

Close Finishes Featured At Longest Racing Card Of Season At S'side

The longest racing card of the season was run off at the Summerside raceway last night before a fairly large crowd of spectators. Most of the dashes featured close finishes, some of the winners being in doubt until the official announcement.

Among the larger pays of the night were \$13.30 for a show ticket in Sandy Marr which finished in second position in the second dash; and \$28.60 for a straight ticket on Lena's Bob which won the fourth race. There were two quinnella races, the sixth and tenth dashes, paying \$8.10 and \$4.70 respectively, and the daily double winning tickets were worth \$55.00.

The last two dashes were run in a betting rain, but nearly all of the spectators remained for the end of the card. A cooler was presented by Mayor Henry Wedge to Enzo Bowness, owner of Ann's Boy, for the fastest time in the two free-for-all dashes. Ann's Boy won both events, making identical times of 2:11 3/5.

The first heat of the free-for-all featured a particularly close finish. The Single G. had led throughout the mile until the last turn into the home stretch with Peter Clegg second on the rail, and Ann's Boy moving up to third position on the outside. In the drive to the wire the Bowness mare had too much foot for the other two, but the three horses were closely bunched going under the crosslights.

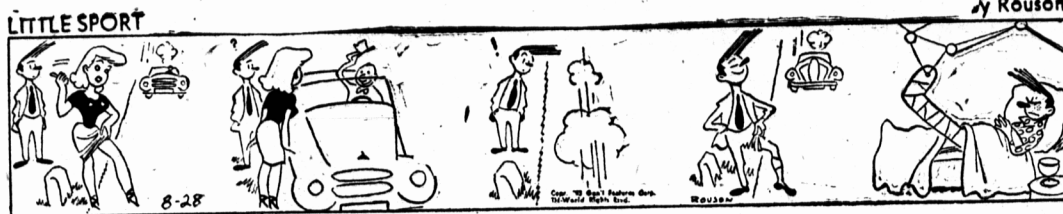

Semi-Finals Reached In Amateur Golf Tourney

MONTREAL (CP)—Don Doe of Granby, Que., celebrated his 32nd birthday Thursday by advancing to the semi-finals of the Canadian Amateur golf championship, the farthest he has gone in the national tournament in three attempts. With him went three Walker Cup players—an American and two Scotsmen.

Doe, a dark-horse in the 49th annual tournament that drew 200 entries from Canada, the United States and Great Britain, did it with brilliant victories all the way from the first round. He capped his efforts Thursday with a 3 and 2 fifth-round victory over Bobby Pineau, c, in a quarter-final.

Hall of Montreal and an astonishingly easy 6 and 5 decision over Scotty Fraser of Panama City, Fla., in the quarter-final.

Doe, whose best efforts were quarter-final berths in the 1950 and 1951 amateurs, now will meet the always-dangerous Jimmy Wilson of Scotland, British Walker Cup member who disposed of Lt. Wales, his team captain, at the 2nd hole in their quarter-final match. Earlier Thursday the 37-year-old Wilson eliminated Dr. T. Lenczyk of Newington, Conn., 3 and 1.
