

Ten Million Is Latest Guess In Bank Robbery

BROCKVILLE, Ont. (CP) — Thieves who smashed into the vault of the Brockville Trust and Savings Company last weekend may have made off with the biggest haul in North American history.

The Recorder and Times said Wednesday an "official source," which it did not identify, has placed the total loot at nearly \$10,000,000.

The source estimated the value of registered securities and stocks at nearly \$7,000,000 along with \$2,500,000 in bearer bonds, \$20,000 in cash and an undetermined amount of jewelry.

Previously the largest robbery in North American records was 16 months ago when thieves rifled 132 safety deposit boxes in a Montreal bank. Police estimated between \$4,000,000 and \$8,000,000 worth of valuables were taken—they said an exact tally of the boxes' contents was impossible to make.

Officials of Brockville Trust and Savings, a branch of the Montreal Trust Company, have refused to confirm or deny The Recorder and Times report. Tuesday company officials estimated the total at \$3,765,000. On Monday they gave the figure as \$2,265,000.

Only the bearer bonds, which make up about a quarter of the reported total, are negotiable by the thieves, officials said earlier. The registered bonds can only be marketed by those to whom they are registered.

NAB SECOND SUSPECT

Police in Montreal Wednesday picked up a second suspect for questioning in the robbery.

One Montreal report said the man was also being questioned in connection with another trust company robbery there last January. The report adds that three other suspects now are being sought and that two others—a man and a woman—were questioned Tuesday night and released.

Officers of the Montreal police, the Brockville police, Ontario Provincial Police and the RCMP are co-operating in an intensive hunt for other suspects.

Earlier Wednesday one Montreal investigator was asked to comment on a report the Brockville loot might reach \$7,500,000. Detective - Lieut. Leslie Hobbs

said: "It's possible, but we don't know. Name me any figure, high or lower, and it's still possible." He said even police were still guessing at the amount of registered bonds stolen.

MARTIN REMANDED

A man arrested after an auto chase in Montreal Monday appeared in court here Wednesday in connection with the theft. Rene Martin, 23, of the Montreal suburb of Rosemount was remanded one week on charges of breaking and entering and committing an indictable offence.

Police said a key found in Martin's car Monday led to the recovery of about \$1,500,000 in negotiable and non-negotiable bonds from a Montreal railway station locker.

A published report in Montreal Wednesday said Martin told police five persons in the gang met in a motel after the robbery and split the loot, getting \$1,500,000 each, including \$80,000 cash.

The robbery occurred sometime Saturday night. The thieves broke into an office above the trust company and cut a hole in the floor, dropping into the company offices.

Gov't. Announces New Head For Atomic Power

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal government's multi-million dollar atomic energy program has been put in the hands of 45-year-old J. Lorne Gray, a Prairie-born engineer who has played a major role in Canada's development as a leading nuclear power.

Mr. Gray, vice-president of administration and operations of Atomic Energy of Canada Limited since January, 1954, succeeds William J. Bennett, 46, who retired May 1 to enter private industry.

Trade Minister Churchill also announced Wednesday that Roy J. Henry, 60, vice-president of Eldorado Mining and Refining Limited, has been appointed president of that company, government agency for purchase and sale of Canadian uranium.

The two posts previously were held by Mr. Bennett. He was named president of the Eldorado Atomic Energy of Canada in 1953.

Mr. Bennett has become executive vice-president of Canadian British Aluminium Company Limited.

SALARIES NOT REVEALED

The salaries received by heads of Crown corporations never are made public. However, it is reported unofficially in Ottawa that Mr. Gray and Mr. Henry will receive annual salaries of \$35,000 and perhaps as much as \$50,000.

Mr. Bennett's salary as president of the two companies was reported recently as \$35,000. But a government source said this was on the low side.

Mr. Bennett is one of three top federal civil servants whose resignations were announced after the Progressive Conservative election victory March 31. The others are Mitchell Sharp, 46, deputy trade minister, and George McIvor, 64, chief commissioner of the Canadian Wheat Board, whose positions have not yet been filled.

OTTAWA, (Special) — Hon. J. Angus MacLean, Fisheries Minister and Prince Edward Island's representative in the cabinet, attended a swearing-in ceremony in the House of Commons Wednesday all by himself. Mr. MacLean, who is also MP for Queens, was absent from Ottawa when cabinet colleagues and conservative MP's were sworn in as members Tuesday by Commons clerk Leon Raymond. The Minister was in P.E.I. over the weekend. So Mr. MacLean received preferred treatment Wednesday. A special ceremony was held for him alone.

Refrigeration Society Elects Gordon Batt

The annual meeting of the N.B.—P.E.I. Chapter of the Refrigeration Service Engineers Society of America was held at the Brunswick Hotel in Moncton May 3rd. Guest speakers included Major C. L. Dow, Director of N. B. Technical Institute, H. E. Kearns, Director of R.S.E.S. Canada and A. J. Pike, International Director.

It was noted that Refrigeration - Air Conditioning field is expanding rapidly in this area with resultant shortage of qualified service engineers. The Society plans to complete a brief this year to be presented to the Provincial Governments in the Maritimes covering studies required for adequate training of youths interested in entering this field, in the hope that this training will be made through Technical or Trade Schools.

The Society will also continue its efforts to make the public aware of the danger to small children in abandoning refrigerators with doors intact. OTTAWA (CP)—Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery will pay his farewell visit to Canada May 12-20 as deputy supreme allied commander in Europe. He will vacate his appointment in September.

The defence department said Wednesday Viscount Montgomery will arrive at Montreal at 4 p.m. Monday. He will stay at the home of Dr. Cyril James, chancellor of McGill University, before coming to Ottawa Tuesday.

On May 14 Viscount Montgomery will visit Prime Minister Diefenbaker and Defence Minister G. R. Pearkes, hold a press conference and address a luncheon meeting of the Canadian Club. In the afternoon he will visit veterans.

He will address officers of defence headquarters May 15 and confer with the chiefs of staff. In the evening, he will attend a reception for senior officers, active and retired, who fought under his command in northwest Europe and Italy. He will attend a dinner given by Sir Saville Garner, United Kingdom high commissioner to Canada.
