Local Guernsey Cow Continues Top Record

Patoie Dorraine's Lassie stood second in the mature class in Canada for Guernsey cows in the period reported in the current issue of the Canadian Guernsey Breeder's Journal.

This cow which qualified recently for a long-time production award, which established her as the Maritimes highest all-time producer, was 15 when she started the record reported in the Journal, and she is now just about ready to start a new lactation, though she was 18 years old last November.

The all-time Maritime production tops was in milk. She was third in butterfat production. Her latest record reported in the Journal was 13,216 pounds of milk and 174 in butterfat production.

Eric Hurry, who owns Patoie Dorraine has received word that Carl Ellis died recently at his home in Hespeler, Ont.

Mr. Ellis, like Mr. Hurry was a past president of the Canadian Guernsey Breeders' Association and the two Guernsey men had other close associations. He visited Charlottetown last summer when the annual meeting of the Canadian Guernsey Breeders' Association was held here.

For example Mr. Hurry's cow, Patoie Rosie won in 1960 a trophy donated by Mr. Ellis for the Guernsey cow with the highest lifetime production record that finished her record in the calendar year. Mr. Ellis was also a past president of the Central County Guernsey club in Ontario and the Guernsey Cattle Club of Ontario.

Dan Montgomery Dies In Hospital

Daniel Montgomery, a native Islander, who resided many years in the United States, died yesterday at the Charlottetown Hospital in his 82nd year.

The late Mr. Montgomery was born at St. Margaret's, P.E.I., the son of the late Alex and Sarah Montgomery. A carpenter by trade, he spent a good deal of his early manhood in Western Canada, particularly Saskatchewan. In the early 1920's he moved to Malden, Mass., where he lived until 1956 when he retired to Midgell, P.E.I.

He is survived by his wife, the former Edna MacDonald of South Lake, P.E.I.; two daughters, Edna, Mrs. Harold Blackington, East Hampton, N.H., and Gladys, Mrs. John O'Neil, Melrose, Mass.; and a son, Daniel Jr., Malden, Mass.

Also surviving are a brother, Donald, North, Mass., and two sisters, Mrs. Della Kennedy, North Easton, Mass., and Mrs. Margaret Viillard, Hamilton, Ont.

The funeral will be held Friday, March 19, from St. Pius X Church, Parkdale.

condition of the province was couldn't expect to increase taxes to improve this condition "as the citizens of this province are already taxed to the limit."

Mr. Ferguson said he disagreed with criticism of the Canadian-American trade agreement on imported automobiles made earlier by Minister of Health Hubert McNeill, who termed it "one of the biggest giveaways ever started in Canada."

While the tax-free benefit does go to auto companies for expansion, it is expected 60,000 new jobs will be made available to Canadians because of this expansion, he said.

"Revenue lost by turning money over to the automobile manufacturers will eventually be picked up by the government in taxation," he added.

Mr. Ferguson said the automobile deal was "a step in the right direction" because it attacked the trade imbalance between Canada and the United States.

The Fifth Kings member suggested both the provincial and federal governments should "begin to recede from the bus-

that appeared in the public press of the province?"

"The only basis the leader of the opposition had for demanding a retraction was in a Prince Edward Island paper—not another thing."

Mr. Matheson got up here last year and made a slashing attack on the press for poor reporting. I have had to correct something in the press. From time to time, members are misquoted in the press."

Premier Shaw said "on the basis of a press report, the resignation of the attorney-general is being asked. I'm not going to ask for his resignation. I'll do no such thing. The whole thing is out of order. It is on the basis of a press report which may be wrong and probably is wrong."

Dr. Hubert MacNeill, minister of health, suggested that if members were to correct every error in the press there would be no time to carry out the business of the Legislature. He asked why the opposition did not demand an apology at the time of the alleged statement of the attorney-general.

BACKS UP PRESS

George Ferguson (L-5th Kings) said "I don't know what the attorney-general meant when he made his statement but I'll back up the press—it was not a wrong report and I heard it. I don't want the impression left that the press is reporting incorrectly."

"The press reported it incorrectly," said Mr. Farmer.

Panel Heard On Merger Of PWC-SDU

KENSINGTON — A large and keenly interested audience listened to a panel discussion on the merging of St. Dunstan's University and Prince of Wales College here Monday night.

This was the second special seminar in a series of three being held to discuss the report of the Royal Commission on Higher Education for P.E.I.

Dr. Malcolm Beck told something of the activities of the original citizens' committee of PWC and the progress that was made until Roman Catholic and Protestant clergy and laymen worked together studying the question of higher education in the province.

The second member of the panel, John Eldon Green, gave a number of good reasons for combining the university and the college for the purpose of developing one university in this province.

A general discussion followed. Arthur Daley was moderator for the panel and Rev. Robert Shaw was chairman.

