### N. Z. Maori Preparing For Canoe Voyage

By J. C. GRAHAM Canadian Press Correspondent HAMILTON, N.Z. (CP) — A New Zealand Maori is preparing for a canoe voyage reminiscent of the famed Kon Tiki raft journey across the Pacific.

The origin of the Maoris of New Zealand is a matter of dispute. But without doubt they came by way of the various tropical islands farther north, probably from as far north as Hawaii.

There is evidence too that some of them returned north again after visiting the new land, and gave sailing directions to those who remained there. As a result organized migrations were made to New Zealand about six centuries ago.

VENTURE SANCTIONED Now Mark Meteking, a Maori school teacher, is planning to retrace the route of that great migration, using a canoe similar to the one used by his ancestors.

Already Meteking has obtained sanction from the marine department for his voyage.

The government has authorized a search of Kauri forests for a suitable tree from which to build the canoe. The Kauri tree, native to New Zealand, yields magnificent wood for canoe making.

Meteking will seek the help of Maoris at Ngauruanui, a town on the Waikato River, who still build canoes. The craft for the voyage will probably be a double-hulled canoe with reed mats, sails, of the kind in which the Maori migrants are thought to have travelled to New Zealand.

Already the sponsors of the voyage has received numerous applications for places in the canoe, both from Maoris and from white New Zealanders.

MAY TAKE WHITES The question of the racial composition of the venture has raised a problem for its promoter.

"It will be a big question—men in the crew? We want to make the trip as near authentic as possible. But on the other hand, if we had polishes in the crew, it would be a demonstration to the world of our way of life in New Zealand."

One thing is certain—all the crew will be required to undergo a rigorous course of preparation to train hard and to be perfectly fit.

"We will not be able to take large supplies of food," Meteking says. "The crew will have to live on concentrated foods and on what can be caught from the sea."

### Sentences Cut For Cox, Paton

WINNIPEG (CP) — Two Toronto businessmen Wednesday won a reduction to four years each of their sentences for conspiracy to defraud and publication of false prospectus and had their convictions quashed on three other counts.

Hugh Paton, 42, and Dr. Herbert Cox, 47, former owners of Brandon Packers Limited, were in the Manitoba Court of Appeal to hear the result of their appeal against convictions and sentences passed in Brandon last Nov. 21.

Harry Walsh, counsel for Paton, said a further appeal will be made to the Supreme Court of Canada. The men have been free on bail of \$35,000 each and are expected to ask Chief Justice C. C. Miller for extension of the bail pending the appeal to the country's highest court.

ARRESTED IN 1961 The men were arrested in Toronto Jan. 21, 1961. After a 39-day trial in Brandon, they were found guilty by a 12-man jury on each of five counts of an indictment charging:

- 1. Conspiracy to steal \$400,000 from Brandon Packers Limited;
- 2. Theft of \$440,000 from the firm;
- 3. Conspiracy to defraud Brandon Packers of \$400,000;
- 4. Defrauding the firm of \$44,000.

They were also charged with a false prospectus for a \$400,000 Brandon Packers bond issue in 1958.

### Link Is Forged With Old Posts

CAMP SHILO, Man. (CP) — A link with Manitoba's trading post era was forged with the opening of the Canadian Army's new shopping centre here.

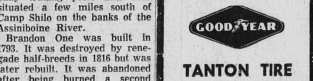
In a ceremony at which Lt.-Gov. Erick F. Willis presided, the centre was given the name Brandon House Number Four.

The name has historical significance for the region, recalling that three Hudson Bay Company trading posts had been situated a few miles south of Camp Shilo on the banks of the Assiniboine River.

Brandon One was built in 1793. It was destroyed by renegade half-breeds in 1816 but was later rebuilt. It was abandoned after being burned a second time and Brandon Two was built in 1818 on the south bank, only to be abandoned three years later.

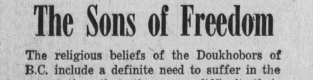
