

Gallagher's Store Reopening Wed.

Tomorrow at 10 a.m. the grand opening of Gallagher's Clover Farm store in Mt. Stewart will take place. The store is owned by Ray Gallagher who has been in business for the past six years. Mr. Gallagher joined the Clover Farm Association three years ago.

In early August Mr. Gallagher's store was destroyed by fire. Three days afterwards he was operating in temporary buildings.

He now is re-opening on the site where the former store was located. The new building is of concrete block construction, with a 26 and one half foot frontage by 180 foot depth. It contains a 1,500 square foot selling area and 15,000 square feet of

storage space. The building was constructed by Walter MacDonal and Company.

The new store is completely self service. The interior of the building is illuminated with fluorescent lighting and has tiled floors and ceilings.

In addition, carrying regular food items will be carrying all types of frozen foods, dairy products, farm produce, meats, dry goods and hardware. Although the store is completely self service three employees will be on hand to assist you in making your purchase if you have any difficulty and check out your goods.

Nationalist Chinese Minister Would Bury Two-China Idea

UNITED NATIONS (CP) — Yang Hsi-kun Nationalist China's deputy foreign minister, said here he hopes that the idea of two Chinas in the UN "now can be buried once and for all."

The decisive defeat in the General Assembly this week of an Italian proposal for a committee study of the Chinese membership issue "was a convincing demonstration," he said, of how little support there is for the simultaneous seating of delegations from his government, on Formosa, and from Communist China.

Canada's external affairs minister, Paul Martin proposed the seating of the two delegations, but he voided any two-China phraseology, saying they should be seated as representatives of the territories they actually control.

Peking would get the Security Council seat held by the Nationalists, Martin told the assembly last week Canada had refused to co-sponsor the Italian motion because it didn't spell all this out.

"We appreciate Canada's

frankness in being the only country to say what this committee business was really about," Yang said Thursday in an interview. "For a diplomatic speech, Mr. Martin's statement was frank and forthright."

"But it is clear now how little support there was for this goal. No one would have thought that the cautious Italian two-Chinas proposal, which is what it really was would fall so badly."

The Italian proposal was beaten Tuesday by 63 votes to 34, with 25 abstentions. Canada voted for it, but only because it considered it better than nothing at all.

The same day, the General Assembly rejected an Albanian-Cambodian motion, 57 to 45, with 17 abstentions, to seat Peking and expel the Nationalist Chinese. Canada breaking with its past record of opposition, abstained on the motion. Martin made it clear that Canada would have supported the motion had it not called for the simultaneous expulsion of the Nationalist Chinese.

Yang, a leading figure in this year's successful fight to preserve the Nationalist position in

the UN and keep Peking out, said his government would like to have kept Canadian support but "we are more concerned about the future and we hope that any difficulties in the way of cementing friendlier ties with Canada can be removed."

"We hope Canada will recon-

sider its position. Canada is performing no service to itself or to the free world, to this juncture when it toys with the idea of moving closer, politically and diplomatically, to Peking."

Marchand to Paris

Better Sanitary Standards Claimed Need On Railways

OTTAWA (CP)—A metal can used to provide drinking water for CPR diesel locomotive crews was displayed before the Commons Labor committee to illustrate the need for the enforcement of modern sanitary standards on the railways.

A. R. Gibbons of Ottawa, vice-president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, said the lid of the can serves as a common drinking cup. Such a can placed aboard a diesel leaving Montreal would, with refilling, serve all the crews boarding the unit until it reached Vancouver.

Mr. Gibbons and J. F. Walker, vice-president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, appealed to the committee to bring trains under the proposed new federal safety code which, among other things, will provide sanitary standards in the railway industry.

As it stands, the bill now before the committee specifically exempts railways, shipping and aircraft from its provisions.

Mr. Gibbons also produced a small tin cup which he said is supplied to railway bunkhouses for dipping drinking water from a wooden barrel. The barrel was cleaned periodically by swishing sand about in the bottom.

He said some newer locomotives are better equipped, but more than 900 CPR diesels still have the old-fashioned can.

There had been documented cases of tuberculosis and hepatitis linked to unsanitary drinking facilities for train crews.

A brief from the Canadian Railway Labor Executives Association, presented by the two witnesses, said unions have been working for more than 20 years to correct the situation. The health and transport departments had never made clear where the jurisdiction lay.

Mr. Gibbons said the exemp-
