

Miscellaneous.

Mrs. Harmberger was the Montreal lady who was caught the other day smuggling \$10,000 worth of goods into the United States.

The ships in port at Montreal will be illuminated one of the nights of the Dominion Exhibition. The Grand Trunk Railway will carry exhibits to and from the exhibition for one fare.

The Princess Louise took leave of Her Majesty at Osborne, August 12th, and left for Buckingham Palace on her way to Germany, where Her Royal Highness is going for the benefit of her health.

A little girl named Laidlaw, while sitting in her father's garden on Inglis street, Halifax, was attacked by a fox. An elderly sister came in response to her cries for assistance, and killed the animal by striking it on the head with an axe.

The Canada Medical Association has elected Dr. Caniff, of Toronto, president. It will meet on the first Wednesday in August at Halifax next year. Dr. James Christie was elected vice-president, and Dr. P. R. Inches secretary for New Brunswick.

The Germans are not disposed to allow the memory of Sedan to wax faint among them. Emperor William avails himself of himself of the occasion to fire the German heart, as well as to give all concerned abroad a hint that the German army is still to be relied upon as the steadiest guardian of the Fatherland. His proclamation referring to Sedan does not contain any irritating references to France.

The new syndicate for the publication of the Toronto Globe is understood to have been completed. The principal shareholders are Mr. Nelson, of Edinburgh, Scotland, J. Gordon Brown, Hon. D. A. Smith, H. H. Cooke, M. P., Senator McMaster, Ald. Hallerou, of Toronto, Taylor Bros., paper manufacturers. These names are the best indications that there will be no change in the political policy of the paper as has been rumored. It will continue to support the Liberal party.

Lord Chelmsford, in his defence in reference to the Isandula affair, failed, to justify himself for not having put the Isandula camp in a condition for defence before leaving. Had he felt for the enemy, as he ought to have done, Isandula would not have been fought. Had he even laagered his supply wagons, not to say thrown up retrenchments, before marching for Isandula, the Zulu attack, if made, would have been repelled with great slaughter. He did neither. A good general, leaving nothing in such circumstances to chance, would have done both. Lord Chelmsford, though his orders may have been disregarded by Cols. Pulleine and Durenford, can never wipe away the reproach of Isandula.—News.

The range of modern history furnishes an account of no more brilliant and successful military campaign than that which culminated on 2nd September, 1870, in the defeat of the French army and the capitulation of Napoleon the Third at Sedan. It is but natural that German people, who in that struggle became one vast army of soldiers and marched from victory to victory, should recall with national pride their splendid achievements of ten years ago. The cable despatches tell us they were celebrating the anniversary of Sedan the other day in a quiet way and that the Emperor, now in his 84th year, on the occasion issued a proclamation to the soldiers of the German Army, recalling their great deeds, expressing his profound thanks and warmest acknowledgments to them, coupled with the hope that they may continue to fulfil every call of duty and honor, maintain the strictest discipline and never relax in diligent training for war. These words are not very assuring as to the permanence of pacific relations except in the sense that preparation for war is sometimes the best security for peace. It is pretty clear, at least, that the time for the disarmament of Europe is not in the very near future.

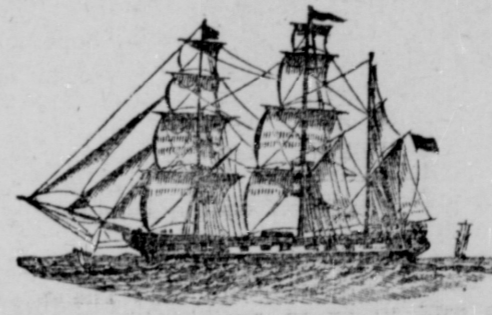
