Coronation Feature Film Kated Technicolor Triumph

All the pomp and pageantry of coverage of the Coronation gives the viewer a procession-side seat. England's most important event, the coronation, is captured in a spectacular presentation of J. Arthur Rank's full-length film, "A Queen Is Crowned," which opens today for a four day run at both the Prince Edward and Capitol theatres. "A Queen Is Crowned" marks the first time that the Coronation Ceremony has been filmed in Technicolor. This Technicolor documentary

follows the Queen and her solemn entourage into the Westminster Abbey for the actual Coronation ceremonies.

The filming of "A Queen Is Crowned" is a stirring tribute to the ingenuity of its makers. A total of 16 Technicolor cameras were employed to record this important spectacle on celluloid and six different camera sites along the Coronation route. One Technicolor camera was allowed inside the Westminster Abbey for the actual placing of the crown on the Queen's head.

Narration written especially for "A Queen Is Crowned" by Christopher Fry, British dramatist, is delivered by actor Lawrence Olivier, Academy Award winner for his role in "Hamlet." The London Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Sir Malcolm Sargent, provides special music for the film. Castleton Knight, producer of "The Victory Parade," "The Royal Wedding" and "The Olympic Games," was in charge of production.

Clay Fill-In At Montague Wharf Is Completed

"The Stevens Wharf at Montague presents a fine appearance since the clay fill-in work has been completed. Following the completion of the wharf itself, the freight shed, formerly located adjacent the wharf, was moved to the centre of the land to the rear of the wharf, and the whole area, formerly unsightly, has now been filled in with clay, and levelled. This provides two approaches to the wharf, one on each side of the shed, and allows a large landing area near the wharf. This wharf, together with the Government Wharf, will provide Montague with excellent wharfage space for many years to come. It is also reported that a slip will be constructed in the boat harbour for the convenience of the fishermen, many of whom use this harbour as a base. How large the slip will be a matter of conjecture, but it is understood that it will be sufficient to accommodate the larger type motor boat. It had also been rumored that the old coal shed on the Government Wharf will be torn down to make way for a new shed which will be constructed after the wharf has been repaired. Should this prove factual, not only will Montague have excellent wharfage, but also sufficient storage space to handle a considerable volume of shipping trade, which owing to the recently dredged river to a depth of 14 feet at low tide, is expected to increase to a great extent this year. Already the Lady Cecil of Quebec has made four trips to Montague this year, taking 1100 cords of pulpwood to Chandler, Quebec, on each trip. Other large ships are also expected to arrive this year, and although the days of ten to fifteen ships in port at one time will not again occur, there is expected to be an upsurge in shipping in Montague this year.

81 donors were registered at St. Peter's Bay Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic held in the Canadian Legion hall last evening. Most of these were residents of St. Peter's Bay but the following districts were also represented: Fortin Road, Morell, Mt. Continued from page 1 only known means of communication. Desperate calls for blood plasma, anti-tetanus serum and other medications were relayed on the police radio to state police headquarters in Boston. In Worcester, the Red Cross set up a mobile blood donor bank and volunteers quickly lined up. A lesser storm struck at Exeter, N. H., about 70 miles northeast. Extensive property damage was reported at Exeter but no deaths.

Disaster at Flint, Mich.

In Flint, Mich., at least 112 persons were killed Monday night. Whole families were wiped out as the worst of six winds ploughed down a strip of workers' homes crushing the houses and killing persons inside. Hospitals were jammed with injured while through the devastated areas more than 500 armed soldiers patrolled to guard against looters. The battered but living victims moved silently among the rows of dead in the makeshift morgue set up in Flint's national guard armory. Cleveland's tornado killed 10 as it cut a 10-mile swath inflicting property damage estimated at \$3,000,000. The salvo of tornadoes struck and killed capriciously in other Ohio centres and then swung north into Michigan scattering dead in fields and streets of towns.

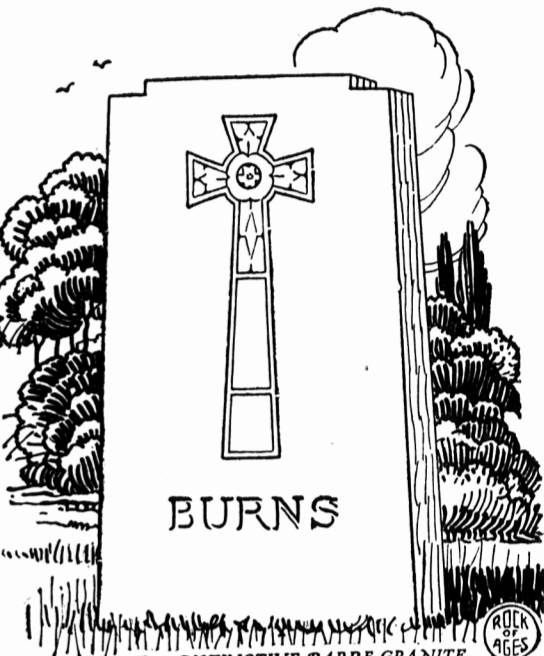
