Sudden Death Of Heatherdale Man Yesterday

The death occurred very suddenly at his home in Heatherdale yesterday morning of Mr. Allan N. MacDonald in his 79th year. He died in his sleep about 7 o'clock. Although in failing health in recent years, he had been about as usual and on Saturday had attended the funeral of a neighbor, Mr. Norman F. MacPherson.

He was born in Kilmuir, a son of the late Neil and Mary MacDonald, and was the second youngest of a family of seven. He was a prosperous farmer and outstanding man in the community.

He leaves to mourn, besides his widow, nee Margaret MacPherson, five sons and four daughters. The sons are Hugh and Bruce in hCathlam, Ontario; Martin, Heatherdale; Preston, Georgetown; and Gordon on the home farm in Heatherdale. The daughters are Bessie, Mrs. Allan Cameron, Caledonia; Florrie, Mrs. Bruce Stewart, Souris; Sybil, Charlottetown; and Marjorie at home. A sister, Mrs. Alex J. MacLeod of Montague also survives.

The funeral will be held Wednesday afternoon from the Kilmuir United Church.

Damage Action Against Railway In Supreme Court

The November sitting of the Supreme Court at Georgetown resumed yesterday morning with Mr. Justice Mark R. McGuigan presiding.

The case to come up was an action for damages, Helena L. Robertson, plaintiff, executrix for Allan Herbert Robertson, deceased testate vs. the Canadian National Railways, defendant and Chester Burke, third party.

Messrs. D. L. Mathieson, K.C. and G. R. Foster were counsel for the plaintiff and F. A. Large, K.C. and Roy MacDougall, a member of the New Brunswick Bar from Moncton, for the defendant. Mr. John P. Nicholson represented Chester Burke, the third party.

The action is taken under the Fatal Accidents Act of 1938, and is seeking \$63,000 damages in respect of injuries to the said Allan Herbert Robertson and his death caused by the negligent operation of the defendant's railway by the defendant's servants at a level crossing.

The accident in question occurred on Sept. 25, 1930, at a crossing between Georgetown and Cardigan, and not far from the latter place. The car was driven by Chester Burke.

Most of the morning was taken up with the selection of a jury and by legal argument by counsel. The jury includes: Edwin McIntyre, foreman, Montague Head, Hugh D. Campbell, Red Point, Clifford Bryenton, Souris, Clive Bruce, Priest Pond, Howard Bulpitt, Rosemeath, Hugh McIsaac, Souris, Alberton Acorn, Cardigan, R.R.

At the afternoon sitting five witnesses were called by the plaintiff Dr. George Inman, Montague, J. A. Reardon, Provincial land surveyor, Charlottetown, Norman Saunders, photographer, Charlottetown, Ralph Gordon, Rosemeath and Chester Burke, Fortune. The latter was adjured on the stand when court adjourned until today.

Montague Town Council Meeting Last Night

The regular meeting of the Montague Town Council, which was postponed last week, was held in the council room last night with His Worship, Mayor B. H. Yeo, presiding.

The minutes of the last regular meeting and special meeting were read by the clerk and approved. Two bills were held in abeyance for further discussion, and all others ordered paid.

The street committee reported that 24-inch culverts had been installed at the bus parking lot, G.N.R. station, MacDonald Avenue, and Imperial Oil Station Road. It was moved that the members of the light committee accompany Mr. R. K. Clements, Maritime Electric representative, to inspect the lights of the town.

A committee of the Mayor, and Councillors McGowan and Reynolds was appointed to draw up a program for travelling the streets in the town. This program is scheduled to get under way this week.

Considerable discussion ensued regarding the tax arrears, and on motion it was decided to publish a notice in the press to the effect that all tax arrears must be settled on or before December 10th, 1951, or delinquent taxes will be handed over for collection, and legal proceedings taken forthwith.

The town clerk, Mr. B. N. Hooley, presented his resignation to take effect on December 31st, of this year.

Several other matters were briefly discussed before the meeting adjourned.
