Maple Leafs Score 5-3 Victory Over Canadiens

TORONTO, Nov. 1.—(CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs consolidated their first place National Hockey League position here tonight when they defeated the runner-up Montreal Canadiens 5-3 before 13,737 fans.

Canadiens played without four regulars, out with injuries. Canadiens took a 1-0 first period lead but the Torontonians wiped that out with two goals and outscored the Montrealers 3-2 in the final 20 minutes. Only two penalties—both in the second period—were called against Canadiens but they were costly, resulting in three Leaf goals.

Vern Kaiser was the first Canadian to be sent off and while he was sitting things out Ted Sloan got one past Gerry McNamara to even the count at 1-1. Doug Harvey received a hooking penalty near the end of the session and before he returned Max Bentley and Harry Watson netted to give Leafs a 3-1 lead and they stayed ahead from there in.

Montreal played without regulars Elmer Lach, Butch Bouchard, Hal Laycoe and Bert Hirschfeld.

Maurice Richard scored two goals in the third period that brought Canadiens within halting distance of Toronto, but the Leafs leaders sewed it up with a goal at 17:54 by Sid Smith. That ended the scoring for the night. Canadiens' first goal, by Calum MacKay at 15:42 of the first period, was in the nature of a gift. His long, lazy shot bounced in front of Turk Brodeur, took a crazy hop and skittered between his legs.

Propose Reserved Seat And Bus Service Plan For Rural Hockey Fans

Rural hockey fans will be the object of special attention as the result of a new proposal being drafted up by the Charlottetown Forum Management in co-operation with the executive of the P.E. Islanders Hockey Club.

Local hockey officials last night announced that they are drafting up a new scheme by which fans in the rural areas will be given a better opportunity to come to the City and be guaranteed good seats to witness games in Big Four competition.

The proposal is to set aside certain hockey nights for the benefit of one particular centre or area for a specified game. A special bus, arranged for by Forum and Club officials, will be sent to that area to pick up fans and transport them to the rink for the game. Some 50 tickets will be reserved for the benefit of these patrons, and an official will accompany the bus to make the sale of tickets. The system will work on a rotational basis, with such centres as Murray Bay, Trigon or some other point on the next occasion, and so on.

Officials made it clear last night that the object is not to increase the sale of tickets, because there has been no difficulty in selling all available seats this season, but rather to give those in rural areas a better opportunity to come and see Big Four teams in action without inconveniencing them in any way. Many people have been coming into the City on the night of a game, only to have to return home again because all tickets had been sold. The express purpose of the new system is to eliminate this disappointment.

There are one or two things however, that the various centres will have to do in co-operation with local officials to make the scheme workable, it was pointed out. One is that they will have to guarantee a full bus load each night, which will amount to some 50 persons, and secondly, each district is asked to appoint a person or committee to arrange and organize their parties in that particular area. Those who are interested in the scheme are advised to contact either the Forum or Islanders officials.

It is expected that the new proposal will be put into effect next week, and as each centre's turn comes up, advance announcements will be made to indicate the area or centre in question.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 1.—(AP)—The dean of American League shortstops, Luke Appling, dropped off the Chicago White Sox roster today to sign up as manager of Memphis Cubs.

Thus Appling, at 41, ended a 20-year record breaking career as a big league player to move into the brain trust section of the class AA Southern Association. Memphis is one of the Sox's farm clubs.

Appling, who set a major league record by playing 2218 games, led the league in batting with .388 in 1936 and .342 in 1942. His lifetime batting average was .310.

James Scores With 12 Seconds Remaining To Give Visitors 2-1 Win

Saint John Beavers assumed the role of "giant-killer" at the Forum last night by defeating the Islanders in a Maritime Senior Hockey League game 2-1. It snapped the 10 game long winning streak that marked the return of Charlottetown to mainland hockey wars.

The game, after an open first period, blossomed into a thriller that saw the rival goalies rise to heights of greatness as they alternately turned aside goal hungry forwards in one of the finest exhibitions of hockey this season.

Left winger George James of the Beavers on a picture play with Gordie Armstrong with 12 seconds to go wrote fins to the mighty tussle, but it was the diminutive Denis Brodeur in the Beaver nets who covered himself with glory. Time after time he robbed the hard pressing Islanders as they stormed his cage for the all important counter. He was well liked and shared the plaudits of the crowd with Gordon at the game's finish.

Playing an outstanding game for Beavers, Armstrong potted the one and only marker in the first frame to send Saint John into a one-goal lead and set up James for the final marker in a very smart scoring attempt.

Bruno "Red" Favaro garnered Islanders only tally at 15:20 of the middle session to tie up the score, after the Islanders had hammered away at the Beaver fortress for nearly the entire period. They out-shot the visitors 20 to 8. Total shots on goal for the night saw Brodeur turn aside 37 shots while Gordon kicked out 24.

Whit Mosseau and Larry Blackburn, who were dropped from the Moncton Hawks roster earlier this week, were seen in action last night in Saint John livery. It is understood that they have been signed to the Club temporarily on a try-out basis.

Armstrong's opening goal was on a smart solo effort from the opposing blue line when he broke away on a loose puck to rifle in a hard shot past Gordon from left wing that caught the high far corner of the mesh.

Favaro tied it up in the second when he received Pawlynszyn's pass behind the Saint John cage, slipped around the side of the goal and poked it into the corner.

The winning goal by James with only 12 seconds left in the game was the prettiest goal of the night. Coming in on left wing, James beat Gordon neatly with a high shot in the right corner after taking Armstrong's payoff pass.

Coast Baseball League Nears Major Loop Status

CINCINNATI, Nov. 1.—(AP)—The Pacific Coast League appears to be creeping up on the major loop status it has sought for years.

There's a good possibility the triple-A circuit will be classed 4-A, highest ever reached by a minor league, before the 1951 campaign rolls around.

Commissioner A. B. (Happy) Chandler, following a hearing by baseball's major-minor leagues executive council on the Coast League's plea to be excused from all angles of baseball's annual draft, said today:

"We've decided to give relief to the Coast League as the factor in higher classification, possibly 4-A, under the National Association structure."

Chandler said the Coast League had peculiar problems in that seven of its eight clubs are independently owned, it has a longer playing season and it outdraws the other triple-A leagues at the gate.

The Commissioner said a complete and immediate survey would be made of all angles of the Coast League operation before the committee's recommendation is placed before the major and minor league meetings in December at St. Petersburg, Fla.

"We are asking the same data of the International League and of the American Association, and there's a possibility their classification will be raised if they desire, and can qualify," Chandler said.

It was learned that one spokesman favored a \$25,000 draft price for Coast League players, in place of the current \$10,000. Another proposal was that the Coast draft be put on a voluntary basis, with a player being able to excuse himself from the draft when he signs his contract.

Baseball's executive council had no luck in solving the big league broadcast problem, which the minor league blame for a good share of an 8,000,000 attendance drop last year. The matter comes up again at the Florida major-minor meetings.

The only comparison to work from other than public opinion at the moment, is the fact that in the only game played between Cape Breton and Big Four representatives this season, saw the C. B.S.H.L. on the winning end. It was an exhibition game between Sydney and Islanders, the respective league leaders at the moment, and Sydney won by a 3-1 count over their home ice.

One of the men who was most interested in the outcome of that game, coach Murph Chamberlain himself, has his own opinion however. Following last Saturday night's game at Halifax, Chamberlain stated "I think that the Cape Breton League are due for an aw-
