LIFE ON A FARM.

It has its Pleasures and its Pains. "What were the best three years of my life?" repeated the boarding-house man, after a search will go to the school teacher. "That's not hard to tell. The best three years I ever lived were upon a farm. I was about 11 years old then. My folks moved to the farm in search of health, and worked so hard they moved back to the city again, looking for something better. It isn't stuffed up with telegraph and telephone and electric light wires and a thousand other obstructions. You can shout and no one is around to think you crazy. You can run a foot race with your shadow and there's no one to say you nay. You can wade in the creek that always runs through any well regulated farm, full of minnows and frogs and pure crystal water. You can fall flat on the bank and drink to your heart's content and you need not be afraid of sewer gas. There's only one place in the world for a growing boy and that is on a good, big farm, run by a good-natured, sensible farmer.

What does the city boy know about the world? He thinks he knows it all. He couldn't tell a yellow jacket from a bumble bee. He couldn't tell which part of a harness to put on the horse first. That reminds me of the city boy I've come to our farm one summer. I took him to town one day and he got out to loosen the harness so the horse might drink. And what do you suppose he did? Unloosed the check! No, the untanned youngster actually unbacked the straps before I saw what he was doing.

"What's the nearest job the boy gets on the farm?" "The nearest by all odds is driving the team for the hay fork. Any abolition boy would rather suffer the consequences of playing hooky than drive the wagon, drive the team to the field, load the barn door and off you go. The team goes about three rods and stops. You turn around and come back with them. Then the same process is repeated at intervals. I was not long in taking in the situation and quietly, but with determination to avoid any hostilities, slid around the corner, leaving the horses stranded at the end of the rope pulling their eyes blind.
