Letter From Mr. Fullerton.

BELMONT, Feb. 3, 1900.

My DEAR MR. JAMES, I have just time to scribble a line as we are ordered off instantly to the front. The movement, whatever it may portend, is a huge one, indeed, as the whole of the seventh division, with additional cavalry and artillery, have moved up this week. We are now starting on a 30-mile march and have from now (4 p.m.) till Monday morning early to cover the ground. I am glad for the sake of the men, for they would all feel it ridiculous after receiving such a royal send-off, if they saw no fighting at all.

Something must give away this week and I feel morally certain that Kimberley and Ladysmith are sure to be relieved, then I think it will mean a speedy surrender and right about face for home.

The Islanders are building a redoubt some 12 miles from here, and I have not seen any of them for a fortnight. Should they not write it is for want of opportunity, so you can inform any who may miss a note from their boys that this is the reason. Remember me to all. Yours in great haste.

CHIEF STAFF OFFICER.

Immense crowds thronged the streets to witness the military parade yesterday morning's composed of the South African Volunteers, Co's. 1 and 2 Artillery, Co's. 1 and 3, 82nd Batt. and the Charlottetown Engineers. The parade was headed by the Artillery band. Arriving at the First Methodist church, the militia occupied the central pews. Rev. G. M. Campbell preached a very eloquent and patriotic sermon, taking as his text Deuteronomy 7: 6-8. The music was of a high standard. The choir was considerably enlarged, and had several officers in it.

INFORMATION GIVEN.

SIR,—Taxpayer from Pownal wants to know if it is the province as a whole or the city of Charlottetown that will have to pay the extra cost on the bridge if put in the proper place, namely, Cumberland Street site. In reply, would say the Dominion Government will have to pay the extra cost, as it is no more than they should do,—as the city and province as a whole will reap the benefit. As for getting the bridge near Prowse Bros. store, the taxpayer doesn't live in Pownal if he is not aware of the fact that the closer the bridge comes to Prowse Bros. the better for the people on that side of the river. The little sum they will have to pay in taxes will not amount to a row of beans in comparison with what they could save by placing the bridge so that this end would come right up to our door.

If we consulted our own personal interests, like some of our friends, we would try and pull for the Shipyard Point site, as we have ten times the stake on Grafton street that we have here. But we want to see the bridge where it will be the most benefit to the largest number of people and we are willing to sacrifice our own interests, and even our party's, if needs be, rather than see the people hoodwinked in this matter.

FIRES.—The alarm on Saturday night about eleven o'clock was for a fire in Weeks & Warren's boot and shoe store on Grafton street. The firm had upwards of \$6,000 worth of stock in the store, all of which is more or less damaged by fire, water or smoke. There is insurance for about half this amount in companies represented by D. B. Stewart and E. H. Beer. The building was also damaged, but the loss is covered by insurance held by Mr. F. W. Hyndman. The fire is believed to have started among some boots piled on a table over which the storekeeper passes to the chimney, as there was a hole in the pipe near the elbow. The alarm yesterday morning was for a slight fire in a house on Bayfield Street, caused by a defective flue.

CHARLOTTETOWN TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

The regular fortnightly meeting of the Charlottetown Teachers' Association was held in the parlor of the Y. M. C. A., on Saturday 10th inst. Shortly after 8 o'clock President Landrigan took the chair, and read some selections from Landon's School management. The points emphasized by the author, and which were discussed by the teachers' present, were the importance of cultivating in the pupils' spirit of charity—not to compare themselves with others to the detriment of others (and the exaltation of themselves—the importance of exact truthfulness on the part of pupil, in act as well as in word, that the gravity of any offence is immeasurably increased by deceitful conduct in trying to hide the fault or palliate the offence. The discussion of the different points was animated and was participated in by a larger number than usual. 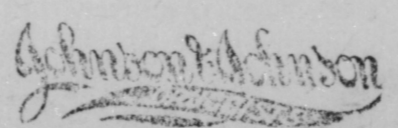

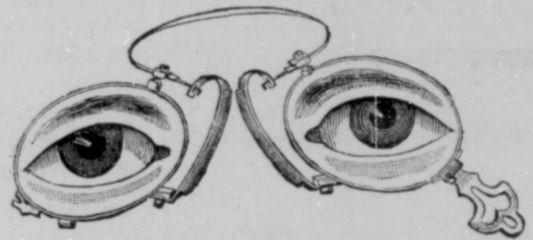
