

Abbies Gain Overtime 6-5 Victory In Game With Saints Last Night

Forward Willie Dunn scored on a 35-foot screened shot after 19 seconds of sudden-death overtime to give the Abbies a 6-5 win over Saint Dunstan's University in a hard fought City League hockey game at the Forum last night.

Dunn took a pass from Jack "Spy" Ready as he crossed the Saints' blueline and his low drive struck a defenseman's leg and bounded into the net. The goal was the second of the evening for the hard working Dunn.

The Abbies went into an early lead and then had to come from behind to force the game into overtime. Playing coach Cecil Dowling on a pass from Bill Ledwell scored the tying goal shortly past the midway mark of the third period.

The Saints trailed 3-1 at the end of the first period but the A. J. MacAdam coached Collegians drew within a goal of the Abbies in the second period and went ahead in the first half of the third.

Big Lewis MacDonald, played a from defensive game for the Abbies and scored two goals on drives from inside the blueline to pace the Collegians attack. Rodney MacInnis, Lloyd Gaudet and Roy were the other S.D.U. marksmen.

Forwards Harold Howatt, John Richard and defenseman John MacDougall were the other Abbies' scorers. MacDougall and Howatt connected in the first period while Richard scored the Abbies only goal of the third. Dunn opened and closed the scoring for the winners.

Carl Erskine Signs Contract With Dodgers

BROOKLYN, (AP)—Carl Erskine who set a record of strikeouts against the New York Yankees in the 1953 World Series, signed his 1954 Brooklyn baseball contract Tuesday.

Salary terms were not disclosed but the 27-year-old righthander is believed to have received a substantial increase over his reported \$19,000 salary of last year. The 1954 figure probably is close to \$25,000.

Erskine became the 29th Dodger to come to terms, leaving first baseman Gil Hodges as the only Dodger regular not signed.

Four other National League clubs also announced signings Tuesday, along with the Detroit Tigers.

The Milwaukee Braves' No. 1 catcher, Del Crandall, came to terms for a reported \$15,000. Walker Cooper, veteran catcher released by Milwaukee, signed with Pittsburgh Pirates.

Catcher Forrest (Smoky) Burgess signed with the Philadelphia Phillies. Detroit Tigers received signed contracts from pitchers Al Aber and Bob Cruze and infielder John Baumgartner.

The New York Giants added two pitchers, lefthander Dave Koslo and righthander Al Corwin, to their list.

"He, Brooks, has all the moves of greatness and had the cruel elegance of Ray Robinson when he was just beginning," wrote Jimmy Cannon in the New York Post.

Road Wide Open

Those are ringing words for a 20-year-old scrapper with only nine professional fights—even if he did win the Olympic flyweight title at Helsinki in 1952.

The road ahead seems wide open for Brooks. He has a March 22 date with Pappy Gault whom Peacock beat for his title in August. Then he'll have to give Peacock a return bout May 3.

On the horizon is a chance for the world championship, now held by Australian Jimmy Carruthers. There is talk that Carruthers, recently sidelined by stomach trouble, may no longer be able to make the 118-pound bantam limit.

Mailman Wins 1st Heat Of Annual Dog Derby

OTTAWA, (CP)—A wiry, 33-year-old Gatineau Point, Que., mailman who sometimes uses his team to deliver mail, Tuesday won the first heat of Ottawa's annual two-day 66-mile international sled-dog derby.

Ernest Brunet, who won six district trials here as a warm-up for the big race, drove his six cross-bred hounds across the finish line with a time of three hours and 38 seconds.

His time was 20 seconds better than that posted by 48-year-old Emile Martel of Loretteville, Que., winner of the 1951 derby, who finished second.

Dr. Charles Belford, Deerfield, Mass., driving 11 Siberian huskies, came home third with a time of 3:05:10. Alex Gagneau of Quebec City, was fourth with 3:09:45 and Don McFaul of Maniwaki, Que., fifth with 3:13:32.

