Eloquent Baccalaureate Sermon At St. Dunstan's

The Baccalaureate Sermon was given in Saint Dunstan's University Chapel last evening. The speaker was Rev. Charles T. Boyd, Ph.D., S.T.D., Rector of St. Dunstan's Parish, Fredericton, N.B. Most Reverend James Boyle, D.D., Bishop of Charlottetown, assisted at the throne and gave Pontifical Benediction. The Bishop was assisted by Rev. P. P. MacDonald, Chancellor of the diocese, and by Rev. W. O. Simpson, of the University. Also present in the sanctuary were Rev. P. McMahon, Rector of the Basilica. Accompanying Dr. Boyd on his visit here were Father Brown and Father Ward of the Saint John Diocese. A large number of relatives and friends of the forty-two graduating students attended the ceremony.

Dr. Boyd began his sermon with the words with which Christ rebuked the devil when he tempted Him: "Not in bread alone doth man live, but in every word that proceedeth from the mouth of God" (Matt. 4:4). The majority of mankind today however, Dr. Boyd pointed out, is guided by the very opposite philosophy of life. Society today is wholly secular; man's thoughts have become limited to concern about food and the good things of this world. Unfortunately some universities today are the secular trend, and indeed give it added impetus; they concentrate upon the study of applied sciences to the extent of practically excluding every other study; and particularly they exclude from university life the study of revealed truth. Mr. William (Bill) Roper, who may be regarded as the best known citizen in Charlottetown after 35 years employment as house manager at the Prince Edward Theatre, retired at the weekend in order to devote his time to other interests.

Mr. Roper has been in "Show Business" since the days when Stouck Companies made this city a routine stand for Exhibition Week in late September each year and such names as Price Webber, Mac Edwards and Frank Oliver were as well known here as the movie stars of today. As stage manager in co-operation with the late Wm. C. Whitlock, who was a veteran actor and producer, Mr. Roper met and knew many stage folk who later won distinction and fame in the new world of the cinema.

The Burns Concert in the early days as well as the more experienced local artists and down through the years Mr. Roper gladly contributed to the success of their efforts with words of encouragement and sound advice.
