

MEETING OF PRESBYTERY.

The Presbytery of this Province met yesterday in the Hall of Zion church. After routine, touching reference was made to the death of Rev. J. G. Cameron, and a committee was appointed to draft a suitable minute, copies of which are to be sent to the family and parents of the deceased clergyman.

The clerk read an acknowledgment of \$200 from the estate of the late Charles Gregor, Covehead, which, without instructions, he had disbursed as follows: Foreign missions, \$100; home missions, \$50; augmentation, \$50. The Presbytery endorsed the clerk's action.

The clerk reported from the augmentation committee that the following sums had been granted: Tignish, Montrose and Elmsdale, \$150; Caledonia, \$100; Tryon, Bonshaw and Hampton, \$300; Murray Harbor South, \$75; Woodville, \$80; Dundas, temporarily at a rate of \$188 per annum.

The Presbytery unanimously resolved to concur in the application made by the Presbytery of Miramichi in its application to have the name of Rev. James Murray placed on its roll.

Mr. J. M. Fisher, convener, read the report of the committee on "Life and Work," which, after certain emendations, was approved and ordered to be forwarded to the convener of the Assembly's committee.

Mr. E. Gillies was appointed to act as interim moderator of the session of Murray Harbor North, and to declare the pulpit vacant on 23rd inst.

Messrs. Spencer and McArthur were appointed to examine the session records of the congregation of West Cape, etc., and Messrs. Fisher and Millar the session records of Montrose.

Mr. J. K. Fraser was appointed interim moderator of the session of Richmond Bay east and west, and Messrs. Fullerton and Millar were appointed a committee to visit the congregations at an early date.

The committee appointed to visit Dundas was also appointed to visit the congregation of Georgetown.

Messrs. A. D. McDonald, J. K. Fraser and Archibald Gunn, were appointed a committee to arrange for the reconstruction of fields in the west, and if possible to issue the whole question.

Rev. E. A. McCurdy was appointed to supply Covehead, St. Peter's Road and Brackley Point R. A., on the 23rd and 30th of this month.

Mr. C. D. McIntosh was granted license as a preacher of the gospel.

The Presbytery stands adjourned to meet in the Hall of St. James Church on August 3rd at 11 o'clock.