A trifle exhausted after the long trek, Brunet said he found the course very good except for a few potholes on the rideau canal.

Brunet is a harness racer in the summer.

Wife (Pit) Lepine, 33, of Quebec City, who captured the major prize in the derby in 1950 and 1952, bowed out of the race before the halfway mark. No reason was given for his pulling out, but it is believed he was having trouble with some of his dogs.

Another former winner, Big Bill Shearer of East Jaffray, N.H., victor in 1949, was scratched at the last minute when a telegram arrived saying he could not make it.

Three other drivers were scratched shortly before the race. They were Roger Boulianne, Hull, Que., Ted Lemieux, Maniwaki, Que., and Bill Giguere, Quebec City.

Call Them Way I See Them, Scorer Declares

DETROIT, (CP)—"I call them the way I see them" was the terse comment today of Ross Jewell, official scorer at Olympia Stadium, who had been accused of giving "cheap" assists to Gordie Howe of the Detroit Red Wings.

Jewell answered charges made by coach Dick Irvin of Montreal Canadiens who said at New York Monday night that "Howe would never be leading the National Hockey League if they had an impartial scorer at Detroit."

Jewell was asked what he thought of Irvin's charge.

"Nothing Mr. Irvin could say, or do, would surprise or disturb me. I call them the way I see them."

Irvin said also that "every time there's a Red Wing goal while Howe is on the ice at Detroit he almost automatically gets an assist." He added that it was ridiculous to compare Howe with Canadiens' Maurice Richard who trails the Red Winger in the scoring race.

Howe holds down the No. 1 position with 58 points on 21 goals and 37 assists. Richard is next with 52 points on 32 goals and 20 assists.

None At Montreal

A look at Howe's assist figures are interesting. He has received 24 on Olympia ice and 13 on the road. He has received at least two assists on every rink in the league except the Montreal Forum, where he hasn't been credited with one.

In New York general manager Jack Adams of the Red Wings admitted to bet on Jewell that the Detroit scorer is "twice as good as the one at Montreal." Adams suggested a \$200 wager, to be decided by an impartial judge, with the winner giving the money to his favorite charity.

"I don't mind if he wants to praise Richard," said Adams. "Richard is a great player—and a bad newspaper man. Nobody on our club would say anything against him. But you've got to give Howe those assists. He's the one who handles the puck all the time and sets up the plays."

"The other night against New York Rangers, Marty Pavelich and Howe caught them with only one man back. Howe could have walked in to score, but he set Pavelich up for the kill. Everywhere I heard people saying, 'I wonder if Richard would do that.'"

"When somebody asked Howe about scoring 50 goals, he said, 'I'll settle for 25 if 22 will win hockey games.'"

"That's the kind of kid he is. I'll still make my bet."

Richard, in his controversial ghost-written column, had questioned the scoring at Detroit's home games. The column was discontinued a couple of weeks ago.

"I never had any criticism of my scoring before," Jewell said. "I confer with the referee on all goals."

"I don't recall ever giving an assist when it wasn't deserved. Sure, I've made mistakes—but who doesn't? The only ones who don't make mistakes are those who do nothing."

"If I have doubt in my mind about a goal or assist, I'll go into the dressing room after the game and talk with the players."

"But I won't go near the Montreal dressing room. They're not gentlemen down there and they don't treat me like a gentleman. Several times Richard has complained to me about the scoring."

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Miami Fighter To Meet German In Heavyweight Bout

MIAMI, Fla., (AP)—Promoter Earl Nanny of Chicago reported Tuesday he has signed Ralph Snyder of Miami to meet Hein Ten Hoff, German fighter, in a 10-round heavyweight match at Cincinnati March 2.

The winner, said Nanny, will fight Ezzard Charles, leading heavyweight contender, at a time and place to be decided.

Snyder fought Roland La Starza at Miami two years ago and lost by a close decision.

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
