To Start Trial For Negligence

Claude George Thistle of Charlottetown was committed to trial before a judge without a jury in a higher court by Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet in Queen's County Magistrate's Court yesterday morning. The commitment was made on a charge of criminal negligence in the operation of a motor vehicle resulting in bodily injury with which Thistle had been charged in connection with the taking of a truck owned by R.E. Mutch and Co. and the subsequent accident with the same vehicle on the Malpeque on the early morning of November 7th. In the preliminary hearing into the case yesterday, it was learned that one of the occupants of the truck at the time of the accident had suffered severe back injuries.

Preliminary hearings regarding a charge of public mischief against the same accused were adjourned until Friday as were also the hearings concerning charges of public mischief and joy-riding against another Charlottetown resident in connection with the same incident.

Evidence produced by the four witnesses called yesterday by Crown prosecutor J.P. Nicholson brought forth very little other than what had been made known during proceedings heard by the court previously. Much of the evidence

Electrical Union Case Heard In Supreme Court

The docket was cleared with the completion of arguments in two cases before the Supreme Court in banco in Charlottetown yesterday morning.

Mr. J.O.C. Campbell Q.C. counsel for the respondent in the case of Traders General Insurance company versus Raymond McKee-man, completed his argument which had been dropped at adjournment of the court on Tuesday. The court, presided over by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell Q.C. and Justice George J. Tweedy Q.C. with completion of arguments reserved the case for decision to a date to be fixed. J.P. Nicholson appeared as counsel for the appellant insurance company.

Justice Mark R. MacGuigan Q.C. presided with Chief Justice Campbell in the second case, that of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers versus the town of Summerside. W.E. Bentley Q.C. and Somerled Trainor appeared as counsel for the appellant union and J.O.C. Campbell Q.C. and E.H. Strong Q.C. represented the respondent.
