LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.
Letter from Hon. Wm. Campbell.

SIR.—I see by the *Daily Patriot*, of 2nd
and 3rd inst., that the editor of that paper
has been publishing some very remarkable
figures to show his friends why they should
vote for Mr. Leitch at the coming Council
Election. In the issue of the 2nd he pub-
lishes a statement taken from the Journals
of the Legislative Council, in which he
endeavors to show that we have eaten up
\$199,844 of our capital. I need not tell
you, Sir, that that report is not official, but
gotten up by the Opposition in the Upper
House for purposes of their own, and not
vouched for by any sworn officer. It,
however, makes little difference to Mr.
Leitch whether the figures be correct or not,
so long as they serve his ends; he will
scruple at nothing that will assist him and
his party in power to give them a chance
to flee the country again, so he is not
satisfied with the cooked figures of his
friends in the Council, but draws consider-
ably on his own imagination, and kindly
tells us that the Sullivan Government have
run the country into debt \$100,000 up to
the end of 1885. Good, Mr. Leitch! that
is a pretty fair whopper, but nothing to
what you are capable of telling in the lefty
flights of your imagination. Had Mr.
Leitch been satisfied to have stopped with
this lump sum, some persons might possibly
have been deceived; but in the *Daily*
of the 3rd he goes into details which com-
pletely expose the falsity of his previous
statements. What do we find in those de-
tails but that the present Government, for
their six years of office, have drawn from
capital only \$457; as for the rest of his
figures they are entirely incorrect, as I shall
proceed to show.

I now propose to give you a financial
statement as taken from the certified official
records from the year 1876, when Mr.
Davies came into power, to the 31st Dec.
1884, the date of the last official report
which has been placed before the public,
and I shall leave an intelligent people to
judge as to the correctness of Mr. Leitch's
figures, and which Government has plunged
this Province in debt.
When Mr. Davies came into power, to-
wards the close of 1876, there was a
balance in favor of the Province of \$40,604.
Mr. Davies, in 1877, collected from the
people of this country:—

Land Office receipts.....	\$ 78,506
Arrears old Land Tax.....	12,500
Under Assessment Act.....	20,000
Total collected in 1877.....	\$111,006

In the foregoing amount I do not include
the Poll Tax, as we have not, in our term
of office, collected such a tax, but substi-
tuted the Statute Labor in lieu. Mr.
Davies collected in 1878:—

Land Office receipts.....	\$ 51,379
Arrears of Assessment.....	2,290
Assessment, 1878.....	25,112
Total collected in 1878.....	79,781
Collected in 1877.....	121,406
Total collected in two years by the Davies Government.....	\$201,267

Or a yearly average of \$100,628.
Mr. Leitch's party, which he now asks the
people to support as the men who will
economize the resources of the Province,
went out of power after two years of ex-
travagant mismanagement and misrule,
having used up the balance of \$40,000 in
appendix N; or, in other words, after run-
ning the country in debt to the tune of
\$92,345.

I now propose to give a statement of the
amounts collected by the present govern-
ment during their six financial years, and
the average per year as compared with the
Editor of the *Patriot's* party of economy.
In that statement all arrears of poll tax are
included so as to give our opponents no
room to find fault, as I consider our finan-
cial record quite good enough even if we
do give them a little advantage on their
side.

The present Government having light-
ened the burdens of the people by a yearly
average of \$34,500, having expended \$40,-
000 in 1884 for education more than Mr.
Davies paid in 1878; having paid for the
maintenance of the Asylum, Poor House
and paupers \$9,158 more in 1884 than in
1878, and \$3,485 more to improve the
ferries for the accommodation of the pub-
lic, we find the balance against the Province
to be (1884) \$54,657; balance left by Davies
Government, 1879, \$51,740; increase of
deficit in six years of present Govern-
ment only \$2,917, showing that
we have run the Island into debt,
in six years, only \$2,917, while Mr.

