KEEP IN TRIM

Wants To Know If All Dieters Take Some Pills

"When you report success in losing and quote triumphant letters, you do not tell us whether or not these dieters took something to discourage appetite. Do they all do it 'on their own' or do they take pills? I really want to know."

In the interest of space, some of the success stories have to be shortened, however, the vital facts are all included. If the dieter writes that she did use an appetite depressant or a curber to discourage her appetite, that information is reported.

Frankly, very few of the successful reducers make any claim for pills. Many reducers do say that they had tried appetite depressants but only regained the lost pounds, and not until they made up their mind to really come to grips with their fattening food habits were they able to reduce and stay at desirable weight.

NO "MAGIC" PILL
There is no "magic" in any appetite curber or depressant. The chief drawback with the depressants is that not everyone can tolerate them since these drugs act on the central nervous system. The difficulty is their secondary effects—nerous tension and irritability, and often insomnia. Also it must be remembered that the appetite lessening effect wears off after a few weeks' time and then you're on your own.

The trouble with relying on anything of this sort is that the dieter tends to put the emphasis in the wrong place—on the pill rather than on a change of food habits. It is always the diet that does the reducing, and weight loss is permanent only if the diet is permanent.

WIFE PRESERVERS

Keep your electric toaster, griddle, waffle iron, roaster and other cooking appliances clean by wiping them with a copy of this issue as they cool after use. This recipe will avoid trouble later in your life.

You May Still Be Able To Use That Handbag

The fashion experts tell us that the really well-dressed woman is extremely particular about her costume accessories and that the right handbag, the right hat for each and every outfit, is a "must."

Well, that's something that requires not only money, but plenty of time and storage space! So what to do?

DISCARDED HANDBAGS
For one thing, many of us have quite a pile of discarded handbags around the house. Really fine leather bags can be splendidly re-conditioned and are well worth the cost.

But it is possible to do them over at home and make them quite presentable.

Stains and water spots on leather bags can be made less noticeable, if not entirely obscured, with colored shoe cream and clear or colored wax.

Scatched, torn or worn corners can be refurbished by retouching with matching shoe dye or for black bags, India ink.

Fabric purses will look bright again after an application of a good dry cleaner.

DON'T NEGLECT LININGS
Don't neglect the lining of any bag. Very fine sandpaper, rubbed over shiny spots, will help to improve a suede bag. There are excellent suede dressings and renovators on the market.

Sometimes a leather bag is in pretty fair condition save for worn seams. If one is handy, it isn't too difficult to rip the seam, fold in the worn portions, make a deeper seam and restitch it. Use buttonhole twist, heavy duty or linen thread, for this part of the task, and wax the thread.

Use a back stitch for strength.

If you don't want to do this, then give the job to a good shoe repair shop.

As for the metal frames and catches, go over them with a good silver polish. A gold-plated frame may need replating.

PROTECTING FRAMES
A carefully applied coating of clear nail polish is an excellent

method of protecting metal frames from scratches and tarnish. This must be reapplied from time to time.

If handle stitching is loose or broken, here, again, many shoe repair shops will take care of this for you.

All handbags, old or new, should be carefully cleaned from time to time. Empty out all contents and get busy cleaning every bit of the lining, whether it is fabric or leather.

All fittings should be cleaned, too—combs washed, compacts cleaned, powder puff changed, leather wallets and keycases gone over with leather cleaner and conditioner.

It's a pesky job, to be sure, but one that does give a real sense of accomplishment once tackled and performed.
