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Only Routine Business At Council Meeting

Only routine business was transacted last evening at the regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council. His Worship Mayor Henry Wedge presided and all members of the Council were present.

An acknowledgment was received from the Superintendent of the Canadian National Railways to a request from the Town Council that automatic warning signals be placed at the crossings in Summerside. The clerk read a letter he had written to Mr. T. C. Montgomery, railway superintendent calling to his attention the bad condition of the Water Street West crossing and asking that it be repaired.

A letter was read from the Chief Constables Association expressing pleasure at the cooperation given the organization by sending Chief of Police White to the annual conventions.

On motion of Councillor J.L. Gorrell and seconded by Councillor J.L. Driscoll, a resolution was passed authorizing the Town to borrow the sum of \$300,000, and to issue debentures to cover this amount. Councillor Gorrell explained that the money will be used to pay the balance owing on the new electric light unit and to cover capital expenditures such as street paving, laying of cement sidewalks, water and sewerage extensions and purchase of land.

Names were officially bestowed on four new streets last night. The street from Central to Granville Street north of the hospital is to be called Schurman Avenue; the street on the east side of the hospital was named Lidstone Street; a street running west from Duke Street between Maple Avenue and Willow Avenue is to be named Avon Street and the street joining Harvard and Ottawa Streets on the east side of the electric light pond is to be called Windsor Street.

Councillor Driscoll reported that the Department of Highways is now widening and improving the MacEwen Road which leads to the People's Cemetery. Storm sewers are being laid on East Street, Duke Street and Granville Street North in preparation for paving next year and quite a bit of travelling is being done on dirt streets.

Councillor T.D. Morrison, reporting for the electric light committee said that the new unit at the electric light plant will be ready for its test run any day now. He said that there has been some criticism of the delay in building the Lot 16 line but the men have been working on it as much as they could but there was other work that had to be done as well.

Mayor Wedge suggested that work should go forward next year on installing new street lighting on Water Street and an endeavor should be made to have all overhead wiring removed. He asked the light committee to write the Telephone Company and suggest that they move their telephone wires from Water Street next year.

Councillor G.B. Sheen reported that the new pumper for the fire department will be shipped in a week's time. He also reported that the library is being renovated.