Davies ran it in debt in two years, (taking
into account the \$40,604 in favor of the
Province when he came into power),
\$92,344. Yet these are the men whom Mr.
Leitch wishes the property holders of this
country to restore to power by voting for
Mr. Leitch. These figures, I submit, are
sufficiently plain to show the taxpayers
who are the best persons to protect their
interests—those who have managed affairs
for the last six years, taking out of your
pocket each year \$34,500 less than the
Davies' Government did, or those who
have collected enormous taxes, and run the
Island in debt in two years \$99,428 more
than the present Government in six years.
Oh! Mr. Leitch says, you are eating up
the capital of the country. Let us see how
true is this assertion: When Mr. Davies
came into power in 1877, we had a balance
of capital on debt account, \$331,836.
When he went out of power in 1878, we
found that account reduced to \$793,356, and
that Mr. Davies actually drew from capital
account at Ottawa, in two years, \$38,520,
as against our \$447 in six years. We drew
from capital during our six years, an
average of \$74,500 yearly, while Mr. Davies
drew a yearly average of \$19,265. But
that is not all. Not only have we kept the
capital account left us by Mr. Davies
almost intact, but in looking for our rights
from the Dominion we have largely in-
creased it. When the present Govern-
ment came into power in 1879, we had \$793,356,
now we have \$975,872, or \$182,516 by
which our capital has been increased, and
we regularly receive \$9,125 each year as
interest, more than when we came into
power.
Oh! but Mr. Leitch will say, the present
Government should not get credit for the
increase in the debt account. When need
we expect to get credit from Mr. Leitch for
any good we ever did? When was David
Leitch known to be honest or patriotic
enough to give his opponents praise for
anything they might do in the interest of
the Province? I presume that if Messrs.
Sullivan and Ferguson succeed in obtaining
from the Dominion Government the
amount of our claim, it is little approval they
will receive from the *Patriot*. But this I
can assure Mr. Leitch, that it matters
nothing to the present Government what
credit he gives them; they have a more in-
telligent jury than he to decide on their
acts, in the honest and upright yeomanry
of the country, who are quite willing to
accord to the men who have so faithfully
guarded their interests their just meed of
praise; as it will be found they will do on
the 15th by returning Mr. Boyver to assist
the present Government in justly adminis-
tering the affairs of the country, as the peo-
ple are beginning to understand very thor-
oughly that Mr. Leitch's writings and figures
are like his political career—a farce and
deception from beginning to end.
Oh! but Mr. Leitch says we are eating up
the assets of the Province in the Land Office
receipts. I do not attach any importance
to Mr. Leitch's statement on this point, as
land moneys have always been used as
ordinary revenue by every Government,
and will be by every successive government.
I shall, however, submit a comparative
statement of how matters stood in the
Land Office when Mr. Davies went out of
power, and how they stand now, just to
show the dishonesty of Mr. Leitch's figures.
We find the amount due in the Land Office
from sales of land in 1878 was \$462,925.
Balance due in 1884, \$469,146, or after six
years of the management of the office under
the present government, we have over
\$6,000 more assets in the Land Office than
when the present government came into
power. But, says Mr. Leitch, you drew
\$18,770 during your six years which would
be an average of \$3,128 for each year dur-
ing our term, but Mr. Davies drew \$46,547
in two years or an average of \$23,273 each
year. I do not use this however as a point
in our favor, because those moneys were
drawn only as they were required to pur-
chase out the remaining proprietors; with
this difference, however, that nearly \$4,000
of the amount drawn by the present govern-
ment was to pay Mr. Davies the balance of
his fees as Counsel under the Land
Purchase Act, which were due and should
have been paid in 1877.
But, Mr. Leitch says, the value of lands
unsold in 1879 was \$178,799, and in 1884
only \$73,675. Where are these figures
got, I ask? Certainly not from any official
record. I find, however, that there were
unsold lands in 1879 of 210,183 acres,
which, according to Mr. Leitch's figures,
would be worth 85 cents per acre. In 1884
the unsold acreage was 122,583, which, at
the same price, would amount to about
\$104,293, or something over \$30,500 more
than Mr. Leitch gives us credit for. But
\$30,000 is nothing in his eyes when he
writes to make a point against an opponent.
There is just one more point that I must
notice in Mr. Leitch's false statement,
which is that the present Government have
run the country in debt this year by
\$50,000. This is the grossest falsehood of
the whole lot. It is true that, on account of
the smallpox scare, the Land Office officials
were prevented from visiting the eastern
portions of Queen's and King's Counties,
and no doubt the Government lost thereby
\$14,000 or \$15,000; but with all these
drawbacks, we have a good record to show
the taxpayers of the Island. I would
say to the property-holders of this
country: Do not be deceived by the
false figures of the *Patriot*, but come for-
ward and vote for Mr. Boyver, and assist
the present Government in fighting your
battles, in reducing the Public Expenditure,
and strengthen our hands in obtaining
your rights from the Dominion Govern-
ment, so that you may be kept clear of
taxes for many years to come. Should
you vote for Mr. Leitch, what can he do
to assist you, as he belongs to the party
whose only cry against the present
Government is that they will not tax the
hard worked farmers of this country, so
that such men as the editor of the
Patriot shall get another haul of thousands
of dollars for public printing?
There are several other points to which
