**THE DEVELOPMENT OF INDUSTRIES THROUGH PATENT-ED REPORTED.**

(Communication from Messrs Marion & Marion, Solicitors of patents and experts, New York Life Building, Montreal).

Prior to January 1st, 1891, 236,136 patents (not including 9,957 patents granted prior to 1836), were issued by the United States. These included all patented inventions exhibited at the centennial exposition at Philadelphia, an exposition of which the most striking and important feature was its display of the improvements in industrial art brought about by American invention, a display which was a revelation to all who visited that exposition and was justly attributed to the stimulus given to invention by the United States patent system. It was believed by many that the inventions there exhibited represented the highest development possible, that there was no further room for improvement in any of the arts at least. Yet, the effect of this exposition was not, as might have been expected, to discourage invention or to convince inventors that nothing more remained to be done, that the field of invention was exhausted, but to largely stimulate invention. For three years after this exposition, the number of applications for patents received was less each year by fully one thousand than in 1876; but in 1880 the number was nearly five thousand more. In 1882 ten thousand more than in 1876 were received. Last year the number received was, by six thousand, more than twice the number received in 1876.
