

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.
LONDON, Dec. 5.
There was one hundred and fifty Jewish refugees from the South of Russia among the passengers of the steamer Lessing, which returned to Plymouth disabled a few days ago.
A robbery at Lord Arthur Hill Trevor's seat at Brynkinnit yesterday was effected while the family were at church. The amount of valuables stolen is variously estimated. Some reports place them at only £18,000. A man servant of the family was arrested as an accomplice to the robbery.
The Lord Mayor writes to the Times, stating that the Property Defence Association of Ireland has not failed to come under his notice as Lord Mayor, and that the Irish nation may rely on the traditional sympathies of this city to aid the Association.
The Times reproaches the English nation with apathy in not aiding the efforts to combat the action of the Land League by assisting the Association.
The Times' Dublin despatch says a conspiracy against the payment of rents is extending. Intimidating, boycotting and threats are prevalent throughout a large territory.
The British barque Granite City, from Dalhousie, N. B., for Queenstown, has been lost. The crew have been landed at Cardiff.
The steamer Germanic arrived at Queenstown last night from New York. On the passage she rescued the crew of the British steamer Hurworth, Capt. Anderson, from Montreal, Nov. 7th, for Rotterdam, which was abandoned.

LONDON, Dec. 4.
The report of the appointment of the O'Donoghue to the Governorship of Ceylon is untrue.

DUBLIN, Dec. 5.
Six hundred of the Duke of Devonshire's tenants have decided not to pay rents, except with a reduction of 20 per cent.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.
BERNE, Dec. 5.
M. Cornaz has been elected President of the Council of State, and M. Vervyn Vigier Vice-President. Both are Radicals.

ZANZIBAR, Dec. 5.
On the 3rd instant, Captain Brownrigg, of a British man-of-war, with 100 men in a steam pinnace, attempted the capture of a dhow flying the French colors and loaded with slaves. The Arab crew resisted fiercely. Capt. Brownrigg, a seaman, the stoker and a supernumerary were killed, and one man was severely and two slightly wounded. The dhow escaped.

BERLIN, Dec. 5.
The Progressist, Socialist and National Liberal parties each selected members for the purpose of reporting upon the progress of all important questions in the Liberal interest, the principal object being that the Liberal parties may work together in the future.

TUNIS, Dec. 5.
Although M. Roustan states he will return here in a fortnight, it is generally known he has been definitely recalled and that General Lambert will succeed him.

UNITED STATES.
NEW YORK, Nov. 5.
Mrs. Coleman was sentenced to four years imprisonment for killing Geo. T. Coles.

ROCHESTER, Dec. 5.
It is stated that Henry A. Taylor and Isaac S. Waterman, of Philadelphia, contractors for building the State Line Railroad from Rochester to Salamanca, have brought action against Wm. H. Vanderbilt for \$1,000,000, alleged to have been lost by them on account of breach of contracts on the part of Mr. Vanderbilt, who held the bonds of the road in trust.

CHICAGO, Dec. 5.
A meeting of Jewish citizens was held here yesterday for the relief of Jewish refugees from Russia. A committee was appointed to receive and care for them upon their arrival here, and procure them employment. Over \$2,000 were subscribed at the meeting.

CONDENSED DESPACHES.
United States Congress assembled yesterday. J. Warren Keifer, of Ohio, was elected Speaker of the House. Three men were killed on the Selma & New Orleans Railroad. A \$75,000 fire occurred at Marietta, Ga. General Sir Evelyn Wood will probably be appointed Governor of Natal. At a meeting of the Kildukin Land League several members were expelled for paying rents. Rowell, of England, and Coblter, of Chicago, began their 26-hour race in the latter city last night. It is again asserted that the Marquis and Princess have every intention of returning to Canada. Arabic Bey struck M. DeBlignieres, gaoil controller for France, on the street in Cairo yesterday and another revolt is expected. Penitentiary burned at Nashville, Tenn. Loss \$250,000.
