

# Baltimore Colts Grab Crown With 23-17 Overtime Win

NEW YORK (AP)—Baltimore Colts, directed by the golden arm of Johnny Unitas and driven by the flying feet of Alan Ameche, roared back Sunday from almost certain defeat to defeat New York Giants 23-17 in a sudden-death overtime period for the National Football League championship.

It was Ameche who climaxed the winning 80-yard march by plunging over from the one-yard strip for the payoff touchdown after eight minutes and 15 seconds of the extra period. And it was Unitas who spearheaded the drive by completing four passes for 46 yards putting the Colts in the position to score.

The Giants appeared to have their fifth championship in the bag after they came from behind with a pair of electrifying second-half touchdowns to take a 17-14 lead.

But with 10 seconds remaining, Steve Myhra kicked a 20-yard field goal to tie the score and cast a pall over the highly partisan crowd of 64,185 Yankee Stadium spectators.

## "We Out-Gutted Them," Says Colts' Art Spinney

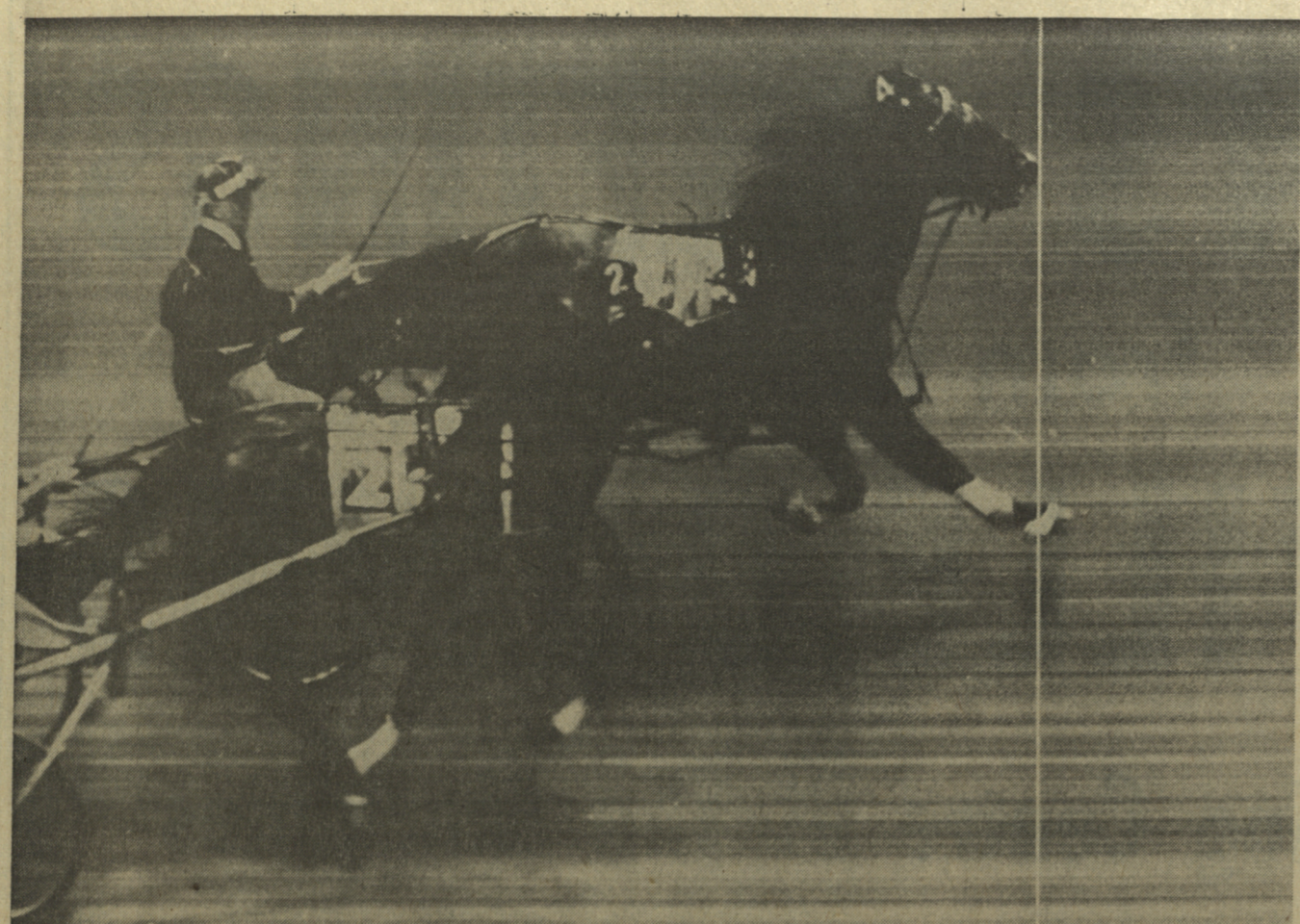

Raider Frost had the distinction of winning the third leg of the "Triple Crown" at Hollywood and Sunbell's mile was the season's fastest for her gait and sex. She was home bred.

### CAME AHEAD

Previous performances of Raider Frost included the \$15,000 American National in which he set up a new track mark of 2.03 1-5 and the \$60,450 Cane Futurity at Yonkers Raceway. Joe had sent him to Yonkers prior to his own arrival there with Shadow Wave and he expected to have a friend of his drive him, but as he had not given the name of a driver in his entry the manager of Yonkers Raceway put Hugh Bell

up to catch drive him. It was expected that Shadow Wave would win that event, but Hugh Bell who got away in a back tier, got through with Raider Frost and won in 2.08 1-5—a new world's record for age for a mile and one-sixteenth. Raider Frost later took his record of 1.58 4-5 when he won the \$12,050 Western Pace on November 19 at Hollywood Park.

