Lieut.-Governor To Open Provincial Swimming Meet At S'side Today

His Honor Lieutenant-Governor J. A. Bernard will officially open the Provincial swimming and diving meet to be held at the Marine Wharf, Summerside starting at two o'clock this afternoon. His Worship Mayor Henry Wedge will also be present and speak briefly.

This Provincial meet is being held at the bathing house operated by the Summerside Y's Men's Club and is the climax of their activities in the interest of the particular line of athletics for the year. The last two years the club held a county meet which were very successful and this year they have broadened the scope of their activities to take in the whole Province.

Competitors in this meet will be the first and second place winners in the county meets which were held earlier. In addition to the swimming and diving exhibitions given by competent performers.

In the evening there will be a banquet in the Olympia Restaurant for all those taking part at which the trophies and ribbons will be presented. Should the weather be unfit today the meet will be postponed till Labor Day which is next Monday. However, all preparations have been made to carry out the affair today.

A large crowd is expected to be on hand and a small admission fee will be charged. For the past several years the Y's Men's Club has made possible swimming facilities for the children and adults of the town which were never available before. They also conduct swimming classes and this summer a large number of children passed their swimming tests.

The children of the town now will have an opportunity to learn to swim. After Labor Day the bathing house will be closed down for the season.—S.

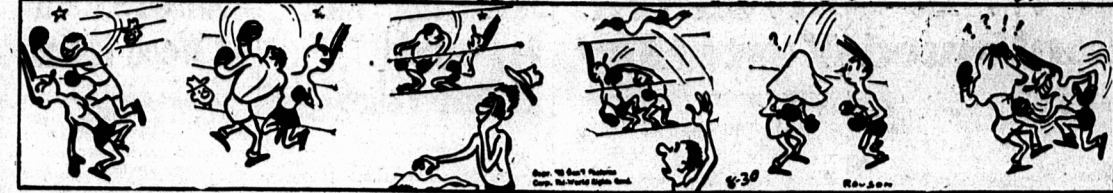

With summer vacation just about over for another year and City youngsters preparing for their back-to-school movement for the fall and winter terms, local minor league baseball officials hope to have their playoffs wound up and their Midget and Bantam City League champions declared by early next week.

In the three-team Bantam division, the North and West End teams played a sudden death semi-final till last evening to decide the winner who will meet the East End aggregation in a best two out of three game final series for the City championship. Although this column was written before the game was decided, the winning team, whether it be North or West, will meet the Easterners in the first game of the finals tonight, with the second game of the series scheduled for Friday evening. If a third and deciding game is necessary, it will be played Saturday afternoon at two o'clock.

With the first game of the Midget City playoffs already concluded in their best of five final, the second game will get underway on Thursday evening, and the third is slated for Monday evening. Fourth and fifth games, if necessary, will be played on Tuesday and Wednesday. If good playing weather prevails, Wednesday at the latest, will see the minor league champions declared, to pave the way for the Provincial playdowns in those divisions.

In order to get all the leagues wound up on or about school starting time, it is hoped that the City champions will meet with the Provincial Western League winners for the Island titles in both divisions by the following week. Both City leagues have been playing smart ball during their schedules, and it is expected that there will be some really hot minor sessions when the City winners meet with the Western champions for Island titles.

Judging from the number of events already scheduled, it looks like next Monday, Labor Day, is going to be a full one in the way of sporting activity, when horse racing, track and field, boxing and bicycle racing will head the program, notwithstanding of course, the possible ball games, tennis and golf which will likely be scheduled for those dates.

The big events scheduled for the City area will be the Meritine Track and Field championships at Memorial Field in the afternoon and the two-mile bicycle race being sponsored by The Bike Shop in the morning. Both have all the prospects of being top-notch events for keen competition and smart sporting entertainment.

The big meet of the year for the three seaside Provinces, the Maritime Track and Field championships will bring together the cream of Maritime athletes as Granville Hunter River, Emerald Junction, Parkdale and Saint Avaris. A few have been received from the City Mr. Burns said, but not nearly as many as had been anticipated.

However, he hopes that the City entries will still be in during the few remaining days before the meet, and urges all those who are contemplating taking part, to get their entries by Saturday at the latest, so that he and his presiding officials, can allow for the amount of transportation, etc. that will be needed to have everybody at the starting point, some 20 miles out the Malpeque Road, at the appointed time.

It is a grand prize that he is offering the winner, a beautiful C. M. (roadster) bicycle, and \$10 and \$5 vouchers for sporting equipment to the second and third place riders. So boys, why not take a go at it. It is really worth trying for. And remember—whether you are a junior entrant or not you will still have a good chance to win, because the race is so on a handicap basis, which will give all riders up to four minutes start over more experienced entrants.

Negro Girl Provides Big Surprise At U. S. Tennis Tournament

FOREST HILLS, N.Y., Aug. 29—(AP)—Lightning knocked a six-foot concrete eagle off the top of the tennis stadium today a matter of minutes after Athena Gibson, 23-year-old Negro girl from New York City, had come within an ace or two of striking the tennis world speechless.

Miss Gibson, the first of her race ever to play in the title meet, was leading blonde Louise Brough of Beverly Hills, the reigning Wimbledon queen, 7-6, in the third and deciding set when nature took a hand. The skies opened like a sluice gate for some 15 minutes.

As 6,000 fans huddled under the stands, a vivid bolt cut one of the huge ornamental birds clearly from its pedestal and shattered it on the walkway 50 feet below. No one was injured.

But if the tall Miss Gibson continues to play tomorrow as she was playing just before the storm hit, she will knock the national women's tennis picture into pieces.

Playing only her fourth match on grass and nervous, the girl from Florida A. and M. dropped the first set to her famous opponent, 1-6 before 1,500 fans in the grandstand court.

She trailed 2-3 in the second set, and then she began banging her backhand with the same speed as her fine forehand. She ran it out at 6-3 as the crowd applauded.

Miss Brough looked a determined woman as she slammed her way to a 4-1 lead in the third set. Some of the fans started to leave but Miss Gibson broke service as she moved up to 6-5, squared it at 5-5 with another break and then led 6-5 and 7-6.

That is how they will resume play at 12:45 P. M. E. D. T. tomorrow, with Miss Brough serving.

Whatever the eventual outcome, it is clear that another tennis star has joined the women's firmament. Within another year, at the latest, Miss Gibson probably will have moved high into the ranking of the U. S. first 10.
