## Banker Addresses Local Rotarians

The Canadian chartered Banks have played an essential and vital part in the development of Canada as one of the great trading nations of the world. The manager of the Royal Bank of Canada, Charlottetown, who addressed the regular luncheon meeting of the Rotary Club at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

"Our Banking system is the product of evolution. Banking in Canada has never been rigid and unchanging but adaptable," said Mr. Wright. "The original Bank Act of 1871 continues a feature of pre-Confederation legislation, limiting bank charters to ten years, renewal being subject to a general review by a parliamentary committee."

Mr. Wright said that there is no other business in Canada where all charters of licenses expire simultaneously in this way and can only be renewed after close and extended parliamentary inquiry.

"The Canadian system is a branch banking system, differing, for instance, from the unit or individual bank which predominates in the United States," continued the speaker. "A Canadian chartered bank is best defined as a bank 'with' branches. The eight banks operate more than 5,684 branches outside of Canada."

Mr. Wright noted, "Chartered banks are owned by shareholders numbering in the thousands and mostly Canadians. The par value of the shares is fixed by the bank act at \$10.00—changed from \$100.00 of the 1944 Parliamentary revision to encourage wider diffusion of ownership. **HALIFAX (CP) —** The weather office says cloudy skies with only a few sunny intervals were indicated for all three Maritime provinces today. An area of showery weather was approaching and will spread across the district.

These showers are expected to be brief and widely separated so that little actual rainfall will result. Winds today will remain strong westerly in all regions except for northern New Brunswick. Coastal fog patches will form along the Bay of Fundy shores as well as along the Atlantic coast of Nova Scotia.

Wednesday is expected to be cloudy with early showers, followed by clearing skies later in the day.

Regional forecast: Northern Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Eastern New Brunswick counties, Lower St. John River Valley: Mostly cloudy with scattered showers beginning early this morning with occasional thundershowers during the afternoon and evening. Not much change in temperature, winds light overnight, increasing in the morning to southwesterly 25, but diminishing again to light this evening. ## Premier Shaw Has Questions On Liberal Pension Planning

Questions are being asked about the intentions of the Liberal Party regarding pensions when it takes office shortly," said Premier W.R. Shaw yesterday.

Premier Shaw stated, "No one seems to be very clear regarding this matter, particularly in view of recent obscure developments at the Federal level."

The Conservative Government in this province made a clean-cut commitment on pensions and kept faith by implementing its election guarantee and promptly forwarding to senior citizens an increased pension of \$25 retroactive to April first.

The incoming government, which made promises to promptly care for our elderly people's needs, will be watched with great care and it is expected that they will honor those sincere and pious intentions which they presented to the people during the election campaign."

The situation at Ottawa, the Premier said, is rather confusing. "There has been a consistent demand from all opposition parties for pension increases. The federal government has consistently refused. Now to save face, a new formula has been announced to pay an increase not on a means test for from other sources."

"What this means," the Premier said, "is hard to say. It must involve a need to see the new formula will be a form of a needs test or of a means test or something in between that we know little about," said Premier Shaw.

"In any event, it would appear that as far as Ottawa is concerned, our aged people will be disappointed, particularly if the provincial government follows the lead of the Federal, and we will have to wait until next fall when parliament re-assembles to find out what the story is."

The Premier continued, "We naturally shall assume that the provincial government will not dare to ignore its commitments to the people of this province and that it will continue to provide the pension that the Conservative government in this province so promptly honored after the May 30th election. I feel that the Campbell government is so tightly hitched to the Ottawa leaders—that it must keep step with them by subscribing to the confusing offer that has been recently announced from the Canadian capital."

"The Premier-elect said some time ago that Ottawa would in any event provide for the \$25 increase that our government has already made."

"We shall watch with great interest the activities of the new government with regard to pensions, particularly as we recognize that our senior citizens, in the light of the increased cost of living that has taken place since the present Federal government took over, are finding it difficult to exist at any level of decency and satisfaction on the pensions heretofore provided," the Premier concluded.
