

Erect New High School in Souris

A new high school is being built in Souris to accommodate the students of Grades Nine, Ten, Eleven and Twelve. Fire last spring damaged the old High School and shortly afterwards the people of Souris decided a new school was needed to house the growing number of pupils. The construction of the building began last summer and it is expected to be completed in either January or February.

The new school will be of a very modern design and is being built by George Whiteway of Murray River. It is to be 110 ft. long and 47 ft. wide and will be a two storey building with a large concrete basement. Four spacious classrooms, one library, a teachers room, and gym in the basement, make up the contents of the building.

The large number of windows will provide plenty of light for studying and an oil-furnace will supply the heat for the building. A separate thermostat will be installed in each classroom.

The Old High School, where the children of Souris had been taught for many years, will be used for the first eight grades. Approximately \$12,000 in repairs and improvements have been spent on the school during the past six months. Despite improvements the need for the new school is very obvious.

There are 201 students and only two classrooms. Conditions have become so crowded that this year two teachers are forced to use the same classroom, one in the morning and one in the afternoon.

At the present rate of the town's growth there will be a much larger enrollment in the school classes within a few years. Without increased accommodation it would be impossible to provide proper educational facilities for the students.

18th Century Gifts For Royal Children

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (Reuters) Prince Charles and Princess Anne each received presents from the 18th century Friday when their grandmother, Queen Elizabeth, toured the craftshops of this restored colonial town.

For the princess the Queen Mother accepted an exquisite miniature silver tea service in the style of 200 years ago.

Prince Charles was given a full-sized Indian rosewood cribbage board with ivory inlay and pegs. The town's craft shops are replicas of buildings which once stood in Williamsburg. Each has a mastercraftsman who works with the tools and skills of the colonial days—and on special occasions such as Friday dons the appropriate costume.

The Queen Mother accepted these and other presents, including a hand-set morocco-bound illustrated book, from Herbert Clarke, the apothecary, whose shop she had visited earlier, on behalf of all the craftsmen.

Clarke, born in Chippenham, Wiltshire, came here after the war when his daughter married an American serviceman.

Had Expected Dr. Sheppard To Confess

CLEVELAND (AP)—Police who arrested Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard for the murder of his wife Marilyn expected a speedy confession once he was behind bars, said a witness Friday. But the confession never came.

This testimony was given by patrolman Fred F. Drenkhan, a member of the seven-man Bay Village police force.

"The statement was made, wasn't it," defence attorney William J. Corrigan asked, "that all you had to do was throw Sam Sheppard in jail away from his brothers and family and he'd confess?"

"I heard something like that," Drenkhan conceded.

"And that he was a dope fiend and that if you put him in jail he'd confess?" Corrigan continued.

The patrolman said he hadn't heard any statement like that then, but thought it was a theory raised later in a letter to police.

Sheppard is on trial for his life in the slaying of his wife. Drenkhan still was on the witness stand when court recessed for the week-end.

In a long, grueling, still uncompleted cross-examination, Corrigan attempted to demonstrate as he has before that police picked Sheppard as the murderer of Marilyn last July 4 and then—disregarding any other possibility—set out to convict him.

Earlier, under direct examination by the state, Drenkhan testified he found no sign of a forced entry to the Sheppard home the day of the murder. Nor, he said, did he find any sign of a struggle on the beach outside. He also said locked screens were on the three windows in the bedroom where Marilyn died.

Dr. Sheppard said a bushy-haired prowler killed his wife and knocked him unconscious later on the beach.

The state contends the 30-year-old osteopath beat his wife to death July 4 in their suburban Bay Village home in a quarrel over another woman.

BLAMES PARENTS
MONCTON, N.B. (CP) — Police chief F. W. Davies says juvenile delinquency is out of hand. Reviewing damage to schools and to homes under construction he blamed parents for allowing teen-agers to roam the streets at night.

Ontario Junior Farmer Wins Eaton Scholarship

TORONTO (CP)—Wyndam Ross Rowat, a 19-year-old junior farmer from Elmvale, Ont., was named winner of the T. Eaton Company Canadian agricultural scholarship at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair Friday night.

He won over candidates from every Canadian province except Newfoundland. The scholarship provides all college fees, lodging and board for a four-year course at any agricultural college the winner may choose.

This is the first time an Ontario boy has won the award since it was inaugurated in 1951. That year, the Saskatchewan candidate won it and British Columbia and then Alberta representatives won in 1952 and 1953.

Others in the contest included Rosemond Caron, St. Paul, Que.; Albert D. Smith, Prince William, York County, N. B.; Paul M. Bishop, Kings county, N. S.; and George H. Riley, Kensington, P. E. I.
