Samuel Cousins Funeral Held

The funeral of the late Samuel Cousins was held Wednesday afternoon, August 7, at the Pownal United Church. A large assembly gathered to pay respect to one who was highly regarded in the community.

The Reverend T.R. Goudge began the service with prayer. The 23rd psalm was then sung. Mrs. Nathaniel McKinnon was the organist.

Rev. Passey of the Baptist Church read the scriptures. The selections were favorites of the deceased, the 90th psalm, the 121st, part of the 14th chapter of St. John and part of 1 Corinthians, chapter 15. Mr. Passey offered prayer and the hymn "Unto the Hills Around" was sung.

Mr. Goudge gave the funeral address. He spoke from the 103rd psalm with special reference to verses 14 and 22. He referred to the great span of life attained by Mr. Cousins who was in his 93rd year. During the visits of his pastor, Mr. Goudge, the deceased always enquired about the community friends.

The hymn "Abide With Me" closed the service. The pall bearers were Layton Jones, Wallace Brehaut, Nathaniel McKinnon, George MacLennan, John MacMillan and Cyril Jones. Although the immediate relatives had requested no flowers, the floral tributes were lovely.

The funeral arrangements were under the direction of the Cutcliffe Funeral Parlours.

MONTREAL (CP) — Unless a reasonable settlement is reached in the strike of seamen aboard the Canadian National West Indies Steamships, the line may be forced to change registry or abandon the service, J. A. Sauve, general manager of the service, said Tuesday.

"There isn't much we can do," Mr. Sauve said, when asked what the company's next move would be in the dispute which has held the line's ships at anchor since July 11. "I see no way out of this situation as long as Mr. Hal Banks continues to insist on his wage demands."

The Seafarers' International Union, headed by Banks, is asking for a 30 percent wage increase for some 200 unlicensed personnel it represents on the company's ships.

Five of the company's eight vessels are tied up in Montreal and the other three in Halifax.

ONLY FLEET
Canadian National Steamships, which operates on the Canada West Indies run, has the only fleet of ocean going freighters on regular service under Canadian registry.

A change of registry by the company would mean the virtual end of Canada's merchant marine, which numbered 300 ships 10 years ago.

Ships under British registry can pay an able seaman \$78.76 a month compared with \$204 on Canadian ships. Union demands
