made among the propositions advanced by the department in the Summerside station, in conjunction with almost every other military establishment," Mr. MacNaught explained. "I don't think there is any likelihood that Summerside will be closed down but this is a decision for the government to make in close touch with Mr. Hellyer on the problem and if such a decision is taken it will be made to be a bad blow for 8 Summerside and P.E.I."

Tenders for the new homes at Slennon Park have not yet been called but they could be within a few days, Mr. MacNaught said. The tender call for the airport runways has been called but a contract has not been let. Mr. MacNaught said no action on either project will be taken until a decision is reached on the future of the base. He expects that a decision on Summerside will be made in six weeks or less.

FEARS SHUT-DOWN

Senator Orville Phillips, former MP for Prince, said Friday he understands it is the intention to transfer the Maritime Air Command at Greenwood, Nova Scotia. This will mean closing down Summerside and also the Halifax administrative base of the air force. The operation is training and the Argus operational squadron now at Summerside would be transferred to Greenwood.

Senator Phillips said there are some 1,200 service personnel and about 400 civilian employees at Summerside, plus the dependents of the service personnel. If the base is closed he said it would be a disaster.

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Paris Art Exhibition Planned By UNESCO

UNESCO has arranged a Pedagogical Exhibition for Paris next year on the results and methods of artistic education in various countries of the world. It will also be shown at the UN headquarters in New York, and later be made available to other states.

To organize the exhibition the Junior Red Cross divisions were asked to supply original art works by pupils from different age groups. These will include sketches, drawings and paintings in a 2 1/2 medium, and form paper work. They are also asked to supply photographs showing children at work with art materials in the classroom or at home, either drawing, painting, modelling, or constructing three dimensional objects.

An effort will be made as far as possible, to illustrate the instruction methods employed by the teacher, the range of materials used, the freedom of expression and the general creativity of children.

Mrs. Eunice Reid, director of Junior Red Cross in P.E.I. has collected a number of samples of art work from all the schools in the city. These have been forwarded to the Canadian National Commission for UNESCO.

It is hoped that some of these will be chosen for the international exhibition.

The importance of this project cannot be over estimated, for it is by these shared experiences of common interests that people of the world arrive at a closer understanding of one another, it was stated.

FIRE-BLACKENED RUINS REMAIN

Plans for RCAF Summerside were originally drawn up in 1940 and the station officially opened as No. 9 Service Flying Training School on Jan. 25, 1941.

In 1942 the station became the home of No. 1 General Reconnaissance School and continued as such until the end of hostilities.

The station was placed on a care and maintenance basis from early 1946 until late 1947 when it was reactivated as a permanent installation of the peacetime RCAF.

Today there are three units at RCAF Station Summerside. The oldest of these is the (Maritime) Operational Training Unit.

should pull together, organizations such as Legion, board of trade and service clubs along with town council should hold meetings immediately and all send representatives to Ottawa.

"Why should RCAF Summerside be chosen as one of the sites to be closed?" he questioned. "All other provinces have military installations. New Brunswick, has Chatham air base, and Gagetown and Nova Scotia has naval, army and air force bases. Why should P.E.I., which has only one military installation, be chosen?"

George Key, Jr., a Summerside town councillor, said "the suggestion today that the station would be closed is extremely difficult to credit. It would seem that if a number of stations are to be closed some

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
