

Kensington Discusses Centennial Year Plans

KENSINGTON — A meeting called by the Kensington Lions Club was held at the Kensington Regional High School Thursday evening for the purpose of informing the people of the club of plans proposed by the club for the celebration of centennial year.

The chairman, Donald Wood, introduced the purpose of the meeting and Eric Jessome gave an account of a visit to Charlottetown by a committee of three, who talked with officers of the central centennial planning committee in conference with members of the central committee, the Kensington group confirmed the dates of July 10, 11, and 12 for a potato blossom festival to be celebrated during the evening of a potato blossom, as well as a beard growing contest and other events suggestive of the horse and buggy days.

The main issue before the meeting, as outlined by Ronald Kennedy, was the Lions Club plan to erect a community memorial recreation centre in the town for the use of all organizations in the Kensington area.

The building would contain an apartment for a caretaker, a restaurant, a fitness director, and an auditorium and adequate kitchen facilities. The basement would be used for such purposes as might be considered necessary by the community.

The proposed building could be easily financed according to plan, by all organizations joining together, and such grants as might be available for general purposes.

Mr. Kennedy stated that a money-raising idea well received by the community was the placing of calves, which would be placed with farmers to be fed until maturity when an auction would be held.

Twenty-six organizations were represented, and a number of speakers from the floor were heard. Mrs. L. G. Ramsay stated the women's institutes were already making plans for centennial year, and mentioned some ideas. Joseph MacDonald of the Catholic Men's association spoke briefly, stressing that "when we build, let us build well."

Mr. Kennedy stated that details being heard from the floor were that the investigation went into high gear last night and he was still interested. There is of course the possibility of a W. Don Campbell of Alberta allowing his name to go before the convention still remained.

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W. Chester S. MacDonald was also reported to be a possible nominee stated yesterday he definitely would not seek the nomination.

Mr. Monkey, who has represented the 5th District of Prince in the legislature for the past five years announced his candidacy on Wednesday.

The Conservative campaign is slated to commence Monday and officials last night stated they were well organized and workers "were very enthusiastic."

Rev. L. P. Callaghan commended the committee on its initiative and came back to the Everett Champion spoke in favor of the idea. Lloyd Lockery outlined a historic and scenic drive being considered.

The delegates from the various organizations were asked to discuss the subject with their groups and come back to a meeting called for March 14, with a "go ahead" if project is not to be forthcoming.

Members of the bar present included Mr. Chester S. MacDonald, Richard S. Hinton Q.C., J. Watson MacNaught Q.C., Neil R. Macdonald, G. Bruce MacDonald, Alexander B. Campbell, Morley M. Bell, George R. McMahon, D. O. Stewart and T. Lealand Lidicker.

Mr. MacNaught presented the petition of Mr. Campbell for admission as attorney and barrister of the court.

Mr. Justice Tweedy, in his remarks to the court and Mr. Campbell said, "I wish to congratulate you very sincerely upon your being admitted as an attorney of this court."

"I have the greatest admiration for you students who are able to assume the duties and obligations of a home and who are able to carry on to a successful conclusion a course of studies. Particularly in your native province and upon your being admitted as an attorney of this court."

He was a member of the O.T.C. and now holds the commissioned rank of lieutenant in the Canadian Army Cadets in Charlottetown. He was active in EMCS County Association in Charlottetown, and in many sports at Acadia University.
