

# Braves Defeat Pirates; Brooks Lose To Cubs

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Henry Aaron and Eddie Mathews clouted consecutive homers in the fourth inning Tuesday night as the league-leading Milwaukee Braves grabbed a 4-3 victory over Pittsburgh Pirates.

The homers, Aaron's 40th and Mathews' 31st of the season, gave the Braves a 1957 total of 182, tying the team's all-time record for home runs in a single season.

The record was set in 1955. CHICAGO (AP) — Ernie Banks hammered a pair of homers, good for four runs in a 13-hit Chicago Cub attack Tuesday that overthrew Brooklyn Dodgers 9-2.

The Cubs scored in three-run clusters in the first, third and sixth innings while pounding four Dodger pitchers and backing rookie Dick Drott to a 14-11 season record. Drott yielded seven

hits and struck out four batters. BOSTON (AP) — Boston Red Sox wavered in the ninth inning Tuesday night but defeated the White Sox 7-4, dropping the second place Chicagoans six games in back of the American League leading New York Yankees, who were rained out.

The Red Sox, with their ace Tom Brewer pitching well, carried

a 7-1 lead into the ninth. CINCINNATI (AP) — Three-hit pitching of Brooks Lawrence and a two-run homer by rookie Joe Taylor Tuesday night helped hoist Cincinnati Redlegs to a 4-1 victory over New York's Giants.

Lawrence, notching his 14th triumph against 11 losses, went all the way for the Reds, walking four Giants and fanning two.

### Nice Guys Finish Last

Today's story will be about that rugged Nebraskan, known to all wrestling fans as Jack Pesek.

People who ask Pesek about his rough-house tactics in the ring, get this answer hurled back at them: "Nice guys finish last." The big 6 foot 4 inch 240 lb. Nebraskan has all the physical equipment and background to swap wrestling holds or punches with anyone who will get into the ring with him.

Friendly outside the ring, Jack maintains there are no friends in the wrestling ring. Regardless of his opponents, big Jack is guided by the principle "Do unto others before they do unto you."

Jack's father is Joch Pesek, former world heavyweight champion and one of the truly great wrestlers of this century. Under the tutelage of his famous father from age six onward, Jack has absorbed his wrestling lessons well, as any of his ring opponents will testify.

Wrestling is by no means the only athletic achievement Jack Pesek can claim. He was three-sport letterman in high school—football, basketball and track. He played end of the University of Nebraska for three years,

and was an all-conference choice in his sophomore year as well as being one of the three top punters in the nation during that year.

Of course, professional football followed this brilliant college career and he played with the Los Angeles Rams and the Detroit Lions.

Pesek will be trying for the \$100,000 which Dick Hutton has offered when he takes on Hutton this Thursday evening at the Sports Arena in Charlotteville.

## Spahn And Turley Lead Leagues In ERA So Far

NEW YORK (AP) — Southpaw Spahn of Milwaukee Braves and righthander Bob Turley of New York Yankees, who could be the opposing pitchers in the opening game of the world series next month, lead the major leagues in the earned run ratings Tuesday.

Spahn, who won the National League championship in 1947 with a 2.33 era and in 1953 with 2.10, again heads his circuit with 2.75. In his last 60 innings, the veteran has yielded only 10 earned runs for a 1.43 average.

Spahn has won 19 games and lost eight and has pitched four shutouts. He has been a 20-game winner seven times.

Turley tops the American League with an average of 2.38, according to statistics compiled by the Associated Press. The 27-year-old fireballer has won 11 games against five setbacks and has yielded 42 untainted tallies in 159 frames. He also has four shutouts.

### Name Appeared Frequently

Sir, — James Fendergast's name appeared quite frequently in the American Papers in the early 1900. The following is a series of clippings clipped from leading daily newspapers which no doubt will be of interest to the boxing fraternity for this province especially the old timers.

The Boston Globe has the following: "Jim Fendergast of the Dorchester, Mass. athlete and boxer arrived home yesterday from Fairbanks, Alaska, where he has been located for the past two years. Fendergast was very fortunate in his business and also in the prize ring, fighting eight or ten bouts winning all of them."

The Dawson City Daily News spoke of him as "The best all round athlete that ever came to the Yukon. As he came through New York on his way from the north the New York Sun in referring to Jim said Athletes of the New West Side A.C. will remember Jim Fendergast the big athlete who raised such a furor in heavy-weight throwing circles in Madison Square Gardens in 1906-1907. Fendergast has boxed a number of the very clever men including Jack Quin Sullivan, Bill Bates, Matt Allan, Jim Stewart, Bert Kenny, Jack Leon and Jim Smart. Here's a headline:

1906. Boxing fans in Chelsea, Mass were entertained to a series of great bouts last night at the local arena. The participants in the main event were Jimmy Walsh and Abe Attell, the latter was awarded the decision at the end of 15 hard fought rounds. Featured in the semi-final were Jim Fendergast and Billy Payne of Philadelphia in the first round Jim hurt Billy with a sizzling hard left right combination and in the second he caught Payne coming in and planted a straight left to his chin which shook the invader down to his toes, the referee didn't even bother to count Payne out. Mr. Fendergast can still recall the day of the fight, Boston was clear of snow, with weather as mild as is usual in March or April. That was back in 1906 and Big Jim will sit and talk boxing for hours, its over 40 years ago since he fought in the squared circle but the memories are still fresh and much cherished by the former Prince Edward Island heavy weight champion.

MONTREAL (CP)—Two players acquired by New York Yankees of the American League are among the eight nominated for the International League's most-valuable-player award. It was announced Tuesday.

They are Bobby Del Greco, former Montreal Royals outfielder, and Jerry Lumpe, former Richmond Virginians third-baseman.

Baseball writers in each of the eight league cities nominated the player to represent the local team.

## 12,000 Rural Mail Carriers Are Warned

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's 12,000 rural mail carriers have been warned to refrain from political activities or else lose their contracts with the federal government.

Santo Chartrand, director of transportation in the postmaster-general's department, said Tuesday the warning appears to have been accepted without comment by the carriers.

It was approved by Postmaster-General William Hamilton a month ago, he said, and dispatched to the various postal districts. District directors of postal services were to circulate the warning, which embraces both provincial and federal politics.

TORONTO (CP) — Jack Kent Cooke, owner of Toronto Maple Leafs of the International League, formally applied Tuesday for a National League baseball franchise.

The application was made on the assumption that the eight-team National League will expand to 10 teams.

"I understand from reliable sources that a group of wealthy men in New York is seeking a ninth franchise for the National League in the event that Brooklyn moves to Los Angeles," Cooke said. "On the basis of these reports the Toronto ball club decided to take immediate action in order to be the first to take advantage of a 10-team league."

The application was sent to National League president Warren Giles and baseball commissioner Ford Frick.
