# Flower Show Adding Floral Photography Competition

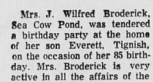

PERHAPS one feels warm and uncomfortable, but not a bit hungry. In fact, guests may wonder why they accepted the invitation to dinner on such a warm day. The party drops. - 2 (6 1/2 or 7 oz) cans tuna-in-vegetable oil, coarse-land
- 1/4 cup diced celery
- 1/4 cup diced green pepper
- Sprinkle gelatin on 1 cup cold water

- 3% cup canned mixed vegetable juice
- Aspic salt
- 3/4 tsp. pepper