# Rangers Snap Hab Streak; Red Wings, Hawks Win

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Rangers snapped Montreal's 13-game unbeaten streak by cooling off the red-hot Canadiens 5-3 at Madison Square Garden Sunday night. The National Hockey League-leading Canadiens had won six straight and hadn't lost in more than a month.

During the Canadiens' skrein they had won 11 and tied two games. Their last loss also came at the hands of the Rangers in the Garden 5-3 on Nov. 26. The Rangers forged to an early lead only to have Montreal come back with two goals. But the Rangers again led 3-2 at the end of the first period and added two more in the middle stanza before the Canadiens wound up the scoring.

### CAPS POWER PLAY

Camille Henry capped a power play at 2:06 of the opening stanza with Montreal short-handed and Larry Popein gave the Rangers a 2-0 lead less than two minutes later. Jean Beliveau cut the deficit to 2-1 on an unassisted goal at 6:02 while the Rangers were a man down.

Phil Goyette's 15-footer at 7:44 got the flying Frenchmen even, but New York went in front for good on a screened 20-footer by defenceman Lou Fontinato with less than three minutes left in the period.  
Rookie Les Colwill produced his first NHL goal at 5:53 of the second period on a bouncing 25-foot backhand and Red Sullivan scored from close range to give the Rangers a 5-2 lead at 8:58.  
Midway in the period Dickie Moore caged Montreal's final goal.

DETROIT (AP)—Alex Delvecchio scored the first goal and assisted on the next three as Detroit Red Wings came from behind for a 5-3 victory over Boston Bruins Sunday night. The decision moved Detroit two points ahead of Boston in their fight for second place in the National Hockey League.

Boston got the jump on Vic Stasiuk's 11th goal when his intended pass from behind the net bounced off Terry Sawchuk's chest and trickled into the cage. It was the Bruin's first goal here in three games.  
Gordie Howe was penalized midway in the first period and Delvecchio and Nick Mickoski both scored while he was gone. Delvecchio had a full breakaway

for his 11th goal, then served a short breakaway pass that set Mickoski up for his sixth.
