District Governor Addresses Summerside Rotary Club

Mr. E. R. Guss, Q. C., Governor of District 2840, Rotary International in an inspiring address on the objectives of Rotary and the obligations of individual Rotarians reminded the Summerside Rotarians that members of Rotary should be men who are dedicated to the ideal of service before self. In this address Tuesday evening District Governor Guss said "Rotarians are an association of neighboring citizens banded together to improve conditions in our professions, vocations, and communities". Discussing each item in turn, Governor Guss dealt with what he termed "the four facts of Rotary" — vocational service, community service, international service, and club service.

STANDARDS
He suggested that a standard for Rotarians in matters of vocational service should be to 'treat employees as you would your own daughter, and treat customers and those with whom you deal as you would expect your own brother to treat you', and he urged rotarians to 'put Rotary to work, where you work'. Community service has its great reward in youth, said Governor Guss. "What you do for youth is never lost". He gave a vivid word picture of the contribution a local club could make in community service by providing the economic means which might be preventing brilliant but economically poor students from completing their education and thus making their fullest contribution to science, arts, nursing, and other vocations.

WALLS DOWN
Governor Guss put strong emphasis on the responsibility of Rotarians in the field of international service. "Rotary wants the walls

down between all peoples", he said. "Color or creed make no difference." Benefits from good done for those in other countries is of equal value to both, whether it be individuals or nations, Mr. Guss stated. Commenting on the contributions made by immigrants in many fields of endeavour, he made reference in a Biblical comparison in which he said, "Don't keep the door shut, for some have been unaware that they have entertained angels".

Before beginning his remarks District Governor Guss paid tribute to the work being done by the Summerside Rotary Club, and congratulated one of the club's members, Rotarian Dan Chan, who has not missed a meeting of the club during the past five years. Mr. Guss was introduced by the president Vaughan Groom, and an expression of the clubs appreciation of his address was made by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, a member of the Summerside Rotary Club.

Catamaran Sail Boat Amazes The Newfoundlanders

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) —It's white and seaworthy and it has two hulls, but fishermen and dock hands along St. John's waterfront have to take a long, quizzical squint before they're convinced there's such an animal as Glenn Butt's sailboat.

He arrived here in the strange craft Monday after an 80-day trip from Halifax. Two of those days were spent holed up because of fog at Portugal Cove south, where Butt picked up his brother Duke. He left Halifax alone.

The catamaran-type sailboat is modelled on the outrigger craft Butt used to watch skimming across the South Pacific as a merchant mariner during the Second World War.

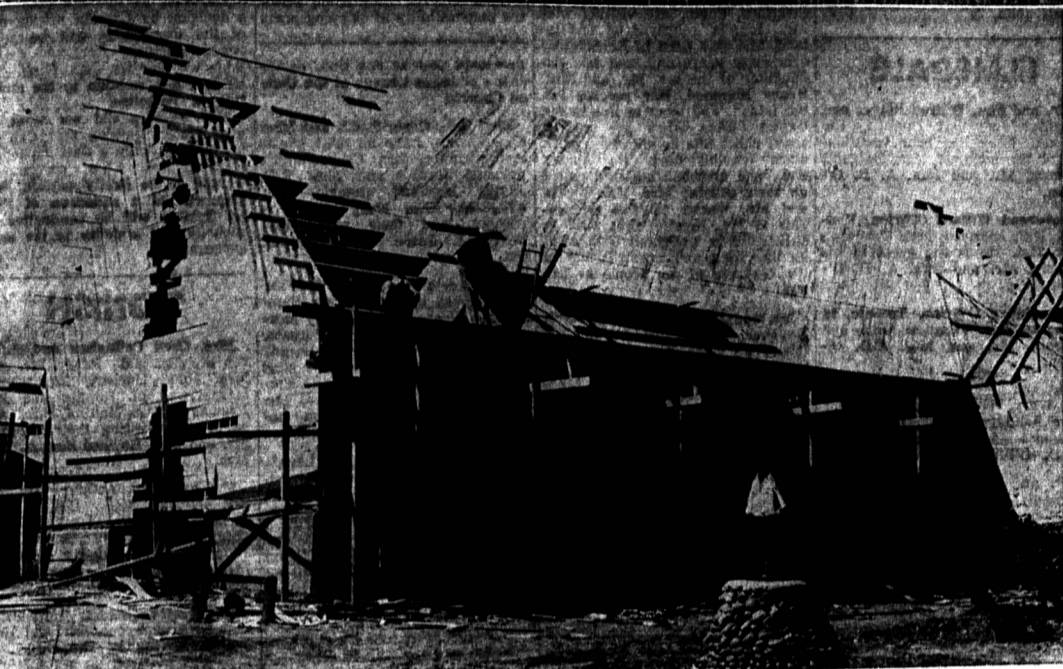
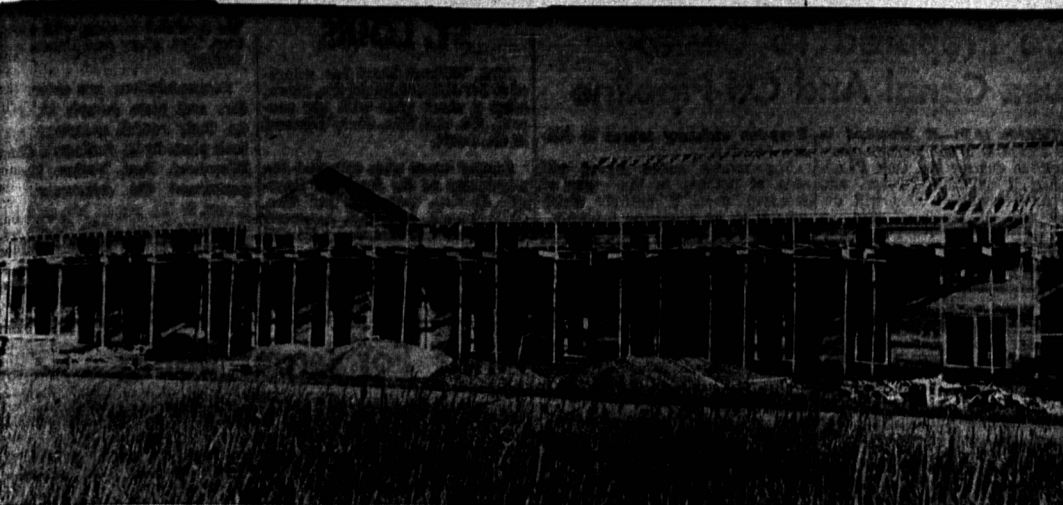
The single-masted yacht is driven by sail alone. The mast pierces the frail-looking plywood deck and is secured by a beam and cables. Its twin hulls, each with a cabin, are joined by the deck slung two feet above the water. Butt, a resident of nearby Mount Pearl-Glendale, built the craft himself.
