

Gross National Product Reached Record in 1965

OTTAWA (CP) — A year-end report pushed the gross national product of Canada to a record \$51,395,000,000 in 1965, an annual 9.7-per-cent increase over the previous year, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics has reported.

quarter of 1965, said the total value of goods and services produced for final consumption in Canada during October, November and December ran at an annual rate of \$53,760,000,000. Combined with figures for previous three-month periods, this resulted in the \$51,966,000,000 figure for 1965 as a whole.

PRICES RISE

DBS said that price increases have become more evident in the economy as it moved closer to full utilization of its resources. There was a three-per-cent increase in price levels generally last year, and this reduced the 9.7-per-cent gain in total output to about 6.6 per cent in real terms—that is, in actual volume, after having discounted the price rise.

The year as a whole saw gains over a wide range of economic activity," the bureau said. "The scene was perhaps dominated by the strength of investment in non-residential construction, and in machinery and equipment, which were 17 per cent above 1965 levels, with particular emphasis in the manufacturing industry and in electric power, gas and water utilities.

"The capacity of the construction industry was strained during the year, for in addition to business construction government outlays on new fixed capital rose steeply."

Strike Plans Postponed By Doctors

ROME (AP)—Italian doctors have called off a three-day strike set for this week after getting a promise of renewed talks toward solving their feud with the state-run medical insurance system.

The Italian Medical Association, representing the 3,300 doctors in Italy, cancelled its April 26-28 strike plans when Giacinto Bosco, labor and social security minister, worked out arrangements to bring the two sides together this week.

RIPLEY'S BELIEVE IT OR NOT

The year's total figure of \$51,395,000,000 was composed, in the spending stream, of personal expenditure on consumer goods and services amounting to \$22,063,000,000, government expenditures amounting to \$9,396,000,000, business spending on plant and residential construction amounting to \$10,424,000,000 exports of goods, and services amounting to \$11,156,000,000 and an increase in inventories of \$948,000,000. But a deduction was the value of imports of goods and services—\$12,297,000,000.

When the element of price increase was removed by the statisticians from these figures, the GNP for 1965 in 1967 dollars was \$44,680,000,000, which included personal expenditures of \$23,462,000,000, government expenditures amounting to \$7,567,000,000, and business investment amounting to \$8,347,000,000.

SAYS UP 8 PER CENT

DBS said the increase in personal consumption—about eight per cent—was the result of buoyant labor income and expansion of credit purchasing.

Demand for goods and services increased at the same rate, but there was a marked swing towards demand for durable goods, particularly automobiles. This is characteristic of good times when individuals have enough confidence in the future and the stability of steady increase of their income levels to commit themselves to major purchases.

While inventories were up at the year end, they tapered off each quarter. DBS said that the rate of accumulation "when viewed against the levels of production, did not appear to be unduly high."

Because of demand pressures, the rate of imports rose, particularly in the latter part of 1965. The bureau previously announced the current account deficit for the year was \$1,000,000,000 up sharply from roughly \$400,000,000.

TO BUILD DAM

DAMASCUS (AP) — Official Syrian newspapers reported Saturday the Soviet Union has signed an agreement to finance and build the biggest economic project in the country—a giant dam on the Euphrates River in northeastern Syria. The dam is designed to irrigate 1,500,000 acres of land and provide electric power to start building heavy industry.

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Bosco talked at length about the medical insurance situation with representatives of both sides and with labor unions, whose millions of workers have been caught in the middle of the feud.

The doctors staged a one-day strike early last week and launched a nationwide boycott, refusing to treat patients unless the patients paid in cash.

Under the insurance plans covering an estimated 45,000,000 of Italy's 52,000,000 population, both doctor and patient normally fill out forms and the state-run medical insurance agencies take care of the doctor's fee. The patient lays out no cash.

But the doctors had struck as their contract with the state system expired. The doctors' association has accused the medical insurance agencies of unfair treatment in the way payment rates are set up.

Saturday night the doctors said they would call off this week's 72-hour strike and go back to the regular way of handling patients' paperwork without cash payment.

But they said they would do so provisionally until April 30, deciding then on possible further strikes and boycotts if unsatisfied with the progress of negotiations arranged by Bosco.
