2 Exhibitors Again Take Leading Role

With the Poultry Exhibition at the Old Home Week festivities hitting an all-time peak, two of the more noted exhibitors continued to hold forth as in other years.

Alvin MacDonald of the W.J. MacDonald and Son farm on Covehead Road, always a leader of exhibits, continues to head the entry list with his usual competition for number of entries coming from Ralph Rayner and sons of Mount Herbert.

These two farms have done much in the way of further breeders' knowledge on the Island, assisting the government in many respects.

NOW GEESE
Mr. MacDonald, an outstanding exhibitor for many years, is an RPO (Record of Performance) poultry breeder and hatcher. He has recently been specializing in raising and hatching geese on a commercial basis.

At present, Mr. MacDonald is raising several breeds of geese, the most popular being the Pilgrim Goose. He has been experimenting with the larger type of bird and crosses and large geese. The MacDonald farm have been breeding and hatching since 1945 and are now co-operating in a group Random Sample Tests with another ROP breeder, Ivan Dawson of Central Bedeque.

TEST STATION
Ralph Rayner, Proprietor of Rayner's Chicken Hatchery of Charlottetown, has been actively engaged in breeding of Single Comb White Leghorns.

Operating an ROP breeder, Mr. Rayner specializes in light type laying strain and crosses.

At present, the Rayner farm, in conjunction with the Federal Government, is constructing a large test station to test the merits of different strains and crosses.

The former poultry plant on the farm was destroyed by fire three years ago. After completing the rebuilding job, Mr. Rayner has undertaken a new project which will add greatly to present facilities.

Completion of the new plant will find the farm testing and putting out superior baby chicks to the general public.

Record Poultry Entries Put Part Of Show Outside

The record number of entries that have poured into the Poultry section of the Exhibition and Old Home Week celebrations has forced officials to move their stations into the outdoors.

An open air addition has been erected on the No. 5 building just behind the present Poultry building where geese and ducks will be housed.

The new addition, 43 feet in length or approximately half the length of the building stands over seven feet in height and is 14 feet wide. There are 76 individual cages standing in rows of 19 each double-decked on either side of the shed.

The roof is made of galvanized steel while the 3 open sides are walled in with link meshed wire.

As usual, the Poultry Building itself, will be one of the feature attractions of Old Home Week. Charlie Scranton, poultry field man for the Department of Agriculture and judge of the Old Home Week shows for the past 14 years said that all is in readiness for the record smashing entry list that is expected.

The more than 250 individual cages in the Poultry Building are expected to be taxed to capacity in order to handle the expected number of birds.

In reference to the new addition, Mr. Scranton said that in list of entries during the past few years has warranted the construction of this new building. He added that it has been erected in such a manner that to further construction would only require the removal of the wire walling.

Mr. Scranton has been connected with shows of this type since 1941. Born on a farm in eastern Nova Scotia, he has come to play an important part in poultry breeding on the Island.

He first started judging at Old Home Week 14 years ago and since that time has played an annual role in making the poultry show the success it enjoys today.


