## United Baptist Churches Convention At Cavendish

Sessions of the Prince Edward Island District of United Baptist Churches convened yesterday, in the United Baptist Church in Cavendish, and brought together a goodly number of representatives from different parts of the province. Mr. Reuben Large, Summerside, presided over the sessions in the capacity of Moderator.

One of the important items of business discussed by the delegates concerned the Church extension campaign being currently undertaken by the Maritime United Baptist Convention to provide for the erection of new church-buildings in new communities throughout the Maritime Provinces. Three laymen from the Charlottetown Baptist Church, Mr. Sidney Burhoe, Mr. Charles Scranton, and Dr. J.A. Clarke, presented the proposed program of church extension to the assembled delegates, explaining that within the next two years Maritime United Baptists were being asked to raise, for this purpose, the sum of \$250,000. Mr. Scranton, zone chairman for Prince Edward Island, pointed out that of this amount United Baptists in this province have been requested to raise approximately \$10,000.

Rev. Keith Hobson, Summerside, counseled the delegates to urge the churches not to neglect their annual missionary allocations in the midst of the current drive for Church extension funds. He called to the attention of the delegates the fact that this year's allocation for Prince Edward Island United Baptist Churches — for Denominational enterprises — amounts to \$7,500.

Part of the afternoon session was devoted to foreign missions during which time Mrs. Donald McClure, East Point, presided. Miss Vivian Weldon, missionary-on-furlough from India, presented a panel discussion concerning the work of the Canadian Baptist Foreign Mission Board in India. Those taking part in the discussion included Mrs. T.G. Ives, Charlottetown, Mrs. Charles Scranton, also of Charlottetown, and Mrs. Colin Dixon, East Point. Mrs. H.L. Mitton concluded the Missionary Period by giving a report of the United Baptist Women's Missionary Convention.

## South African Police Seeking Treason Signs

**JOHANNESBURG (Reuters)** — Police Tuesday raided homes and offices of hundreds of South Africans—including whites, Africans and Indians—in a country-wide hunt for evidence of treason or sedition.

Armed with search warrants under the controversial Suppression of Communism Act, the raiders went through offices of Indian and African nationalist organizations. They also investigated homes of individuals ranging from organization leaders to politicians and clergymen.

Piles of documents were seized — many from premises owned by groups which have been loud in their opposition to the South African government's white supremacy policy. But no arrests had been reported by Tuesday night.

Raiders took place in Johannesburg, Pietermaritzburg, Capetown, Port Elizabeth, Durban and other communities.

**SEARCH KAHN HOME** — Among homes searched was that in Capetown of Sam Kahn, who was expelled from the South African Parliament in 1952 under the Suppression of Communism Act. The act gives authorities wide powers to act against persons named by the government as Communists.

Detectives also called on Rev. Trevor Huddleston, an Anglican clergyman and an outspoken opponent of the government racial segregation policy.

Maj. A.T. Spengler, chief of the police special branch, which is in charge of security, said his men had a warrant authorizing them to look for papers affording evidence "as to the commission of an offence of treason or sedition." The warrant also empowered them to remove any documents relating to 48 suspect organizations in South Africa and other parts of the world, including the Indian Congress, the African National Congress and the Communist-backed World Peace Council.

## New Studebaker And Packard Cars On Display

**DETROIT (AP)** — Electrically-activated push-button automatic transmissions, numerous safety features and "the biggest and most powerful V-8 engines in the industry," will feature the 1956 Packard automobiles.

Studebaker will present new V-8 and six-cylinder passenger cars, described by company sources as the biggest and most powerful the company has ever produced; a line of high-powered, sports-type cars; a series of sedan-type station wagons; and a more powerful line of trucks.

**PRESS PREVIEW** — These features were disclosed Tuesday as Studebaker-Packard placed its 1956 line of cars on display for a preview audience of press, radio, television and magazine writers.

Full mechanical and engineering details were not disclosed for publication.

The Packard pushbutton gear shifting device is located on the steering column for righthand operation. An upper row of three buttons provides neutral, low and high gear; a lower row provides a "park" lock, reverse and drive buttons. The high and drive gears provide two ranges of touring speed.

Removal of the ignition key at any gear step automatically locks the car in "park." It cannot be disengaged without replacing the ignition key.

## Power Developments May Boost Maritime Industry

**HALIFAX (CP)** — The day may not be too far distant when the supply and cost of electrical power in the Maritimes—a big factor in attracting new industries—will be on a par with that in the rest of Canada.

A huge development in New Brunswick, new plants in Nova Scotia and plans for the future indicate an increasing supply. There have also been suggestions of an interconnected electrical system between New Brunswick and the state of Maine.

R. E. Tweedale, chairman of the Atlantic provinces economic council's power committee, has said that the cost of electrical power in the Maritimes now is "not too far out of line" and he saw the day when it would approach that in other provinces.

In New Brunswick, work is under way on the \$50,000,000 Beechwood project that is expected to be producing 135,000 horsepower by 1960.

**ONLY BEGINNING** — Premier Hugh John Flemming says this "is only the beginning of the . . . work of harnessing the full potential of the St. John river."

"Furthermore," he said, "plans for more utilization of coal in thermal plants will also go forward in accordance with the balanced and co-ordinated program envisioned by our engineers."

All of this could be a healthy sign in the drive to improve the economic conditions of the Maritimes "in this generation."

Nelson Mann, executive manager of the government-backed economic council, puts it this way: "What is vitally important is that we work to improve the economic picture of our region for future generations."

But he emphasized that conditions could be improved—by cooperation—in this generation. "We may never reach the Canadian average," he told a service club here, "but we certainly must bring our per capita income higher."

## Wife Admits Murder Plot Against Husband

**WEST NEW YORK, N.J. (AP)** — The brunette wife of well-to-do embroidery manufacturer Michael Mortel today admitted her part in what was called an "abortive murder plot" against her husband, police said.

Mrs. Mortel, 38, was charged with atrocious assault and battery and assault with intent to kill and rot along with her brother, Albert Devarti, 35, and Alexander Rafalko, a 37-year-old machinist.

The 43-year-old manufacturer was attacked in the Mortel apartment here Sunday while his wife and brother were at church. He is in hospital, where 39 stitches were taken to close cuts on his head.

Police said the assailants planned to dump Mortel into a bathtub filled with water. Mortel managed to grab a vase and hurled it through a window, apparently scaring off his attackers. Mrs. Mortel said she helped plot the attack because her husband devoted most of his time to the business and was neglecting their married life, police reported.

## Lonardi Says His Job Only Short-term One

**By ALFONSO MAURI** — ARGENTINA (Reuters) — Argentine's new president, Gen. Eduardo Lonardi, said Tuesday his job "is a short-term one aimed solely at putting the Argentine back on the path of democracy as soon as possible."

He also told foreign correspondents it was his "personal wish" that Argentina should sign a concordat with the Vatican.

New Foreign Minister Mario Amadeo had announced earlier that two Catholics expelled by former president Juan Peron now are free to return to Argentina.

The expulsion of Msgr. Manuel Tato, assistant bishop of Buenos Aires and Msgr. Ramon Nova, canon of the Buenos Aires diocese, touched off the rebellion which finally led to Peron's downfall.

Lonardi said the new government has no intention of meddling in anyway with the Peron-nurtured labor unions. There will be no discriminatory action taken against the Peronista party, the new president said, provided it worked within the normal confines of democracy and Republican procedure.
