

Race For School Crown Turns Into Tight Battle

WINNIPEG (CP) — Manitoba scored a three on the last end Wednesday night to edge previously-unbeaten Ontario 14-13 in the sixth draw on the Dominion High School Curling Championship.

The loss by Ontario threw the nine-draw classic wide open as North Ontario scored its fifth win in six starts to move into a tie with Ian Johnston's Kingston rink. Northern Ontario whipped Quebec 10-8.

Manitoba and Alberta who defeated British Columbia 13-3, now are tied in third position with identical record of four wins and two losses.

Saskatchewan won its third straight game 13-5 over New Brunswick to move into a cluster with British Columbia and Nova Scotia, each with three wins and three defeats. Nova Scotia handed Prince Edward Island its fifth

loss, 12-7.

PLAY AGAIN
P.E.I. New Brunswick and Quebec all have one win in six tries. The seventh draw was scheduled for 8 p.m. CST.

Down two coming home in the see-saw battle, Manitoba got two rocks into the house early. Ontario third Mike Jackson hit his own rock which was lying third shot and split Manitoba's two counters. Manitoba third Jack Suter put on a guard.

Jackson attempted a raise off his own rock, just outside the house but punched it through. Suter, heavy on another guard, drew to the eight-foot ring. Johnston took out the second shot rock and stuck. Henry Riendeau, Manitoba skip, took out the Ontario rock and rolled behind three guards to count three.

BEST GAME
Johnston was inside the broom on his final rock and hit a guard, making it unnecessary for Riendeau to throw his last stone.

The game was the best to date in the 'spiel which winds up tonight. Ontario started out fast, taking

a 4-0 lead after two ends. Manitoba came back to lead 5-4 after four but gave away a five-ender on the fifth and it looked as though the writing was on the wall.

But three successive misses by Ontario's front end gave Riendeau three counters. Ontario started to hit, and drew two rocks to the four-foot ring directly in front of two Manitoba shot stones. Suter pulled an amazing double kill, hitting one Ontario rock and knocking them both out without disturbing his own two.

DRAMATIC ENDING
Manitoba wound up the end with a five to go ahead again 10-9. Johnston counted a two on the seventh, but Riendeau raised one of his own rocks in to tie the score on the eighth.

Riendeau missed Ontario's shot rock with his final throw on the ninth and Johnston drew to the eight for two—his margin coming home.

Majority of the other curlers remained on the sidelines to watch the dramatic finish. Northern Ontario's Carl Konefal of Port Arthur held off a late

drive by Quebec to keep in the battle for the championship. Konefal held only a 6-4 margin at the sixth but added a four on the next end. Quebec's youthful rink picked up a single, a two and another single on the last three ends but fell two points short.

ALBERTA HOT
Saskatchewan, still with a slim hope of defending the title won last year by Bob Hawkins of Regina, had no difficulty with New Brunswick after scoring a four on the sixth.

B.C. counted on only three ends against a deadly-shooting Alberta crew, skipped by Alf Schieman of Calgary.

Nova Scotia's Allan Kenney counted three successive twos on the first three ends and then coasted to an easy win over Prince Edward Island.
