THE man Seivier who was shot at Rustico a short time ago for house-breaking, was brought to town on Tuesday last, and after an examination before Alexander Hayden, Esq., J. P., was ordered to jail until to-morrow, when he will be tried. The ball has not been extracted as yet, owing to the serious results attending an operation.

QUICK WORK.—A Souris correspondent writes:—"The schooner 'Alpin' cleared for Margaree on Monday morning, to buy mackerel. She returned the following morning with one hundred barrels, which were shipped and carried for Boston the same day. The mackerel were bought and shipped by the enterprising firm of Macdonald, Macdonald & Co. The same firm shipped to Boston, this year, about 1,600 barrels."

THE WOOLLY APHS.—Our Island naturalist while botanizing along the border of Mayby's Creek a week ago, observed the twigs of some alder bushes covered with patches of a white, woolly substance which, on examination, proved to be that destructive pest of apple orchards, the woolly aphis. As this is the first time that he has observed this nuisance on the Island, he advises the farmers in that locality to secure its destruction by burning the few limbs of alders on which it occurs.

THE Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition opened at Truro on the 25th instant. Ex-Governor Archibald, in the course of his remarks on the occasion, said he had lately been visiting the great Northwest and considered it certainly the finest country in the world. If he was a young man he would go there and commence farming, and work until he had gained a competence which would not be long coming in a country like the Northwest. He was a firm believer in what Lord Kimberly had said, that though Canada had fostered the Northwest, the Northwest would eventually float Canada.

LAST evening at about 9 o'clock, Mr. John Jury, Kent street, noticed a suspicious-looking bundle thrown carelessly in on his hall door. Close examination revealed the fact that an infant was wrapped up in the bundle, and that it seemed quite satisfied with its new quarters. Mr. Jury instantly notified the police about the matter, and when Marshal Flynn arrived at Mr. Jury's residence, he was not a little surprised to find that the child had been ejected, and that it was lying out on the cold platform, very meagrely clothed. Marshal Flynn was very properly indignant at this treatment of the child, and indeed he had good reason to be. After considerable trouble a woman was found who took the helpless little thing in charge, and efforts which will doubtless result successfully are now being made to discover its unfortunate's mother.

Colonel Taylor inspected the men in Battalion Drill and other military manoeuvres. From what we can learn he expressed himself as highly pleased with the Camp. Col. Taylor, who is in command of Camp Sussex, was obliged to return back this morning.

CURRENT NOTES.

The various Pacific Railways have commenced a war of rates.

The ravages of fever in Mexico are reported to be increasing.

Only 652 yards remain to bore of railway tunnel under the Mersey.

George Alexandre Phallis, Grecian states man and juriconsulate, is dead, aged seventy-nine.

The failure of Ferd. Mayer & Co., of New York, woollens, with liabilities estimated from \$1,250,000 to \$1,750,000 is announced.

George Vanderbilt, fourth son of Wm. H. Vanderbilt, has "entered journalism," and will begin as a police reporter on a New York morning daily.

A small jail at Ashville, Ohio, was burned and one prisoner, name unknown, burned to death. He had considerable money, and it is thought that he was murdered and the building set on fire to conceal the crime.

Fine sensibilities are like woodbine, delightful luxuries of beauty to twine round a solid, upright stem of understanding; but very poor things if, unrestrained by strength, they are left to creep along the ground.

At the trial of Chiefs Mampoor and Mapoch, for treason to the Transvaal Government, the former claimed in his defence that he was reduced to his present position by Great Britain leaving him and Chief Seacoeni to struggle for the supremacy.

Forest fires so threatened Fredericton on the evening of the 25th instant that, for the first time since the completion of the water-works, the engines were kept running all night, giving a water pressure of 100 lbs. The fires had nearly reached the city when a heavy rain commenced to fall and heavy showers fell during the night.

The general committee of the British Association for the Advancement of Science has elected Lord Raleigh President for 1884. Among the Vice-Presidents are the Marquis of Lorne, Marquis of Lansdowne, Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir Charles Tupper, Sir Alexander Galt, Right Hon. Lyon Playfair, Dr. Charles William Siemens and Prof. Huxley. The next meeting, which will be held in Montreal, has been fixed for 27th August, 1884.

A meeting of the joint committee of the cotton spinners, manufacturers and operatives of North and Northeast Lancashire will be held at Manchester to confer upon the depressed condition of the cotton trade. The principal object of the conference is to arrange a scale of wages. The market for cotton goods is reported to be suffering from over production. The masters propose to effect a reduction in wages, which proposition the workmen avow they will resist to the utmost. They suggest to the masters that instead of reducing their wages the production be curtailed by working the factory on shorter time. The result of this conference is awaited with great anxiety.

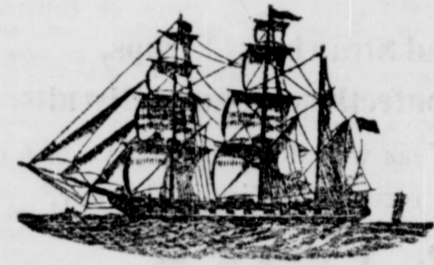
