

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31. Official Bulletin, 2.30 a.m.—The President passed a tranquil night, and this morning his condition is quite as favorable as yesterday at the same hour. Pulse 100; temperature 98.4; respiration 18.

Executive Mansion—Secretary Blaine sent the following to Minister Lowell, tonight:—

Mr. Lowell, Minister, London: The President had less fever this evening than upon any previous evening since he was wounded. The temperature at 6 o'clock was normal. The entire day has been most encouraging in all his symptoms. Hereafter I shall send but one report daily.

Unofficial Bulletin, Executive Mansion, 9.30, p.m.—Dr. Reymann reports that the condition has not materially changed. During the evening his pulse has fallen and all the symptoms continue favorable.

New York, Aug. 31. A Washington special says Gen. Sherman is so confident that the President will not have another relapse that he intends leaving Washington to-day, to be absent ten days.

San Francisco, Aug. 31. A despatch from Sierafilla, Sierra Co., says that a fire broke out to-day and the whole town has been destroyed. The losses will reach at least \$30,000. The store of Nichols & Co. is now burning and about fifty kegs of powder is inside. An explosion is momentarily expected. A two-year old child was burned to death.

Savannah, Ga., Aug. 31. Sixteen more inquests were held to-day on the bodies of persons drowned in the storm. This makes 46 so far. The bodies of a white man, woman and child, have been washed ashore at Tybee. Quite a number of bodies are on plantations near the city. The coroner will hold inquests to-morrow.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

Dublin, Aug. 31. Mr. Thomas Sexton, speaking at to-day's meeting of the Land League, said before the country settled down, the emergency committee of the property defence association should be disbanded. Mr. Sexton repeated that the League would not be satisfied until landlordism was altogether destroyed.

Mr. Parnell, speaking in the County Tyrone, to-day, said the bill the leaguers wanted was one which would give the landlords and tenants severally what they had respectively put into the land.

LONDON, Aug. 31. The "Times" Cork correspondent asserts that the attack upon the tenants of Sir Geo. Colthurst on Sunday was exaggerated. It is believed there was only fifteen persons in the attacking party. Only one person was wounded by a bullet; four others were hurt slightly.

LONDON, Sept. 1. The "Standard" announces that in consequence of the disturbed relations between French and English residents of Newfoundland, more magistrates will be appointed along the coast to preserve order.

LONDON, Aug. 31. A steamer will leave Dover to-day to make another attempt to raise the sunken German war steamer Grosser Kurfurst.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

Cape Town, Aug. 31. The Union Mail steamer Teuton with 200 souls on board, including passengers and crew, has been wrecked near Quoin Point. Only 27 persons were saved in the steamers boats. The British corvette Dido has proceeded to the scene of the wreck. The Teuton arrived at Cape Town from England on Monday, landed some and embarked other passengers, and proceeded on her voyage to Algoa Bay and other ports. Quoin Point is near Algoa Bay, and is the scene of the previous wreck of a Union Mail steamer.

LATER.

LONDON, Sept. 1. The Standard's despatch from Cape Town states that the wrecked steamer Teuton had on board 147 passengers and a crew of 80 persons. The vessel struck a rock, but floated off, and was in the act of putting back to port when she sank. A majority of those on board perished. All of the officers were drowned.

Lloyd's correspondent at Cape Town says that three boats were lowered, one of which foundered alongside the steamer, and the other two have arrived at Simonstown containing 23 of a crew and four passengers. The Union Mail Steamship Company state that 12 of the passengers of the Teuton have been saved.

LATER.

LONDON, Sept. 1. The Union Mail Steamship Company state that the Captain of the Teuton struggled in the water for some time but finally sank.

A despatch from Capetown says the Teuton's boats, which arrived at Simonstown, lay on their sides till daylight, but nothing was then to be seen, and it is feared that the third boat, with fifteen women and children on board, is lost.

BERLIN, Aug. 31.

Fifteen Socialists have been expelled from Berlin, it is supposed for connection with the propaganda in favor of Babel's election.

TUNIS, Aug. 31.

The French are sending troops by sea and land to occupy Hammamet. Many Arabs are said to be hovering around one of the French columns.

GENEVA, Aug. 31. The new Russian paper entitled The Free World has been started. It advocates constitutional government and is equally opposed to revolution and reaction.

LONDON, Aug. 31.

The Times says the feeling gains ground that the gold drain to America has died away for the present.

TUNIS, Aug. 31.

Two battalions of French troops have embarked at Golots for the purpose of occupying Hammamet. It is stated that Gen. Correard's column has again been attacked by a large force of Arabs at Sourki

LONDON, Aug. 31.

Reuter's despatch from Bombay says intelligence has been received from Candahar that Ayoub Khan will march on Thursday with seven weak regiments. The Ameer is rapidly advancing. The celerity of his movements has caused a marked change in his favor throughout the country.

The release of Russian officers, who were detected while surreptitiously inspecting fortifications in Galicia recently, was by the official order of the Austrian Emperor.

BERLIN, Aug. 31.

At the International Chess Congress on Tuesday, Blackburn of England played Berger Gratz, and Luckertor played Wienaw of Berlin. Both games were drawn.

The steamer Suevia for New York took out £64,000 in gold.

LONDON, Aug. 31.

The Pall Mall Gazette hears that £660,000 in gold was quietly shipped to America from Hamburg, yesterday.

LONDON, Sept. 1.

It is estimated that the value of the gold obtained in open market yesterday, for shipment on to-morrow's steamer, does not fall far short of £100,000.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

Sir,—The Scott Act has been in force one month. The Temperance men have worked and struggled to have this act put in force in the city, and now when that has been accomplished, and an inspector appointed, they are waiting for results, and are seriously asking themselves: What are the duties of the Inspectors? Do they commence and end with the drawing of the violators of the law, and receive his salary, and shirk his part of the duty, if it is his duty? Judging from what has been effected so far, the Scott Act is a failure, or the enforcement of it is! It is a noted fact that there is very near as much liquor drunk as ever, and that it is not all got by the innumerable invalids that through the drug stores, nor all purchased from the vendors. Are there not saloons in this city selling over the counter as openly as ever? And cannot the inspector see this? Or is he waiting for someone else to lay the information, while he draws the pay? If that is so, we could just as well dispense with his services. For my part, I am charitable enough to believe that he lives so far from the city, that it is totally impossible for him to attend to his official business, as most of the liquor selling and drinking is done after he is at home, indeed five miles away. Others judge him perhaps hardly, and hint that the \$50 which the members of the Licensing Board each receive, has a certain attraction for our worthy inspector; and that should he move in the matter now, the liquor interests of Charlottetown would be against him being elected to fill another position where the value of the work was less than the pay. A definite explanation of the duties of Inspector would be in order; and the temperance men would then know how to act. As it is at present, the people have very vague ideas in regard to it.
