The Gallinger Case

DON GALLINGER, one of two former NHL players serving life suspensions for betting games at the headlines in the past week when his application to the league's board of governors for reinstatement was turned down. When he was suspended in 1962 while playing with the Boston Bruins, Gallinger was "bush hush" and it was only recently that the public found out why he was tossed out of the league, never to play again.

According to reports one of the reasons Gallinger wanted to have the suspension lifted was that he wanted to run a summer hockey school at his resort on Lake Rousseau in 1963. When he had looked for support, people kept saying he was living a dream world and asking how he could run a school when the NHL wouldn't have anything to do with him.

Don Gallinger applied for his suspension lifted and his bid was rejected and this was followed by some strong words by Clarence The Enforcer (NHL president Clarence Campbell). Campbell has called these bets "despicable" and reacted as if the crimes had been committed in recent days instead of 15 years ago.

Our sympathies lie with Gallinger. How long does a man have to pay for something he did 15 years ago when a criminal completes a jail or penitentiary sentence imposed by the courts he leaves the institution a free man ready to do as he wishes as long as it is not unlawful but not to Gallinger. He'll have to just enter the rest of his natural life.

TORONTO COLUMNIST Scott Young, the talkative and well-known reporter in most during many past Saturday night NHL games, brought the case out in the open last week when he wrote several copyright articles pertaining to Gallinger. The former player had contacted him first and told him that he decided to give up trying to live in silence with his suspension. He told Young "I've kept quiet for 15 years and I just can't help me. I'm not asking anyone to condone it—just to listen, and maybe have the public decide, even if the NHL won't. I have no more to say."

Young also sympathizes with Gallinger. He says "The governors of the National Hockey League are: Stafford Smylie, Toronto; Frank Selke, Montreal; William A. Jennings, New York; Bruce Norris, Detroit; Walter Brown, Boston; Jim Norris, Chicago. I hope that none of them ever needs forgiveness."

He continues: "I would be very tempted to take the likes of a governor or two and hunt them down for their morality lives, and examine their mental of Gallinger purely as an exercise in comparative morality."

Young Wonders If This Legal

Of Campbell, Scott says: "Clarence Campbell is the NHL president. He imposed the sentence and now enforces it—keeping Gallinger not from the NHL, but from all hockey. (Is this legal?) After he called Gallinger all those of humiliating names for publication again last Monday, I hope he took time out from his busy schedule to reflect upon how fortunate he was to be so well served himself. It must be a great help in his job."

CONCLUSIONS—"Campbell wasn't always so unforgiving. Long before anyone ever had called him Clarence The Enforcer, he was assistant prosecutor in the Canadian war crimes trial of a few years ago. Jack Nicklaus Captures Golf Class

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP)—U.S. Open champion Jack Nicklaus turned the match into a rout when Gary Player blew himself to a three-over par score on the 12th hole on Monday at Palm Springs Golf Classic Monday in an 18-hole playoff with the South African star.

The 32-year-old Nicklaus, who saw his own five-stroke lead melt away in the final round of the \$50,000 90-hole tournament, coasted in to win the extra-round knock-out by eight strokes and picked up the winner's purse of \$9,000.

Playing under a hot sun, and a gallery that often was noisy and unruly, Nicklaus shot a 34-31 and Player a 36-37-73 as they teared the par 36-35-71 Island Western Country Club course.

The sturdy Nicklaus, from Columbus, Ohio, birdied the first hole to take a one-stroke lead in the match. He held on after nine and then watched, along with the gallery, in person on the 12th hole as Player's 33-ave. net on the par four 33-ave. 12th hole.

Nicklaus concluded his brilliant six under par performance with a birdie and an eagle on the last two holes as he successfully held 35 - four holes.

As Player's horror unfolded on the 12th, he had personal contact with three palm trees, a trap, and a missed putt.

Player, who had come from behind to tie Nicklaus with a score of 345, collected \$4,600 for second place.
