(Continued from page 1) the light of nuclear deterrents and the changes in the Soviet Union." Precisely how the leaders reshaped their thinking was not disclosed, but the communiqué said the conference welcomed the recent "developments" in the Soviet Union, and hoped for a "progressive improvement" in relations between Russia and the other great powers.

At one point, the joint statement said the prime ministers agreed that the "civil use of nuclear energy constituted a valuable new sphere of co-operation within the Commonwealth." In this connection, it was understood that Canada had outlined her progress in production of the raw material of nuclear energy, uranium. By next year, Canada expects to be one of the world's leading producers of uranium, and hopes to sell considerable quantities under international arrangements.

Canada has put her supplies of uranium in the shop window, one informant said.

NO REPORT ON CHINA The 1,300-word communiqué avoided any mention of one subject discussed by the conference—the admission of Communist China to the United Nations.

A spokesman said: "There is no immediate Commonwealth initiative envisaged on this question. There is no identify of view."

WELCOME FORCES CUT

On the main theme—the meaning of the changes in Russia—the statement said they welcomed the decision of the Soviet government to reduce the numbers of their armed forces, their willingness to facilitate increased contacts between the Soviet Union and other countries, and their expressed desire for improved relations with other governments.

But they believed that the removal of the causes of tension and the creation of mutual confidence and goodwill are essential if peace is to rest on secure foundations. "The governments of the Commonwealth countries will persevere in the search for just and lasting settlements of outstanding international problems," the communiqué said.

"Unless such settlements can be reached, resources which might otherwise be used to improve the lot of man will continue to be devoted to armaments and the fears which impel the peoples of the world to accept the burdens of defence will continue to distract and weaken mankind."

Ship Canned Potatoes To Camp Gagetown

Campbell and Burns, well known canners at Bedouque, have announced that they have shipped to Camp Gagetown the first transfer truckload of canned potatoes. Mr. Burns said that his firm had secured a contract to supply this new product to the camp and also included in the tender is a contract to furnish canned beans.

He stated that this canned potato shipment is a new product from their cannery. The potatoes are shipped in cans containing 12 oz. of the product. Potatoes of small size only are used and are placed in the cans, peeled but uncut, and the container is then sealed. He pointed out that the use of small sized potatoes for this purpose will open a new market for potatoes which hitherto have had no market value.

The shipment which went forward a few days ago will be followed by others to complete the first order for 950 cases of the product from Campbell and Burns Cannery.
