manding Officer of Station Summerside. This was A/C Clements' first official visit to the Island base since taking over as AOC MAC last July.

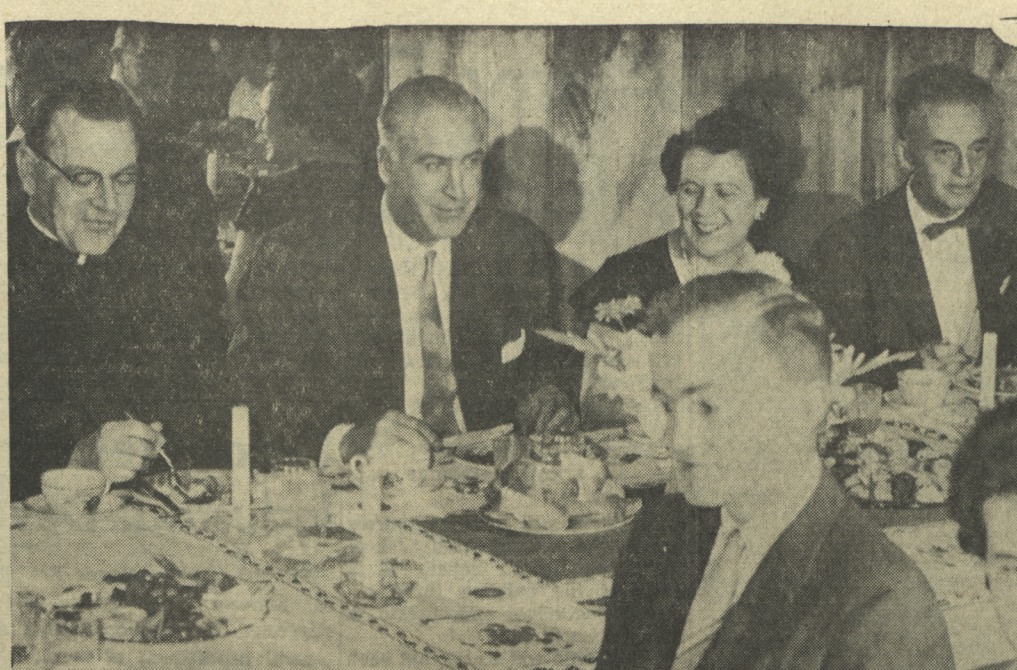
**Plan 5'Side Red Cross Meeting**

**Damage Action In County Court**

SUMMERSIDE — An action for damages was started in County Court here yesterday morning in which the plaintiff is asking \$125 from the defendants, two residents of Northam, as a result of a collision last June.

The action arose after an accident in which a car, owned by one of the men and driven by the other, and a wagon driven by the plaintiff, were involved in a collision near Portage. Estimated damages asked by the plaintiff are loss of mare, \$75; damages to wagon, \$40; damage to harness, \$10. The case was adjourned until November 5th.

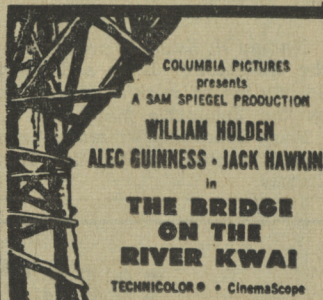

For the convenience of the public the ladies will be at their rooms in the branch home from 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. each day.

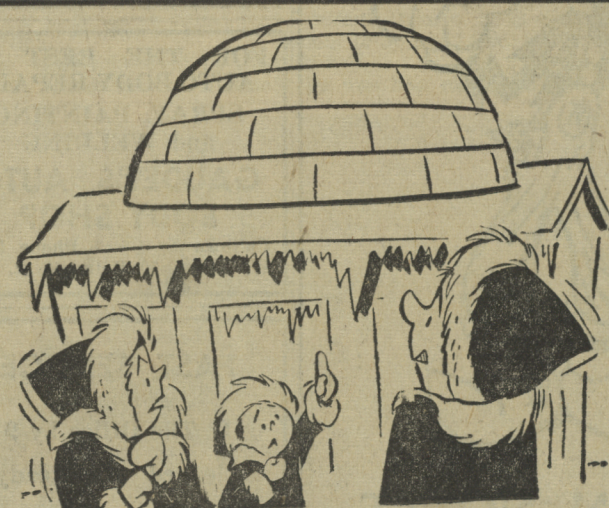
**Hoop Contest To Feature Show**

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**West Indies' Population Is Said 'Bulging At The Seams'**

OTTAWA (CP) — The West Indies federation is "bulging at the seams" and would like to see Canada accept more immigrants, Sir Grantley Adams, prime minister of the federation, said Friday.

But he firmly declined to criticize current Canadian restrictions on newcomers from the island group.

"I don't want to say anything that might look like even a remote criticism of Canada," he said at a press conference.

He goodnaturedly stuck to his guns under prodding from a reporter who suggested there was something odd about Canada giving financial aid to the federation, yet barring from Canada virtually all but West Indian domestic workers and persons who have relatives here.

**TO SIGN AGREEMENT**

Sir Grantley arrived by train from Montreal Friday for a two-day visit to Ottawa. Today he will sign an agreement providing for \$10,000,000 in Canadian aid to the federation over a five-year period. The figure includes two passenger-cargo ships costing up to \$6,000,000.

Sir Grantley indicated the remaining \$4,000,000 will be spent on services associated with the ships, such as dock facilities.

The visiting prime minister, who will go to Arvida, Que., Toronto and Montreal before returning home, was met on arrival by Prime Minister Diefenbaker and External Affairs Minister Smith. He later had an informal meeting with Mr. Diefenbaker.

**NEW PACT INEVITABLE**

Asked about the Canada-West Indies trade agreement of 1925, Sir Grantley said he regards a new pact as "inevitable," but indicated negotiations are not far advanced.

**Century Club Donations Exceed \$6,000**

**Hunting Offense Brings \$45 Fine At Alberton**

ALBERTON — A resident of the Tignish area was fined \$45.00 and costs by Magistrate R.S. Hinton at Alberton yesterday, for hunting migratory game birds (geese) before the opening of the season on October 1st. The charge was laid by the Prince County Game Officer Cst. B. Coombs of the R.C.M. Police.

An American gunner was fined \$11.00 and costs for hunting migratory game birds at night. The offense occurred on the Rayner Marshes near Alberton last fall.

A party from Bloomfield Corner was fined \$40.00 and costs for possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor. On a similar charge an Alberton resident was fined \$25.00 and costs.

A similar charge against a party from Miminegash also brought a fine of \$25.00 and costs.

A party from Alberton was fined \$20.00 and costs for possession of liquor in a place other than his residence.

A man from Tignish pleaded guilty to driving while impaired and was fined \$10.00 and costs or 14 days. Information was laid by Alberton policeman ohn Arthur.

A Nail Pond resident pleaded guilty to a charge of unlawful assault and was bound over to keep the peace for a year. A nominal fine was imposed.

Three residents of Tignish and one from Campbellton received fines of \$25.00 and costs each for possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor.

Two men, one from Alberton and the second from Tignish pleaded guilty to possession of liquor in a place other than a residence and each were fined \$20.00 and costs.

Fines of \$200.00 and costs were imposed on two Ebbesfleet fishermen for possession of a large quantity of undersized lobsters. A Sen Cow Pond resident was fined \$200.00 and costs or 45 days in jail for possession of a quantity of undersized lobsters. A 1951 pick up truck containing the lobsters was placed under seizure.

A Brae fishermen was fined \$25.00 and costs for unlawfully engaging in fishing lobsters in an area not covered by his license.
