Exports of Newsprint, Wheat and Oil Up

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's exports of newsprint, wheat and oil rose sharply in the first 11 months of 1956 as total shipments climbed to an all-time high.

Newsprint increased by about \$49,000,000 to \$651,642,000 from \$602,142,000 in the similar 11 months of 1955, the bureau of statistics reported Thursday.

Wheat shipments jumped by some \$165,000,000 to \$478,694,000 from \$313,733,000.

Exports of oil and oil products almost tripled to \$101,655,000 from \$34,250,000.

These and other gains boosted total exports to a high of \$4,453,300,000 from \$3,970,400,000. Imports in those 11 months, however, outpaced exports, climbing to \$5,312,000,000 from \$4,326,500,000. The deficit — excess of imports over exports — totalled \$836,700,000, up from \$356,100,000 in 1955.

Turkish Woman Awarded B.E.M.

ISTANBUL (AP) — Emine Heil Neval, 18-year-old Turkish house wife from Cyprus, has been awarded the British Empire Medal for tackling an armed Cypriot rebel who had just killed a policeman.

The presentation was made in Istanbul by Consul General Philip Broad. Emine, her young husband and their family were moved to Turkey by the British government to protect them from the EOKA underground, fighting to unite Britain's east Mediterranean colony with Greece.

Two Greek Cypriot youths last April 23 shot down a Turkish Cypriot policeman who was chasing them following an earlier gun assault. Emine saw the policeman fall and flung herself at one of the youths, holding him until help arrived.

Turks on Cyprus oppose the move to make the island Greek.

MONTREAL (CP) — The U.S. dollar closed Monday at a discount of 3 1/2 per cent in terms of Canadian funds, down 1-1/2.

Toronto Stocks

TORONTO (CP)—Mining issues led the rest of the stock market to a decisive decline Monday in moderate trading.

Speculative junior mines and higher-priced seniors were the main influences on the trend. Refining oils, pipelines and utilities were the weaker industrial groups. Western oils declined in a solid line.

The market opened mixed to lower but soon after it was heading down in all sections. It touched its low for the day about 1 1/2 hours before the close.

Index losses were as follows: golds, 83 to 78.45; base metals 1.28 to 2.22 1/2; western oils 1.89 to 2.62 1/2.

Observers said the decline was a result of technical factors, including profit-taking, following the solid advances recorded in recent sessions. They said it was to be expected in the mining and western oil sections, since those stocks had pushed ahead on little development reports.

Senior base metal losses were generally less than a point but International Nickel dipped a point. Pronto had the steepest uranium loss, off 35 cents, and Hoyle dipped 30 cents among junior base metals.

Triad, one of 15 western oil index stocks, lost 25 cents while other losses were less than 20 cents. National Petroleum added 30 cents in light trading.

IN MEMORIAM

JOHN L. NICHOLSON
Surrounding districts were saddened on Nov. 28th, to learn of the passing of John L. Nicholson, highly respected and life-long resident of Crapaud. The son of the late George and Annie (MacCallum) Nicholson, he was fifty-seven years of age. Jack, as he was familiarly known, was in all health for over three years and in spite of the best medical skill and tender nursing he passed peacefully away on the above date.

He was a kind and loving husband and father, a good neighbour and a hospitable host. A loyal and active member of the Crapaud United Church he served as Elder, Steward and Trustee and will be greatly missed by the congregation. He also took a very active part in all public enterprises being president of Crapaud Rink Co., Vice-President of Crapaud Creamery Co. and Vice-President of the Exhibition Association. Deeply interested in Agriculture and livestock he was a successful farmer occupying the original Nicholson homestead which has been handed down through five generations of the family.

He is survived by his wife the former Gladys Dunsford, two sons, George, farming, the homesteader and James on the staff of the Dominion Experimental Farm, Charlottetown; one brother, Prof. G. H. Nicholson, University of Vermont; and three grandsons. His only sister Marion, Mrs. Ernest Harvey, predeceased him in 1950.

The funeral which was held from Crapaud United Church was very largely attended. The service was conducted by his pastor, Rev. Lloyd Archer, assisted by Rev. George Ebsary of St. John's Anglican Church both of whom were attentive visitors during his illness. Dr. Peter MacDonald, who was his friend and physician, played the organ. The hymns were "The Lord is My Shepherd" and "By Cool Streams Shedsy Hill." A duet, "God's Way is the Best Way," was feelingly sung by Dr. Peter MacDonald and Ibi down 3/4.

Western oils gave ground as Royalty and Bailey Wood slipped major fractions. Del Rio lost 1/4 cent. El Sol, Mercedes and Cheskirk firmed under 10 cents while Merrill Island, Bateman Bay and Cat eased. Steep Rock dropped 1/4 cent among seniors.

The exchanges closing averages show banks off 3.6 at 55.63, utilities off 1.1 at 138.9, industrials off 0.6 at 294.5, combined off 0.7 at 242.7, papers off 1.49 at 1368.17 and golds off 0.32 at 73.73.

Montreal Stocks

MONTREAL (CP) — The Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges moved lower throughout moderate trading Monday and closed with industrial losses ranging to a point and more.

Aluminum and International Nickel were point losers in base metals while Algoma dropped 2 cents. Petroleum led refining oils down, losing 1 1/4.

The recently-strong bank group eased as Royal lost 1 and Nova Scotia 3/4. Papers showed Donohue off 1/4 and International and Abitibi down 3/4.

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Plan New National Park In Nova Scotia

OTTAWA (CP)—A national historic park at Grand Pre, N.S., will be proclaimed as soon as purchase agreements are completed with present owners of the property, Resources Minister Lesage said Thursday.

He said in the Commons that terms already have been agreed on with the Dominion Atlantic Railway, owner of the existing park, and the Societe De L'Assomption, which owns a museum there.

The cabinet had authorized the purchase agreements.

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Name First Station On New Rail Line

MONTREAL (CP)—The Canadian National Railways Thursday named the first station stop on a new 23-mile branch line under construction in New Brunswick.

The name is Heath Steele, to commemorate the mine which will be served by the new rail line running west from Bartibog, N.B., near Newcastle, on the CNR's Montreal-Halifax main line.

Work on the branch line began last September and will be finished late this year.
