

Space And Staff Are Problems As School Opens

Educationists are tackling space and staff problems as Canadian children begin flocking back to school in greater numbers than ever.
When classrooms reopen in September — Saskatchewan high schools have already opened — enrolment is expected to be five to 10 per cent higher in almost every part of the country.
School boards in Newfoundland have the biggest headache. Children have been able to stay longer at school since Newfoundland entered Confederation in 1949 and its citizens began receiving family allowances. Adding to the congestion are the province's scattered population and lack of roads, which make it difficult to distribute classrooms. Some have fewer than 10 pupils, others more than 50. There have been more than 20 each.

TEACHER PROBLEM
Isolation and low salaries contribute to Newfoundland's teacher shortage. Sixty per cent of its teachers have less than junior matriculation and less than a year's professional training.
The city of Regina has made one of the more successful assaults on the problem of population. Regina's students increased by seven per cent to 18,500 this year — mainly in the suburbs, where one school doubled its enrolment.
But three new schools and additions to three others enabled Regina to beat its space difficulties, and the need for teachers was met by recruiting 600 from the United Kingdom, Europe and the United States.
Another successful centre is Saint John, N.B., where authorities describe conditions as the best in nearly 10 years. A low turnover of teachers has meant few vacancies to fill. Little overcrowding is expected.
In British Columbia congestion is not serious. But a shortage of high school teachers is anticipated, even though the province — with Ontario — offers the highest salaries in Canada.
Alberta, like B.C., is pressing elementary teachers into service to ease a shortage of high school teachers.

NEW SCHOOL DESIGN
Alberta has solved its space problem with a building program that includes several schools of a Chisholm at their summer home in Georgetown.

QUEBEC PROGRAM
In Quebec large numbers of simple, functional schoolhouses are being built. The program is expected to handle the increasing school population again this year, when another 50,000 students are expected to bring the total to 1,050,000.
Quebec authorities say the province's teaching staffs could be strengthened but the shortage is not expected to grow worse. Few changes in curriculum are to be introduced in Canadian schools this year.
