As Exports Increase

LONDON (Reuters) — The Conservative government is summing itself in a surprise economic success as an increase in exports that marked the first victory in its policy of expansion after two years of standstill.

March trade figures, published last week, exports soared to a record and the trade gap—the difference between exports and imports—came near the lowest ever.

Exports and re-exports in seasonally adjusted figures for March totalled £361,000,000 (\$1,083,000,000) — an increase of £27,000,000 (\$81,000,000) over February imports, at £384,000,000 (\$1,162,000,000), advanced only £2,000,000 (\$12,000,000). The £23,000,000 (\$69,000,000) gap was the smallest in two years.

The figures pleased the government and British business circles because signs of an upward trend in the economy were slow to appear despite a series of pump-priming measures by treasury chief Reginald Maudling during the last few weeks.

Most encouraging feature of the export surge was that while exports fell under way imports seemed still under control.

The stock market reacted buoyantly to the March performance, with industrial shares bringing its index of representative samples to the highest level in 19 months.

U.S. Bill Seen Aimed At Canadian Lumber

WASHINGTON (CP) — The U.S. government has rushed to Canada's support in condemning a proposed bill which would increase duties on imported Canadian goods.

The legislation, approved by the House of Representatives but bottled up in the Senate committee, would force U.S. importers and distributors to stamp the country of origin on imported and repackaged goods.

It also would require all Canadian lumber sold in the U.S. to be marked with the country of origin, a move which U.S. lumbermen attempted to push through the U.S. tariff commission but were turned down.

HURT MAIN INDUSTRIES
The Canadian government told the U.S. in an aide memoire dated March 19 that marking of Canadian lumber with the country of origin would run counter to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade and would conflict with long-standing contractual undertakings of the U.S. to Canada whereby lumber is exempted from marks-of-origin requirements.

The aide memoire, published in the transcript of committee hearings held last month, said also the general provisions of the bill would seriously endanger many Canadian exports to the U.S., specifically fruits and goods which are normally shipped in bulk for repackaging in the U.S.

four aces are played on the first trick. Several hands of this type have been composed, and I offer here this one, which is listed originally by the late and great Robert Darvas.

South is declarer at seven spades and West leads the ace of hearts. Observe what a happy trump bump in his hand instead of in dummy. East discards a diamond and South ruffs with the ace of diamonds.

South, of course, discards the opening trick this consists of the ace of spades from West, the ace of spades from North, the ace of diamonds from West, the ace of diamonds from South!

Declarer then cashes the K-Q of spades in his hand four club losers, and this fulfills his mission.

There is no moral connected with this tale, since the hand is purely imaginary and not likely to be dealt in real life, but if ever you are dealt one of these four hands, please play your part and ruff an ace on the opening trick.

7 Years Given In Slaying Case

OTTAWA (CP)—Gerald Thibault, 67, has been sentenced to seven years in penitentiary for manslaughter in the Sept. 9 death of hotel cashier Bliss Carmen Barrett.

Mr. Justice Donnelly directed the jury to return a verdict of guilty on 138 original charge of capital murder but guilty on 138 original charge of manslaughter.
