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THE CONQUEROR WILL HAVE NO TIME TO LOOK AFTER THE WOUNDED.

Let me briefly summarize the possibilities—indeed, I may say the probabilities of the result of the great battle in the next great war, which is sure to be "short, sharp and decisive," says Alexander Forbes in Scotland's.

The fighting has been prolonged and bloody with the result that one side is definitely beaten, evacuates its positions and retreats more or less precipitately, leaving on the ground its wounded, some of whom could be cared for while the conflict lasted. The successful commander's ground is littered with his own wounded, he has them on his hands in the sand, and he has also on his hands the thousands of the wounded of the vanquished force which has gone away. The conqueror of the future, if he begins the old-time conventional burden of his adversary's wounded, will become its victim. He will not accept the inebriety. It is to be imagined that the victor in such circumstances will think twice even about his own wounded, let alone the wounded of the other side! No. He is in the field, not to be a hospital, but to be a hammer on the enemy who has departed, leaving his own wounded behind, and who may come back again tomorrow to strike him while engaged in the live and dead debris of yesterday's battle. The victor will hasten away to create or hang on the skirts of the vanquished army, leaving the wounded of both sides to be dealt with as may be possible by such surgeons as he can afford, in the face of future contingencies, to leave behind, and to the ministrations of some philanthropic amateur philanthropists of the Red Cross and kindred organizations. For there will be no military "water companies." In the hunger for fighting men, the 1,000 bearers per army corps of the present will have been incorporated into a strong brigade of war nurses in their hands and a place in the fighting line.

THE TROOPING.

The discovery of a few scattering gold coins by a party of treasure-seekers near Tolosa, Mexico, has added new zest to the search for the mythical gold and led to the Hacienda of Jalisco, and for which several large parties are now excavating under military protection. The amount buried is said to be \$200,000. That amount, according to local traditions, was concealed by bandits many years ago, being the proceeds of the robbery of the treasure of the Glorious Ducal de Crisabel Nava, the leader of a band of 200 desperadoes, who was put to death in a horrible manner by the Spaniards in 1570. The treasure was hidden in the caves where they were wont to rendezvous. Pedro Alaminos succeeded him by the unanimous vote of the bandits. This leader, at the outbreak of the war for national independence, induced his followers to abandon, at any price for the time, their evil courses and fight for their country. The idea was carried with patriotic enthusiasm and hailed with joy. Before commencing their new enterprise the buried treasure in the ground, intending to recover it upon the coming of peace. Most of them were killed in the battles which followed. The wife of the treasure-seeker was communicated to members of their families, but was lost. It was not all put in one place, and search will be made for it at other points from time to time until the booty is finally secured. No more conflicts have occurred between the conquering soldiers for the treasure, as the estate troops are regularly quartered on the scene of activity.

THE TIN WEDDING.

The tin wedding cakes with the tenth anniversary. If a dinner be given, it is suggested in The Ladies' Home Journal that the tin be made beautiful by pink roses and sprays of white carnations in a bright tin dish in the centre. Four dishes, holding the pink and white tarts, cakes, etc., may be set in the midst of the tin (used for baking cakes in circular shape) on the edges of the plates resting on those of the tin. These rings filled with roses and sprays will make a wreath around each prominent dish. If a more elaborate decoration be desired, a more elaborate tin may be used in the form of the initial of the groom, and that of the bride's maiden name—two to be placed at each end of the table.

THE LITTLE ROUND STANDS OF TWISTED TIN WIRE.

The little round stands of twisted tin wire made for the purpose of twisting down and lined with pink laced papers, make dainty receptacles for salted almonds, small "individual" globes are supplied for the almonds, new heart-shaped "patty pans" will answer the purpose. Cards of lovely bright colors, very lightly covered with nuilage, may be entirely enveloped in tin foil, and so smoothly that the articles will not be suspected. The dressy names may be marked upon the surface. A small tin funnel at each lady's place will make a pretty bouquet holder.

THE MAN IN THE MOON.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

St. John's, Feb. 20.—A writ for the bye-election in Burgess has been issued. Nomination September 1st, election 11th. This is the first of many contests necessary through the unsetting of the Whiteley corruptionists. James Watson, ex-M. P. P. for Trinity, elected as the colleague of Sir William Winter and Mr. Bond, has been appointed inspector of customs and has retired from the political arena.

Fury Smith, Ark. Aug. 20.—The spontaneous combustion of 200 kegs of gun powder and 1200 pounds of dynamite belonging to the Sper Hardware Company last evening, was the cause of giving Fort Smith a terrible jolt. The warehouse was about three-quarters full of the city. The explosion blew the residence of Mrs. Cook into the air, killing Mrs. Cook and her baby instantly, wrecked 10 or 15 dwellings in the neighborhood, and broke the plate glass in hundreds of business houses in the city, and loosening plastering from almost every dwelling within miles. A boating party were in the vicinity of the explosion and are missing.

Montreal, Aug. 20.—The Montreal gas company decided today to reduce its price of gas all over the city. The new price is to be 35 cents per 1,000 feet for both lighting and heating purposes—consumers to be allowed one meter free. The price charged by the company at present are \$1.30 for lighting and \$1 for heating.

Lisbon, Aug. 20.—Newspapers here say Congo state officials recently impressed into their service natives of Portuguese Congo. A large body of natives attacked the Congo state post at Loba, killing two members of the Congo state force and capturing three others.
