

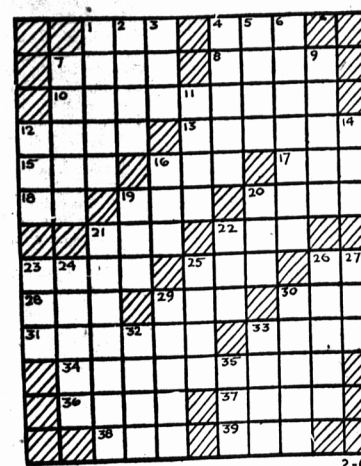

Suggests Fifty Mile Dam Across The Bering Strait

By SIDNEY WEILAND MOSCOW (Reuters)—A Soviet engineer, A. Markin, has suggested that a dam across the 50 mile-wide Bering Strait, dividing Siberia from Alaska, would warm up North America and Siberia. Markin's theory is that this could be brought about by using the principle on which the Gulf Stream acts as "warm radiator" for northwestern Europe. In an article in the magazine Novy Mir, he refers to the scheme as a "climate factory." Markin maintains that: 1. A dam would keep icebergs and arctic currents out of the Pacific. 2. The dam could contain huge quantities of propellers driven by atomic power, which would pump warm water from the Pacific ocean into the Arctic sea. "But now," he continues, "the position is different. The development of nuclear physics, the real possibility of building big atomic power stations—all that opens a broad road to an unlimited abundance of electric power. Arctic ice over Siberia and Canada's far north. At the same time, he adds, warm southern currents from the Pacific would be able to shore of the Soviet far east and the northwest coast of North America. An advantage to the Soviet Union, Markin says, would be that its Arctic coast line, extending from the White sea to the Bering strait, would be navigable year round. This, with the improvement in climate, would stimulate development of Siberia. Markin says the scheme was at first thought impractical because of doubts about the source of energy needed to drive the propellers. "But now," he continues, "the position is different. The development of nuclear physics, the real possibility of building big atomic power stations—all that opens a broad road to an unlimited abundance of electric power."

New York Stock Market Made Strong Advance During Week

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market forced its way up strongly last week in the face of a lot of obstacles. It was the best weekly rise since early November. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks gained \$4.40 and closed at \$177.60, only \$3.90 away from last year's record high. One of the greatest deterrents to market progress this week was inertia on the part of traders. They just didn't appear to want to get into the market until they felt the market had a little more momentum. Business was the slowest since the first week of November. One of the things that held traders back was a disposition to await word from President Eisenhower on whether he intends to run for a second term. But as the week progressed the idea spread that he would go up no matter what the president decided. Pleasing but not too surprising were the reports of record high earnings of corporate giants—Standard Oil (N.J.), U. S. Steel, Union Carbide, General Motors, Kennecott Copper—and there were forecasts of as good or better earnings to come. Blue chip stocks were among the strongest during the week.

Gradual Tax Reduction Is Urged By Chamber

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian Chamber of Commerce today urged a government policy of gradual tax reduction and called for a re-examination of every aspect of government spending. The chamber's executive council, in a brief presented to Finance Minister Harris and Revenue Minister McCann, said "whatever margin may be available for tax reduction in the next few years is threatened by undesirable severity of the many demands for additional expenditures which are heard at this time." The brief asked the government not to assume "large-scale additional commitments of a lasting and expanding character and to look for 'new ways and means of performing existing functions more efficiently and more economically.'" The chamber urged a thorough public review of defence policies "to provide some intelligent basis against which defence spending could be considered." TOP PRIORITY For national security reasons, defence requirements must continue to take top priority in federal expenditures, the brief said but the taxpayer should be given a clearer understanding of how his money was being used. The chamber urged a further reduction in corporation income tax rates. It forecast rapid technological progress in which competition would require heavy capital investment and the willingness and ability to accept substantial risks. It said personal income taxes are still too high for a developing country. Though there had been some reduction, income tax rates still fall with undesirable severity on the proprietors of many small businesses and on the employees who have reached the middle income level. The brief said certain excise taxes imposed during the Second World and Korean Wars should be removed. Their continuance "constitutes a serious form of discrimination against certain industries." The brief was presented by a delegation headed by O.B. Thornton of Montreal, chairman of the executive council.

Forecast Good Steel Demand

CLEVELAND (AP)—Freight car orders, shipbuilding needs, construction demands and inventory rebuilding will help keep the steel industry operating at capacity through the second quarter despite auto makers' cutbacks, Steel magazine says today. Steel says two weeks of capacity operations by mills would be needed to provide the finished product for freight cars alone. It reported there were 147,320 cars on order Jan. 1-10 times as many as at the start of 1955. Each car requires about 2 1/2 tons of steel. Shipbuilders took \$166,400,000 worth of navy contracts for seven destroyers and three frigates, Steel says. Construction orders amount to a Jan. 1 backlog of 2,243,046 net tons, the largest such backlog since 1952, the magazine adds. The weekly metal-working journal reports its latest inventory and delivery survey showed 16 per cent of the consumers who responded plan higher inventories in the next three months. Last quarter only 12 per cent of the consumers answering had such plans. The ingot output rate went down a half point last week to 99 per cent of capacity, and Steel's price composite on finished steel dropped nine cents to \$127.91, reflecting minor revisions in basic prices for wire. The downward trend from the \$53.33 gross ton peak of three weeks ago continued in the steel-making scrap market which dropped \$1 to \$50.50 last week.

Qumran Doctrines In Early Hebrew Writing

Similarities between certain New Testament writings and pre-Christian documents found recently on the Dead Sea shore have caused a minor revolution in Bible scholarship. This claim is made in a broadcast talk Monday night by John Allegro, one of two British members of an international team translating documents found in 1947. The scrolls, found by a Bedouin boy in a cave in Judea, are considered the earliest known Bible writings. Three of the manuscripts comprise the book of Isaiah, a commentary on the book of Habakkuk, and a manual containing rules and regulations of an ancient Jewish sect. UNFOLD SCROLL One of the copper scrolls has been unfolded at the university here. A portion of the scrolls have been translated by McGill University in Montreal, Tuesday and Friday. Allegro maintained that similar titles shown by the scrolls pointed to a common religious background for the early Christian church and the Qumran sect. It had been suggested, he said, they both had their roots in an "ill defined religious group called the Essenes." If so, much was explained. According to historians, communities of these people were living in Judea in Jesus' time. Following the lives of brethren in the Dead Sea monastery. "It is not difficult to see how the disciples and Jesus himself came into contact with Qumran doctrines and documents," Allegro said.
