

# Fate Of Nashua Will Be Decided Today At Sale

NEW YORK (AP)—The fate of Nashua, the big 3-year-old champion and 1955 American No. 1 horse, is expected to be cleared up today when the famous Belmont racing stable is dissolved. Sealed bids for Nashua and other horses from the late William Woodward, Jr.'s Belmont Stud

are to be opened at the Hanover Bank here. It is up to the Hanover Bank and John W. Ludwig, executors of the estate, whether to accept bids for Nashua and the rest of the racing and breeding stable. Ludwig served for many years as secretary to William Woodward, Sr., who founded the stable 45 years ago, and then for the younger Woodward upon the death of his father in 1953. Young Woodward, 35, died of accidental gunshot wounds inflicted by his wife Oct. 30. Estimates have placed the value of Nashua at anywhere from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000. The son of Nasrullah is insured for \$750,000. Nashua's total earnings of \$945,415 put him second only to Citation, the world's greatest money-winning horse. Nashua picked up \$752,550 in purses this year, most ever earned by a horse in one season.
