Tells Of Fifty Years In Anglican Women's Auxiliary

"Fifty years in the W.A." was the subject matter of an instructive and interesting paper prepared and read by Mrs. J. G. Townsend at a meeting held in St. Mark's Hall, Kensington on the evening of October 2nd, 1957, just 50 after the organization of New London Branch. Women's Auxiliary to the Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada as it was then known. The branch was organized on October 2nd, 1907. The society of which Mrs. Townsend is president, is now known as St. Mark's Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Anglican Church of Canada, and three other branches in New London Parish are known as St. Stephen's, St. Thomas' and Sea View composed of approx-

mately 60 members, a small but important part of the \$2,000 member organization throughout Canada. In addition there is one Girl's Auxiliary, 3 Junior Auxiliaries and four Little helpers groups active in the parish. Mrs. Townsend said the first president was Mrs. A.W. Nicholls, the rector's wife; first vice-president: Mrs. W.J. Paynter of St. Stephen's Church; and vice-president: Mrs. Harry Harding of St. Thomas'. Mrs. J.B. Proffitt: St. Mark's; Rec. Sec'y: Miss Laura Walker of St. Mark's; Mrs. James B. Millman (now Mrs. J. G. Townsend): corresponding secretary. The membership fee was ten cents. The first Dorcas work was a quilt, the first of many to be made and sent to a succession of mission schools, along with many pieces of clothing and other articles. In addition to the W.A. pledge money was given to many other worthy causes from time to time.

Duplessis Will Continue To Guard Rights In Education

MONTREAL (CP) - Premier Maurice Duplessis said in effect Saturday that he would continue to guard jealously provincial rights in the field of education regardless of the recent change in the federal government. Speaking at ceremonies marking the laying out of cornerstones for a new wing of Notre Dame College, of which he is a former student, the president said: "Neither the triumphant blue of the sky nor the red glow of the setting sun will prevent me from upholding the rights of the province in the field of education."

In Quebec blue is traditionally associated with conservative parties while red is the liberal color. The premier compared the cornerstone of the new wing-to-housing a 400-seat auditorium, a swimming pool and a club for alumni to Quebec's houses of education. "These are the cornerstones of our civilized country," he said, "as fundamental truths are ir-

radiates from them." From 1898 to 1902, Premier Duplessis took his primary studies of the college, which stands opposite St. Joseph Oratory, a Catholic Shrine erected on Mount Royal. Both institutions are run by the Congregation of the Holy Cross. The premier told his audience, which included Mayor Jean Drapeau, members of the provincial cabinet and alumni of the school, that the materialism prevalent in modern societies makes it imperative to come back to spiritual values. "Our constitutional rights in the field of education are the results of heroic fights and the best guardian of these rights is our clergy," he said. The Quebec regime is the only one in Canada, if not indeed in the whole world, which recognizes the vital role members of the clergy have to play and are playing in educational matters, he asserted.

Accident And Disaster Work Under Review

Mr. Gordon MacDonald and Mrs. Harry Cutmore, of the Provincial Red Cross, met with members of Alberton Disaster Services Thursday evening. W. Currie presided over the meeting which was held in the High School at 8 p.m. Reports were received from committees on shelter, clothing and first aid. Since the last meeting assistance has been given to six families west of Bloomfield who suffered loss of homes and clothing by fire. Fire Chief Stephen M. Burke was welcomed to the meeting which is the first one held since his appointment. Mr. MacDonald reported some of the experience gained by a Disaster Services team from Charlottetown who assisted in relief work following the mine explosion at Springhill, N.S. He stressed the necessity of having a definite headquarters for the Disaster Services and of having it marked by a flag, and of the need for identification for Red Cross workers in time of disaster. He also explained the value of a central clothing depot in time of disaster. In addressing the meeting on accident prevention, Mrs. Cutmore stated that from January to August, 831 accident victims had received treatment in the Charlottetown hospitals. Of this number 559 were men or boys and 272 were women. Accidents in the home were responsible for 330 of these injuries. These statistics clearly reveal the