James Murphy, principal of the school, welcomed the visitors. The Kensington Home and School Association served coffee and doughnuts.

N. London Man Dies In Ontario

Crown Withdraws Sex Charge During Heavy Court Session

SUMMERSIDE — The charge of having unlawful intercourse with a girl under 14 years of age against Donald Russell Broom of McNeill's Mills was withdrawn by the crown in Prince County Court before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald yesterday.

George R. McMahon was crown prosecutor and G. Bruce MacDonald represented the accused.

Magistrate MacDonald fined Winston Bryenton of Malpeque \$75 and costs when he pleaded guilty to a charge of impaired driving.

A resident of Toronto, Gaeton Raymond Beaudry, was remanded for sentence to March 23 when he pleaded guilty to a charge of unlawful possession of a motor vehicle.

The accused, who originally elected trial by judge without a jury and later was allowed to change this to trial by magistrate, told the court he had stolen the car from a parking lot in Scarborough, Ont.

He said he was engaged to a girl from P.E.I. and when she didn't write him after returning here to tell her mother of her impending marriage he decided to travel to the Island to find out what was happening.

ARRESTED IN BORDETN

The arrest was made in Borden after the accused had been stopped for speeding by the Borden town police and when asked to produce the ownership papers for the vehicle he was driving, was unable to do so.

Magistrate MacDonald remanded the accused pending a reply from Ottawa where his fingerprints were sent.

A Lennox Island youth Joseph Lee Bernard, 16, was sentenced to one month in Prince County jail. The youth had pleaded guilty at an earlier hearing to breaking and entering the Lennox Island School.

In passing sentence Magistrate MacDonald stated that due to the accused having already served a term in jail it was "no longer a matter of a suspended sentence."

No plea was taken in the case of Charles Dymont of Northam who appeared on three charges. The charges were: driving while his license was suspended; impaired driving, and leaving the scene of an accident.

The magistrate adjourned the case to Thursday in order that the accused have time to consult a lawyer.

ASSAULT CASE

Wilfred Howard Lloyd White of Elylerie was fined \$35 and costs or 30 days when he pleaded guilty to unlawful assault by hitting a man with his fists.

The magistrate reserved his decision on the case of Reginald Lemuel Buell of Crapaud who pleaded not guilty to a charge of impaired driving.

RCMP Sgt. Alan Burchill, the arresting officer, testified for the crown. Neil R. MacLeod, who represented the accused, called on both Mr. and Mrs. Buell to testify.

James Winfred Phillips of McNeill's Mills pleaded guilty to a charge of squealing tires and was fined \$10 and costs. On a separate charge of impaired driving he entered a not guilty plea and his case was adjourned to a later date.

Robert Joseph Campbell of Summerside was let off with a warning when he appeared on a charge of driving without lights. He told the court that a fuse had burned out, cutting off his lights. When stopped by the RCMP, he said he had been trailing close behind another car proceeding to a garage to have the fuse replaced.

George MacKay (L-4th Prince) said "he made the statement—I'll swear to it."

When Attorney-General Farmer rose to speak, Speaker Frank Myers suggested he read a transcript of the statement in question.

READS TRANSCRIPT

Mr. Farmer referred to what he said was a transcript of the House recording. From the transcript, he referred to the results of the Feb. 9 by-elections in which Liberals won the two seats at stake and said "people will not support such a party that is founded on corruption and gangsterism... that is founded on corruption and syndicated crime."

Dr. M. L. Bonnell, opposition leader, jumped to his feet. "I support the press," he said. He said "the press did the attorney-general a very good favor by not printing all he had to say. I think he should retract his statement and apologize to the press. He is leaving the impression that the public press has made statements and accused him of making them. He said even worse than what the press said."

"I heard him tonight. I thought he would retract those statements so Prince Edward Island will not be thought of as the place where the like of this could be said."

AN AFFRONT

Dr. Bonnell said "allowing this to happen" is an affront to the dignity of the Legislature, Her Majesty, the people of the province and the free world.

"The resolution," said Dr. Bonnell, "is 100 per cent in order and unless the attorney-general retracts or apologizes to the House or the premier sees fit to have him resign, I think the man should resign and leave this assembly where we can have justice."

Mr. Matheson, in closing out the debate, said "the statement made by the attorney-general in the press, and the one he read here tonight do not contain one iota of difference. I'll leave it to opinion to decide the issue."

The motion was lost by a vote of 15 to 12.

Fire Destroys Anglican Church

LIVERPOOL, N.S. (CP) — Fire Tuesday destroyed the Anglican Church, a house and a barn at Eagle Head, 10 miles east of here.

Unofficial estimates placed the damage at \$50,000.

Fire departments from Liverpool and Port Medway battled the blaze more than five hours after the alarm shortly before noon. There were no reports of injuries and cause of the blaze is being investigated.
