Massachusetts Temperance Legislation.

BOSTON, May 1.—The state senate to-
day substitutes for the house bill on the
liquor question a bill to abolish the pub-
lic bar cause of the present law. All the
points of order against the proposed sub-
stitute bill were overruled by President
Sprague.

Their Wives on a "Toot."

BERLIN, May 1.—Three-fourths of the
male inhabitants of Hasseret, Sars coun-
ty, Hungary, having emigrated to
America, they sent back enough money
to take their wives over. The wives in-
stead of going to join their husbands with
the money have begun a disgraceful
drunken carousal, which the authorities
are unable to stop.

Nelson's Stallions.

BANGOR, April 29.—C. H. Nelson,
of Waterville, offers to wager \$20,000
that his great stallion, Nelson, can
beat any trotting horse in the world,
and there are lots of men in Maine
who would like to take a part of that
bet, or make another one like it. It
is confidently expected by eastern
horsemen that Nelson will be rein-
stated by the National association,
but whether he is or not everybody
looks for a considerable lowering of
the great stallion record this summer.
Mr. Nelson is anxious for his horse to
get below 2.10, being a trifle nervous
over the close approach of Stamboul.

German Baptist Love Feasts.

LONDON, Pa., April 28.—The Dunk-
ard Brethren, or German Baptists,
held the first of their annual series of
love feasts on Friday and the cere-
monies concluded to-night. The leading
feature of this service is the concluding
one, which is the washing of each
others feet. The men sat on one side
of the meeting house and the women
on the other. Then each man washed
the feet of four or five of his brethren
and wiped them dry with a towel and
kissed them twice. The women go
through the same ceremony among
themselves. Not a pair of corsets
could be found in the entire assem-
blage, the Dunkards frowning down
such earthly appliances.

Alcohol and Morality.

Dr. T. L. Wright points out most
forcibly the deadly effects of liquor on
the moral element of man's nature.
This, though one of the most serious
aspects liquor abuse, is rarely dwelt
upon by teachers and writers on tem-
perance in the manner it merits. Not
only does liquor wreck the physical
constitution and impair the powers of
the brain, but it most insidiously un-
dermines the moral nature. In dis-
cussing this phase of the question, Dr.
Wright says:—

"In general terms, it may be said
that no instance has been recorded
where the influence of alcohol upon a
good man, when carried to its full ex-
tent, has failed to taint his moral na-
ture. Nor has an instance ever
been known of a character so base,
so bestial and inhuman, that alco-
hol could not sink it still lower.
It seems, in fact, true, as far as
the world's experience extends, that
the depths of depravity into which
alcohol may plunge the human soul
have never yet been sounded. In its
position as a wrecker of good morals,
alcohol stands 'proudly eminent.' Few
things are so bad as to have no good
in them; but, aside from certain prop-
erties available in therapeutics, alco-
hol seems, in its impressions on the
human organism, to be singularly bad.
In all its long and dreary history, it
has never been known to add any
thing whatever to a man's real char-
acter for piety, or sympathy, or love
to his family, or kindness to his fel-
low man.

"Alcohol deadens the conscience of
anyone who partakes of it; let his mo-
tives in drinking be what they may.
The casual drinker often partakes of
alcohol without any clearly defined pur-
pose, certainly without the slightest in-
tention of committing an unlawful act.
Yet, the poison affects him as it does
others; it paralyzes his conscience, the
acuteness of his sensibilities is blunted,
and he is peculiarly liable to be led
into improper and unlawful conduct.
The drinker is deprived of intellectual
soundness as well as of moral capacity;
and yet the law says 'Drunkenness is
no excuse for crime.'

"Shakespeare knew the deadly spell
that alcohol casts on morality:
'If I can fasten but one cup upon him
With that which he hath drunk to night
He'll be as full of quarrel and offence
As my young mistress's dog,'
saith 'honest Iago.'
"A person intoxicated will commit
offences in thought, in speech, and in
conduct, which in his sober moods he
would view with abhorrence. The
tendency of drunkenness is inevitably
toward crime."

A Prohibition Meeting.

The members of Parliament favorable
to prohibition will meet the officials of the
Dominion Alliance on Tuesday next,
when it is believed that it will be decided
to introduce a resolution in favor of pro-
hibition and to test the sense of the new
House.

There was a general roar of laughter
when the member for West Hastings read
a petition in favor of prohibition of the
liquor traffic. The member for West
Hastings is Mr. Henry Corby, the well-
known distiller.

Over 150 petitions were presented in
the Commons to-day, and nearly 500 in
the Senate. They were nearly all in
favor of prohibition, Sabbath observance
and amendments to laws asked by
labor legislation.—Gazette.
