Mrs. Currie, who was 65 years of age, formerly resided in Bonshaw. She leaves a sorrowing husband and family to mourn. The funeral will be held today (Tuesday), from her late residence, 32 Green Street to Argyle Shore Cemetery. The service will commence at 10 a.m. and be concluded at 10.30.

World Shortage

In Tea Results In Higher Prices

During 1919 and 1920 the greatly increased production and unimpaired shipping facilities resulted in enormous quantities of tea reaching every market in the world. A consequent drop in price was the result. To stabilize the situation, the tea growers of Ceylon and India agreed to curtail production 20 per cent in 1921. Since that time the demand has been constantly increasing and the price rising. The recent reduction of duty of tea entering England has further increased the demand, and the price is expected to rise accordingly.

OFFICER WALKER'S CONDITION—Police Officer Walker was confined to his house all day yesterday. Last night he was reported suffering considerably from pain and shock and it will no doubt be several days before he can resume his duties. The blow he received on Saturday night was a terrible one and was dealt with a large piece of concrete which tore off some two square inches of skin from the back of his head and inflicted a nasty cut. The blood flowed so freely that it formed quite a pool on the concrete sidewalk and it is said that it was fully five minutes before he recovered consciousness after having fainted. The sympathy of citizens generally will be given to officer Walker who at the time was doing his simple duty. It is to be hoped that every means will be taken to have the author of the act brought to justice.
